MEMBER AT LARGE - Judy Buis -

Judy discussed a letter sent to the Commodore concerning FBYC's involvement next year in the Leukemia Cup Regatta. Hampton Yacht Club will not co-host the event in 2001, and the Leukemia Society would like to have FBYC continue to host the event. Board members expressed concerns about agreeing to host the event indefinitely. Mike Calkins moved that FBYC agree to host the 2001 regatta only; second by Waddy Garrett. Discussion followed and the motion was then approved.

OFFSHORE DIV. CDR. - Stuart Bur-

ONE DESIGN DIV. CDR. - Debbie Cy-

cotte - There were 20 boats/5 classes participating in the first race of the Fall Series. Only 3 boats participated in the Women's Portsmouth Race. There were 103 boats participating in the Annual One-Design Regatta. Of that group, 20 Flying Scots were sailing for their district championship. The Lightning North American Championship Regatta had 44 boats participating.

ONE DESIGN RACE CHR. - Alain

<u>Vincey</u> - Alain has no race committee for the September 30 Fall Series race. He also needs volunteers for Indian Summer Regatta and for the Laser Masters Championship Regatta. Another boat, in addition to *Mr. Roberts* and the Seacraft, will be needed for the Laser Masters.

CRUISING DIV. CDR. - Mike

<u>Pleninger</u> - There were 13 boats for the Cruising Regatta and for the Captain's Choice Cruise. There are four cruises remaining and attendance has been good all year.

JUNIOR ACTIVITIES - Jan Monnier -

Annual Reports from each committee and each Board of Trustees member are due at the October Board meeting.

OLD BUSINESS - Bill Newman, Architect, attended a 5:00 meeting prior to the regular Board meeting to discuss the clubhouse plans and answer questions. Strother advised that the two main issues - the building and the financing - would now be open for discussion. John Koedel, Jr., Building Committee Chairman, said that the plans discussed at the 5:00 meeting should meet our needs for many years. Gordon Nelson placed before the Board a resolution to proceed with the building assuming an agreement can be reached concerning the financial aspects: second by Mike Calkins: motion passed. 61st Annual One Design Regatta

Four down and two to go. Fishing Bay hosted the Southern Chesapeake Volvo Leukemia Cup on June 23 and 24 and the Lightning North American Master, Women and Junior Championship with 21 Masters, 10 Ladies and 12 Juniors. The Lightning Regatta ran from August 7-11. A full week by any standards. It was immediately followed by the Annual One Design Regatta August 12-13. For Saturdays races we were blessed with excellent conditions with 108 boats registered. The Regatta was run jointly with the Flying Scot Capitol District Championships with 20 boats joined on the outside course by 14 Front Runners, 12 Hamptons and 12 Mobjacks. On the mid course we had 10 Albacores, 3 JY-15's, 13 Lasers, 6 420's and 3 Bytes. Inside Fishing Bay we had a total of 14 Optis, 4 in the red, 3 in the green and 7 in the blue fleets. Happily we got in four races on Saturday on both outer courses while the Optis got in five. Supper was ready almost as soon as the boats returned to shore but there was minimal use of the dance floor as few sailors had any energy left.

Sunday started off looking very promising at day break but by 8.30 the rain had settled in and we had more thunder and lightning than was safe to go out in. After two postponements racing was abandoned at 11:45. Now we have two more major regattas to look forward to, the One Design Indian Summer Regatta 7-8 October and the US Laser Masters Regatta 13-15 October with many other racing and cruising opportunities before that.

One Design News

A report on the 61st Annual Regatta appears elsewhere in this issue and while that is history for this Centennial year the best is yet to come. After three Fall series Regattas in September the club sailing season ends with the Indian Summer Regatta October 7-8 followed by the US Laser Masters regatta October 13-15. We are expecting upwards of 75 boats for each of these events.

Laser News

Preparations for the US Laser Masters Regatta October are well underway with Randy Alley handling publicity, Jere Dennison arranging housing, Frank Murphy working with sponsors, Brad Squires organising support for the off-shore activities, Mike Schmidt the Principal Race Officer, Jon Deutsch doing our scoring and none other than Alain Vincey preparing not one but two dinners We have been without most New England sailors for the '98 and '99 Masters Regattas but have commitments from at least 11 this time. Our long distance entrants from North America include sailors from Alberta, Nova Scotia and Utah and one from West Germany. Perhaps we ought to consider selling seats to watch what could be be a 75 boat. start. If you are a member of the Laser Fleet and have not been asked to help don't despair, you soon will be. This is not a threat, it's a promise.

SUMMER CRUISE TO THE NORTHERN CHESAPEAKE BAY incl. July 4

On Sunday June 25th our first group of 5 cruisers headed north in southerly winds to Solomons Island and, of course, we dropped anchor in time for cocktails and dinner at the delightful C & D Café. Monday, we left Solomons early and headed for a mooring in the Annapolis harbor. We enjoyed walking around Annapolis, a shopping spree at Fawcetts, and dinner at Maria's on the square.

Tuesday we dropped our mooring line just after sunrise and headed across the bay to Chestertown on the Chester River (37 nm) in very light winds. This was American Pie's first visit to Chestertown, and it was worth the effort. It is a gorgeous river and Chestertown is an interesting town to visit. We stayed 2 nights at the Chestertown Marina and had a super dinner at the Imperial Hotel Wednesday.

On Thursday morning our fleet split up with American Pie, Celebration, and Nugget heading for the mouth of the Patapsco River where we anchored in choppy seas to view the Tall Ship Parade leaving Baltimore. Magic and Bay Breeze stayed in the Chester River. From the Patapsco we motored through thundershowers to a beautiful anchorage in the Sassafras River. The cruising guide advises that this lovely river should be visited on weekdays. We rafted in a quiet anchorage and could count the boat traffic on one hand. On Friday morning we motored to Fredericktown and Georgetown on the Sassafras and took a walking tour of this area. We returned to our anchorage after noon and lifted anchor around 1500 heading for Chesapeake City. Friday afternoon on a holiday weekend in this river brought boats out like flies with about the worst boating etiquette and VHF radio abuse you can imagine. The guide was right, visit

this river on weekdays.

Our fleet anchored in the small, sheltered anchorage on the south side of the C & D Canal and we had dinner at an excellent crabhouse called the Taproom. On Saturday morning we did a walking tour of Chesapeake City and visited the C & D Canal Museum. This museum is run by the Corp. of Engineers and gives a very good history of the canal which is about 160 years old. It is a must see in traversing the canal and it is free. We left our anchorage at 1230 when the tide was in our favor and motored to Worton Creek where we rafted up at anchorage and enjoyed dinner on board prepared by our gourmet chefs. On Sunday morning we motored across the bay to Baltimore in a dead calm and tied up at the Inner Harbor East Marina for 3 nights. Oriental Express and Irish "C" joined the first group of 5 in Baltimore.

Baltimore harbor is always a fun
