Some of you will recognize some of these young people, some of whom are now members with children of their own, and three of them have served as Board members. Most importantly, many of the group still sail.

June and I wish you a Happy Holiday Season and a wonderful New Year. And we promise you all an eventful 2004. We also hope that you will make spending more time at FBYC one of your New Year's resolutions. We look forward to seeing everyone there often in 2004.

We will have to furnish proof of how we spent the money and they have reserved the right to disallow any expenditure inconsistent with our policy. Allan will submit an electrical estimate covering electrical repairs on the docks to the insurance company. Allan has asked Richard Callis to give us advance notice relating to the repairs to the Jackson Creek docks so that we can relocate boats as necessary. The Jackson Creek docks should be repaired by March and the Fishing Bay dock by the end of April.

SOCIAL - Scott Collins needs volunteers to chair the various social events in 2004. Any member willing to chair any of the events should contact Scott.

WINTER PROGRAMS -The first winter program will be held on January 30 and will feature Bob Hand-schumacher, who has spoken exten-

History....

A Penguin Racing Vignette Jere Dennison

Through the end of the 1940's at our predecessor club in Urbanna and into the 1950's at our present location, the Penguins became our most active one-design racing fleet. Many of the Club's founders and early commodores raced Penguins, including W.M.F. Bayliss our 19th commodore in 1955. Major Bayliss as he was known for his military exploits against Rommel in North Africa during WW II was a raconteur of the first order. The father of current member Temple Bayliss and past member Murray Bayliss, Major Bayliss regaled his audiences with stories from the past, some of which waxed grander as the years progressed. A resident of Goochland County, he wrote a column for the *Goochland Gazette* entitled *Looking Back* where some of his old yarns were documented. One such column of May 28, 1974 recounted an incident that took place during a Penguin race at FBYC in the early 1950's and is reprinted below for the enjoyment of current members.

Looking Back by Major W.M.F. Bayliss

Sailing of all kinds and particularly small boat racing is great fun and the season is now well launched at the Fishing Bay Yacht Club near Deltaville, which serves the Richmond area and neighboring counties.

Strange things happen on the water, and the sea can kill you awfully fast if you make a serious error. We have therefore made it a practice never to take a drink unless safely anchored in a good harbor, or tied up alongside a quay. We commend this thought to our less experienced brethren.

A minor case in point came up some years ago when the Penguin fleet of some fifteen sail was racing in Fishing Bay. A stiff south easterly breeze was blowing and the fleet was passing clear of the shoal on the west of the bay, the Berryville shoal to be exact, when we observed a large power boat dead ahead in obvious distress. In fact she was filling up at the stern like a jug.

The twenty people on board were screaming bloody murder, particularly a buxom lady who seemed to be sitting on top of everybody else, howling "Save me, Save me!"

The Penguin fleet luffed up into the wind and prepared to rescue the perishing and care for the dying. However, the captain of the endangered craft who was apparently the only one aboard who had not taken a few drinks, really got to work with a bucket and kept the water down. He also gave his vessel full throttle and dashed for the Berryville shore.

Before we got near him he was in two feet of water and about to run onto the sand. The occupants continued to scream to be saved since they did not realize that although they were a quarter of a mile from the land in fairly rough water, they could easily walk ashore.

The Penguin fleet of course paid off which means letting their sails take the wind and scudded on their happy way, roaring such remarks to each other as "Look at those silly apes drowning in a foot of water!"

Mrs. Bayliss was crewing for us and as usual we had sit her up on the windward gunwale, not only to keep the spray off us, but also to give her the satisfaction of knowing that there she could really make her weight felt. It also helped us win races. Anyhow, even she, a most humanitarian lady, agreed that we had no further reason for anxiety about our power boat friends after they had gone up on the shoal in a foot of water with one heck of a bump. Legal action was threatened for the Penguins' heartless behavior but, needless to say, it fell flat.

History...

Hampton O/D vs. Snipe

In the history of FBYC, there has always existed a friendly and healthy rivalry between the sailors of our various one-design fleets. Even back in the early days at the Urbanna Yacht Club, each fleet would self-promote to attract new sailors onto the starting line. It did not matter if these efforts were at the expense of other recognized fleets. In the mid-1940's, both the Snipes and Hamptons were competing for new members to swell their ranks.

Henry Hutchinson, Jr. served as commodore of the Club from 1942-1944 and was instrumental in keeping the organization alive during the difficult WW II years. An avid sailor and owner of Hampton O/D #1, he served as club secretary in 1946 prior to his tragic death at age 35 due to complications from an appendectomy in 1947. Back then the club secretary created the *Club Bulletin* that was the precursor to the present day *Log*, and Henry loved to exercise his muse through the composition of poems relating to sailing and the yacht club. Each issue included his original verses but one poem, composed for the June 24, 1946 issue, truly illustrates his literary talent as he unabashedly knocks the Snipe class in favor of his own Hampton O/D class.

The Hampton Won by Henry E. Hutchinson, Jr.

When I was sailing one fine day
Came a Hampton One Design my way,
Alaying a course for Urbanna Creek,
With a yacht club burgee in her peak.

By declaration of trust dated No-
vember 7, 1947, the Board of the
Urbanna Yacht Club designated the
Henry E. Hutchinson, Jr. Memorial
Trophy as the club's first perpetual
award. The Hampton One was the
award class from 1947 though 1959.
