

#### From the Quarterdeck Jay Buhl, Commodore



In just a few short weeks the 2005 board terms will be completed. I would like to sincerely thank each and every board member and their

families, for their time, energy and effort put forth during the past year. Board service requires a significant amount of time and commitment both during the week and on the weekends. One of the major reasons Fishing Bay Yacht Club is so successful both on and off shore is due to countless hours donated by generous volunteers.

The 2005 Sailing season was very active and has hopefully offered something for everyone. Fishing Bay Yacht Club is gaining recognition and prominence up and

down the bay as a wonderful location to attend major regattas. This past year we hosted 76 sailing events, and approximately 6 training programs: 21 Offshore, 17 One Design, 17 Junior, and a very active Cruising program with 21 opportunities. Again, volunteerism is at the heart of our successful sailing program.

Last January I outlined 5 Key Objectives we wanted to bring focus to this year and into next. I would like to recap those objectives, and highlight a few accomplishments.

2005 Five Key Objectives – Champions & Results

Club Management & Operations – Champion Allan Heyward

Our first objective had three components. First, personnel, specifically our Deltaville employee(s). Next, review dollars spent vs. value members receive and update spending controls in all areas of the club with a concentrated focus on problem areas from last year. And finally, provide board members with timely and meaningful financial tools so they can effectively manage their areas of responsibility. **Results:** Dixon Cole, our new club operations manager was hired and brings unique and relevant skill sets to our club dramatically reducing the number of outside contractors required to be hired and thus eliminating associated incremental FBYC Web Site: http://www.FBYC.net

expenses. Next, expense approval policies and procedures were written and implemented in late winter / early spring, and before the sailing season and significant club activity began. And finally, our operating budget was input into our check book program "quicken" so spending reports can easily be generated comparing actual expenses to budget and prior year. Certain board members also now have the ability to review spending and financials on-line at any time. Net result of all this hard work is our spending is disciplined, educated, and expense budgets will be achieved or exceeded for the year. With six weeks remaining in our fiscal year we are forecasting our operational budget will beat plan by 37K. Additionally, we will pay over 76K directly to the principal loan balance, which puts the club slightly ahead of our debt reduction target of seven years. Great iob Allan. Mason Paul and others.

#### Long Range Planning - Champion Strother Scott

The original objective in January was to finish an outline plan written two years ago by September 2005. A more comprehensive plan format was introduced broadening the scope requiring the use of membership surveys. We therefore extended the "due date" until September 2006 allowing for a much more in depth and useful plan to be developed and one that can be easily updated from year to


#### **Board Meeting Highlights**

Meeting called to order at 6:05 p.m. by Commodore Jay Buhl.

#### <u>REAR COMMODORE –</u> <u>ALLAN HEYWARD</u>

**DOCKS** – Ric Bauer distributed copies of a proposed Slip/Storage Lease Agreement that will be included with the invoices of all members with boats in slips or drysail. Board members were asked to review the Agreement and send comments. Ric also distributed a diagram for the finger pier expan-



sion on the east and middle docks.

**SOCIAL** – The Annual Meeting/Awards Party will be held on November 11 at the Country Club of Virginia. Reservations should be made no later than November 4.

**<u>GROUNDS</u>** – Chip Hall advised that the two dead trees on the property would be removed within 2-3 weeks. Fall Clean Up Day is November 19, with December 3 as the back-up date. Chip will use a chain for the time being to keep traffic out of the small boat lot because he does not want to put up a new gate until the roadwork has been completed. The west boundary fence should be completed by the end of the year. Scott Collins advised that Peak Construction would be back to finish up their work on the new property now that the regattas are over.

**LONG RANGE PLANNING** – Strother Scott reported that Deborah Usry has put together a survey to send to the membership. The data obtained will be used by the Long Range Planning Committee in making future plans for the club. Before distribution to the membership, Strother may send the survey to the Board for additional comments.

**<u>FINANCE</u>** – The Finance Committee will hold one more meeting and Mason Chapman will present the budget at the November Board meeting for approval.

**WINTER PROGRAMS** - John Rousmaniere will present a program on February 10 at the Sun-Trust Bank Auditorium. No date has been set for the Bermuda High event.

**<u>PUBLICITY</u>** – Izumi Miller has sent information about various club events to the news media and some articles have been published.

ONE DESIGN DIVISION Sharon Bauer reported the following participation at recent one design events: Laser Masters - 19 boats; Flying Scot ACC - 35 boats; Fall #1 – 23 boats: Fall #2 – 22 boats; and Fall #3 - 15 boats (Lasers were in Annapolis). Despite bad weather the first day, 23 boats participated in Indian Summer. Sharon held a conference call to discuss the parking layout for small boats. The group reached a consensus but was unable to meet at the club during Indian Summer weekend. Sharon will follow up with the group. Jay advised that the Capitol District Flying Scot Association has asked if FBYC would be interested in hosting the Flying Scot North American Championships in 2007. Jay has asked Noel Clinard and a committee of his choosing to evaluate whether we could host the event.

**<u>CRUISING</u> DIVISION** – There are three more cruises this year – two in October and the Oyster Festival November 5-6, chaired by Tad Thompson.

The Caroline Collins Trophy was presented to Fishing Bay Yacht Club by Commodore Russ Collins in July 1992. This trophy is to be awarded to the Young Lady who has the highest standing in the Junior Regatta's Laser competition. The selection of the recipient will be made by the Junior Regatta Race Committee.

It is the request of the presenter that this trophy always be used to acknowledge outstanding performance by a Young Lady. The class of vacht may be changed by the Board if necessary.

In 1998, the Board changed the class to the Byte fleet. In 2005, the Board voted that the award would be used to acknowledge the outstanding performance by a young lady in the Junior Program with no regard to a particular boat fleet.

Rationale: This will allow the Junior Regatta Race Committee more leeway in choosing the recipient of this trophy.

Izumi Miller advised that the Richmond Sail and Power Squadron would like to hold a "Boat Smart" course at the club in the Spring. If the squadron will send some dates and information, the Sailing Events Committee will take their offer into consideration when plans for next year's schedule are being made.

Better vet we have members who have become regulars on mark and chase boats, in many instances using their own boats. For the first day of the Indian Summer Regatta we also had help from three parents, two visiting from Maryland and Pennsylvania and one who has since been elected to membership. Thank you, one and all. Who were the well supported sailors? Most of those who sailed on the Saturday had travelled the day before hoping the forecast was wrong, but determined to make the best of one final opportunity for Fall sailing. And once at Fishing Bay what better way to spend their time than sail. Pride of place goes to the Jacob and Swenson families for providing 4 of the 8 Opti sailors plus two parents sailing their Lasers, with Jacie getting two firsts in the final two races on the Sunday. Overall there were 9 Lasers sailing, 5 full and 4 radial rigs, another milestone. Maybe a sign of better things to come?  $\odot$

year. (Please review April Log for details of scope of long range plan.) Look for a member survey to be launched electronically in the next 60 - 90 days. Development of the Long Range Plan takes time and patience, and requires the work and corporation of many people. Thank you Strother for leading this effort, there remains significant work for next year.

#### Capital Planning – Champion Waddy Garrett

Our Club has several significant Capital Expenses on the short term horizon. The Finance Committee meets each fall, attempts to estimate costs and time horizons for major projects. This year our goal was to be a little more scientific in our approach and provide the Finance Committee concrete data from which to plan. For example, we wanted to better understand our bulkhead situation, when they would fail, could we repair in stages and therefore spread the related expenses over time? Other significant capital projects needing consideration include the One Design Dock, and the acquisition of a power boat. We needed to understand if our capital needs could be met given our commitment to eliminate land debt in seven years or less. Results: Waddy submitted a report to the Finance Committee that identifies major capital spending the club faces in the next five years, and made a recommendations as to how these expenses can be spread. Next, the Finance Committee will plug Waddy's recommendations into a financial model that follows our debt reduction goals. The Finance Committee will submit a budget for approval at the December meeting

accounting for known capital needs while preserving our goal of eliminating land debt in 7 years or less. Thank you Waddy, and your committee for their detailed report.

#### New Land Development – Champion Chip Hall

Our goal this year was to complete Phase 1 and 2 of the short range land development plan. Phase 1 included many "do it yourself' tasks with minimum expense to the club. Phase 2 included hiring a contractor to grade the land with considerable expense to he club. Phase 2 was not to be executed until our 2005 revenue became clear **Results:** Phase 1 and 2 are both complete and we began using the new property in late spring. In addition, a fence was constructed separating our new land and the neighbors' property. Soon we will begin required landscaping work, and finalizing a small boat parking layout plan. The revised plan will be more efficient and user friendly than the original plan, as we now have a years experience using the new land under our belt. Thank you Chip for the many hours spent over the past two years tending to the new land, and the fence looks really great!

#### Sailing Participation – Champion David Hazlehurst

David focused on several initiatives this past year attempting to increase on the water participation. Specifically to help Off Shore Skippers, on the water crew training was held in April, an "I want to sail list" function was trialed on the web site, and numerous log articles were written during the spring. David also directed the YMCA affiliated learn to sail program. We are also fortunate to see David's smiling face at the club each weekend encouraging folks to get out on the water.

Throughout the year board members and others regularly ask the question, "How do we increase participation from FBYC members? "We actually need to figure out if we have a "problem" with participation. A through review of our regular sailing events schedule is required. How many and what type of major events do should we commit to? What type investment in the Junior Program should the club make? Are spring and fall series races the best options? We have historical statistics archived on our web site enabling us to analyze trends by event from year to year. Analyzing trends should provide us insight to determining which events need to be altered as they may not be meeting sailors' needs, or are out of step with today's lifestyle. Continuous focus should remain on participation striving to improve our sailing schedule and reflecting the changing demands on peoples' time.

The Nominating Committee has confirmed board positions for 2006, FBYC will have a strong slate of Flag Officers and board. Several board members are already hard at work preparing for the 2006 sailing, and working on high profile land initiatives. We have an exciting and busy year to look forward to year.

Since this is the last article I will write as Commodore of Fishing Bay Yacht Club, I cannot miss this opportunity to thank my wife Mary, daughter Mary Catherine, and son Benjamin, for allowing me to dedicate a significant amount of time over the past several years to a club that means so much our family.  $\odot$ 

#### FBYC Junior Program Looks Forward to 2006 Eric Powers

The summer of 2005 saw FBYC juniors experience an explosive level of growth in their enthusiasm for competitive sailing. Much of the credit for the program's success can be attributed to the hard work and dedication of Junior Division Commander Noel Clinard and his hard working staff of volunteer parents and coaches.



Expert coaching from Juan Carlos Romero last summer had our kids bringing home silver from nearly every event they attended.

Throughout the summer, head coach Juan Carlos Romero and his assistant Arel English took a small but dedicated group of Optimist juniors to a new level of performance by holding regularly scheduled classroom sessions and on the water practices. Young sailors had ample opportunities to test their new-found skills under Juan and Arel's guidance at numerous regional regattas around the Bay including the Optimist Junior Olympics held at FBYC and the Optimist Nationals held at Norfolk Yacht and Country Club. Several kids participating in the program had never sailed in competitive events, but through careful training and encouragement, have now found a new summer sport they'll want to return to year after year. By summer's end, the FBYC race team had attended 13 away events in addition to several regattas held in our own waters. Aside from the numerous awards

they received for their performance, much of the fun they experienced came from the sense of friendship and camaraderie they developed with their teammates and competitors as they traveled to various race venues around the Bay. Parents joined the fun as well, traveling with the team to some of the best sailing destinations on the Bay and beyond.

This coming year, we hope to build on our success by continuing to promote a love of sailing through expert instruction and a chance to develop confidence on the water through competitive sailing or through just messing about in boats. Several key aspects of the upcoming program will include:

- Professional coaching for all levels of the program,
- Regularly scheduled practice sessions throughout most of the week,
- Opportunities to travel to regional regattas with a coach throughout the summer,
- Special clinics designed to develop skill levels and enthusiasm for all levels of young sailors, and

Opportunities for children to develop friendships with their classmates and team mates through ongoing participation and organized social events.

All of these offerings will build on the strengths of our previous program but with a renewed effort to promote sailors at all levels from Optimist Green Fleet to 420 and Laser Fleets. However, as in the past, the backbone of the program will come from parental support to insure kids get to and from events safely and are supported while on the water. This may sound like a challenge, but most parents will find a great sense of enjoyment and satisfaction in seeing our team develop and compete successfully. If we all pitch in, we can make this work.

Throughout the planning stages this winter and into the spring and summer, the Junior Division Commander will be soliciting the help of parents to help plan, organize and run practice sessions, clinics and travel events. In short, the success of the program will depend in large part on level of support offered by parents to meet our program goals. To this end, volunteers are needed for several key positions including Junior Week registrar, Program Scheduling and Coordination, Program Communications/Webmaster, Team Wear Sales and Event Planning. #### Not Exactly FBYC History... **Two and a Half Days before the Mast** Jere Dennison

Your Historian was blessed to be included in a mostly FBYC guest crew to deliver the 122' schooner *Virginia* from Deltaville - where she had been on station in Fishing Bay during our Stingray Point Regatta - to Richmond over a two and a half day period following Labor Day. Our host was Brent Halsey, FBYC member and Trustee of the Marine Heritage Foundation that owns and operates the *Virginia*. Besides Brent and me, the other guest crewmembers were: Jamie Meyer, Winston Williams, Preston Smith, Parke Smith, Kenny Sailor, Doug Dorsey, John Halsey, Matt Braun, Dabney Overton, and Chip Hall. Brent had



initially invited members of his former racing crew aboard for the voyage, but two, Chip Hall and myself, were the beneficiaries of late cancellations by two of the original crew. (Chip received a truly "last minute" invitation when his morning shower was interrupted by an urgent call just 15 minutes prior to the scheduled departure at 0900 Tuesday morning.)

Upon boarding the schooner, we were read the "Articles of War" which governed crew behavior (always back down the companionway steps; remove your hat at meals; follow safety procedures; no grog until the anchor's down; etc.) by the extraordinarily competent First Mate Dana, introduced to the permanent crew, and then invited to pick our bunks in the main cabin. There are a total of 12 commodious bunks; six on each side stacked two high. (If one is astute, he is able to claim one of the coveted top bunks that are slightly larger than the bottom versions due to the outward flair of the hull with an opening port for a ventilated view.) Each bunk has a privacy curtain for modesty protection and sound reduction.

Commanding the center of the passenger cabin is a large mess table with a long bench astride each side. All meals prepared by Chef Keith will be consumed here. The galley, two heads, and the permanent crew quarters are located forward. Aft are the engine room, pilothouse with state-of-the-art electronics, and Captain's cabin. The engine room accommodates two 205 HP diesel engines. But what really gets your attention below is the delicious aroma produced by the wood used in constructing the hull and its gleaming interior.



We were lucky with the weather for the first day's run to Newport News. The late-summer cold front that had dominated the Stingray Point Regatta weekend with blustery winds continued into Tuesday with 20 to 25 knots from the northeast under fair skies. One word can describe these conditions for the fair-hulled *Virginia*: PER-FECT! Off Cherry Point, all hands assisted in raising the huge gaff-rigged mainsail and foresail...huffing and puffing without the benefit of winches just like in the olden days. The jib and staysail were set and we were off and screaming downwind on a broad reach at 9.5 to 10 knots with a bone in our teeth. Even with high Chesapeake following seas, the *Virginia*'s wood deck felt as stable underfoot as the deck of the *Queen Mary*. Had she been fitted

with her full complement of sails that would have added a main topsail, fore topsail, and jib topsail to her sail area, there is no doubt that *Virginia* could have achieved her theoretical hull speed of almost 12 knots.

As we neared Hampton Roads in the mid-afternoon, Captain Nicholas Alley had a decision to make. He had never jibed the *Virginia* in these windy conditions and was contemplating a chicken jibe by wearing ship to avoid any chance of damage to the rig. Persuaded by the crew's insistence, we would jibe. Jibing a schooner of 157 tons displacement with gyrating telephone poles for booms and gaffs is a serious maneuver anytime, but especially in heavy air. The first order of business is to trim the headsails, then the foresail, and finally the mainsail tight amidships. Then throw over the helm and pray her stern turns through the wind. Excruciatingly *Virginia* began to rotate westward toward Fort

Monroe. Finally we were able to ease the sheets on starboard tack, and the schooner blasted up the lower James to an overnight anchorage in the shadow of Newport News Shipbuilding for dining and carousing about the decks until late into the evening.

The next morning we awoke early to scrub the decks, weigh the 500-pound fisherman anchor (mercifully accomplished with an electric windlass), and get underway for an 0800 opening of the James River Bridge during rush hour. With a mast height over 110' and a 60'vertical bridge clearance in its lowered position, the skipper had booked the opening in advance. Long lines of vehicles filled with frustrated commuters congested the lanes on each side of the bridge as

the *Virginia* meandered under the raised span. But what a beautiful sight they must have had to compensate them for the inconvenience they were suffering.

Clearing the bridge, it was clear that our sailing experience was over. The winds had lightened and became contrary. We would motor the final two legs of the trip up the James. Still gorgeous weather, we viewed the Ghost Fleet near Jamestown and climbed the ratlines. Later, as we approached the Benjamin Harrison Bridge at Hopewell, a speedboat altered course to hail the *Virginia*. It was captained by a male with two shapely females as cargo. As they sped by waving, the crew returned their gestures with gusto. Thereupon the bikini-clad females acknowledged our enthusiasm with, umm, a special salute revealing certain non-sunburned portions of their torsos.

Awhile later in the afternoon we anchored in a narrow offshoot of the James near Curles Neck in water that was



barely deeper at low tide than our 12' draft. As the day had grown hot, some swam and drank adult beverages. A sun awning was hoisted over the foresail boom, and we awaited the coolness of the evening. The last dinner aboard was punctuated with several toasts, many thanking Brent for making our memorable trip possible. In a more solemn toast, Brent expressed his gratitude to Parke Smith, on leave from duty in Iraq with the Marine Corp, for his service to our country. This was a poignant moment for all of us since we knew Parke would be returning to the war zone next spring after some additional training.

The final half-day of the voyage was non-eventful as we snaked our way up the narrowing waterway to Intermediate Terminal in the shadow of Richmond's Church Hill. The highlight of this leg was passing Jimmy Deans manse on the James with his monogrammed lawn. No public tours for *Virginia* were scheduled, and hence no large welcoming



throng greeted us at the end of our journey to the Capitol City. Although tours were initially contemplated, the *Virginia* was not yet equipped with a proper gangway to allow safe public access to the vessel from the concrete bulkhead that towered over our deck at the terminal. Ascending an aluminum house ladder to disembark in downtown Richmond was an anticlimactic end to a fabulous trip.

You too can experience the shipboard delights of an early  $20^{\text{th}}$  century schooner. The *Virginia* is scheduling each year a number of cruises around the Chesapeake Bay. Check out <u>www.schoonervirginia.org</u> for available dates and the modest fees for an unforgettable trip.  $\odot$

### Race Results

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
