Board Meeting Highlights


July 15, 2006

Leukemia Cup Scores Another Win

The 8th Annual Southern Chesapeake Leukemia Cup Regatta held off Deltaville over the weekend of July 8 -9 was a rousing success with 83 registered yachts, a 38% increase over last year's event. Evidently, the new two-day racing format encouraged a surge in participation that was rewarded with near perfect conditions on the racecourse. Mother Nature was hospitable to skippers and crews this year, offering up cool, dry winds in the ten-knot range for both days. The event was hosted by the Fishing Bay Yacht Club, Stingray Harbor Yacht Club, and York River Yacht Club.

Overall awards for the top three boats in each division were presented at the Fishing Bay Yacht Club on Sunday afternoon.

But the action at this year's Leukemia Cup was not restricted solely to the racecourse. Augmented by a spacious, billowing tent, the Deltaville Firehouse morphed on Friday night into the site for the event's increasingly popular fund-raising auction and on

Saturday into the site for the Leukemia Cup's Gala celebration with food, beverages, and entertainment.

On Saturday, while racers and spectators frolicked on the water, the Schooner *Virginia* again held open-house tours for over 200 of the general public at the Fishing Bay Harbor Marina and collected donations to benefit the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society. FBYC History....

Black Cat & Wildcat

Some may wonder why we have named the new race committee launch *Wild-cat II*. Besides being a really cool name, it was derived from the original *Wildcat* that served FBYC as its primary committee boat from 1975 to 1980 when she was replaced by the first *Mr. Roberts*. But I am getting ahead of myself...



From at least the early 1950s when the club relocated from Urbanna, our committee boat was the *Black Cat*, a WWII vintage surplus vessel converted to civilian use and chartered from Gene Ruark. Gene berthed her at his nearby marina and maintained her unpredictable mechanical systems. But she was a tough old gal, for she kept our race committees afloat for about 25 years. Thanks to Bob Graham, we have located a picture of this less than photogenic vessel on station in the early 1970s. In spite of her eccentric appearance, she never sank, at least on the racecourse, and always brought our committee members home safely.

However, in early 1975, our Board began to have real concerns about the age and continued serviceability of the venerable *Black Cat*. Some members felt that the club should purchase a new committee boat; others supported the retention of *Black Cat* until proven absolutely unsafe. The controversy raged. It wasn't long before Gene Ruark acted preemptively to protect his charter arrangement with the club.

An opportunity presented itself in the form of a 27-foot Broadwater Express Cruiser, a modest pleasure boat easily convertible to yacht club duties. A special committee was appointed by the Board to assist Gene in the selection of a new committee boat and confirmed his choice of the Broadwater. The July, 1975 *Log* stated that "the new boat has a single inboard engine with power to spare, overnight accommodations for four, well equipped galley facilities, and a spacious cockpit for race committee work." This red-hulled vessel was rechristened *Wildcat*, probably in homage to the memory of her black-hulled predecessor, a floating FBYC icon for so many years.

However, the choice of the new boat was itself not without controversy. It seems that more than one of the plywood-hull Broadwaters had experienced disintegrating bottoms in turbulent waters. Had we jumped from the frying pan into the fire? Built in Maryland, the factory received a bad load of plywood in 1970 which led to lawsuits and some extremely negative press when boats sank on the Chesapeake. Doing his survey carefully, Gene concluded that the *Wildcat* was not constructed with the bad batch of wood and was able to purchase a sound boat for a pittance.

Unfortunately, I have not been able to find any pictures of the *Wildcat* in honor of which we have named our new RC launch. If any turn up, please let me know. \odot

Summer is already slipping away but it seems like we're just getting started with the Junior sailing season. The FBYC Junior Race Team is making their mark at every regatta they attend with top-level results in every fleet they challenge. So far, the team has attended nine events this season with one or more of our Juniors placing in at least the top three positions overall and in most cases one or more of the top three position in each of the Optimist subclasses. It would be tempting to attribute our team's success so far to one or two factors but in the end, we can be sure this didn't happen overnight but instead developed over a number of years. First, FBYC made a commitment over the last few years to rebuild its competitive sailing program by providing improved facilities, purchasing new boats and providing quality coaching. Through these years, the latest generation of children and parents have stepped up and learned how to participate and promote sailing as a sport that offers children an athletic challenge as worthy as soccer, baseball, tennis or any other. They've also found that by promoting sailing as a sport their children stay involved, engaged and improving their skills throughout their childhood and into adulthood. Moreover, more parents are becoming involved in helping with the program, which cannot exist without their time and effort. Parents are the driving force behind motivating children to participate and compete and to get their kids and boats to the events. Secondly, we have raised our instructional program to a new level by hiring professional coaches that bring a universe of experience gained from years of competing and coaching all over the world. Professional coaches have made an enormous difference in our team by providing regular practice sessions aimed at building basic boat handling and tactical skills along with coaching at regattas, which helps build confidence and consolidates their knowledge of the sport. Our top performers either practice or attend regattas five to six days per week and spend lots of time with the coaches working on skills. This level is coaching and practice is reflected in their competitive results and in their high level of interest and desire to make sailing their lifetime sport. We now have children traveling nationally and internationally to find the best competition and to broaden their horizons in the world. By competing elsewhere and establishing a network of coaches and sailing colleagues, they are already experienc-
