




QUARTER DECK

But this has only been possible because of a combination

of careful planning (under Mason Chapman's watchful eye), and disciplined, imaginative implementation by the Board, and the Committee and Event Chairs. We remain committed to honoring these priorities in the upcoming planning sessions. Please share any ideas you have about needs and priorities for the upcoming year with the Flag and Finance Chair, so we will have the benefit of your input in the upcoming planning season.

Most of us have a recollection of the membership process when we joined, but a less confident grasp of the current categories, process and opportunities. One of the needs we identified last year when we were looking at the survey results and the membership structure, was a readily accessible source of information about membership basics (in addition to calling Mary), so that every member would be in a position to answer basic questions about joining FBYC, when a prospective member asked questions. Steve Gillispie and Strother Scott have collaborated to meet this need by developing a "Membership FAQ" page on the Web site. Now, any time you need information about the basics, or anyone asks, you can either go yourself, or direct them to go, to the FBYC web site. Members who are logged in to the website are able to get additional information we do not make available to non-members. This resource is easy to find – there are links to "Membership" both at the top of the "Our Club" page, and in the text discussion of membership at the bottom of that page. Check it out.

Becoming a grandparent for the first time recently did not make me feel nearly as old as realizing, when I looked around at the Laser Masters regatta, that most of the competitors were a good bit younger than I am. I felt better when I also noticed that those who weren't younger than I am were out there giving the "youngsters" all they could handle, and passing on tips in the rigging area later. On any given race day, the age of the participants in our sailing events runs from 18 to 75+, and age is no indicia of who will take home the silver. There is no other sport I can think of, where youngsters, geezers, amateurs and pros can all participate as equals, or where there is greater opportunity for them to learn from each other. It's what makes sailing such a great sport and a great pastime, and what makes FBYC such a great place to pursue it.

FBYC BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

September 13, 2007

Meeting called to order at 7:15 p.m. by Secretary Steve Gillispie (awaiting arrival of Commodore Allan Heyward).

REAR COMMODORE – R. NOEL CLINARD.

TREASURER – Based on current figures, Chip Hall advised that the club should finish the fiscal year in good financial shape.

HOUSE – Wes Jones reported that after using the chairs the Board approved purchase of at the August Board meeting, 10 additional armchairs and 116 additional regular chairs were ordered, giving us a total of 130 new chairs. Members interested in purchasing the plastic chairs may contact Dixon Cole.

SOCIAL – Mike Calkins advised that the Awards Party, to be held following the Annual Meeting, will take place at the Jefferson Hotel on November 9.

GROUNDS – Mayo Tabb reported that Dixon will work on the ramp's breakwater problem and also replace the poles in

front of Fannie's House with a low fence as soon as his schedule allows.

MEMBER-AT-LARGE – Lud Kimbrough reported that the 2-day John Smith Shallop Rendezvous was a huge success with between 2,000 and 2,500 people in attendance. The event was organized by Bob Kates. Bob and the Deltaville Maritime Museum are discussing the possibility of presenting an outdoor drama next year. Chip Hall advised that he received many positive responses when eight members of the Community Advisory Board recently met and reviewed this past summer's events. Lud Kimbrough reported on our community outreach plans at the CAB meeting.

WEBMASTER – Strother Scott is pleased with the level of activity of event chairs en-

tering the names of event volunteers and appreciates the Flag and Board support.

FINANCE – Mason Chapman, Finance Committee Chair, will hold the first Finance Committee meeting by the end of September.

VICE COMMODORE – RICHARD A. BAUER, JR.

OFFSHORE DIVISION – David Hinckle reported that the Stingray Point Regatta, with 38 boats participating, was very successful. This is the first year that the Offshore Division Commander has served as the Event Chair for the regatta.

ONE DESIGN DIVISION – Tom O'Connell advised that Jon Deutsch did an outstanding job of organizing the Laser Master's Regatta held at the club September 8-9. The 33 boats were able to get in nine races and club member James Jacob was the overall winner for the 6th time. Ric Bauer reported on the 68th Annual One Design Regatta, which had a better turnout than expected based on pre-registrations. The Mobjack National Championship was held in conjunction with the AOD.

CRUISING DIVISION – George Burke reported that the Cruising Division has three more cruises scheduled for the season - a 14-day Philadelphia Cruise from September 16-30, the Captain's Choice Cruise on October 13-14, and the Wilton Creek Cruise and Party on October 20-21. A host for the Captain's Choice Cruise is needed.

JUNIOR DIVISION – Eric Powers reported that the juniors have had a very successful season and he appreciates the many volunteers and coaches who made it possible. The traveling juniors have attended 18 events and plan to attend the ACC's in Norfolk the end of September. FBYC juniors have had impressive finishes in many of the events they have attended. The coaches have returned to Argentina and we are working to have them return for the 2008 season.

FLEET LT. – Mike Dale has been contacted by a club member who is interested in donating a 27 year old powerboat to the club. Following discussion about boat needs, the Board agreed that while the club appreciates the offer of the boat, we really do not need to undertake any more boats at this time. Lud Kimbrough recommended that the member be encouraged to donate the boat to the Deltaville Maritime Museum instead.

TROPHIES – Brooks Zerkel ran a notice in the September Log requesting nominations for perpetual trophies. The cut-off date for accepting nominations is October 10 and the Trophy Committee will meet after the October Board meeting to determine the recipients of this year's perpetual trophies.

Your input for PHRF Rules Meeting

Every fall there is a meeting of the PHRF Delegates where the PHRF rules can be amended. Each certificate is entitled to one vote with a majority required for changes. With 45 boats FBYC is number 4 or 5 in total size of the clubs which represent over 1600 boats. A key area of discussion is expected to be should the PHRF "Equipment and Accommodation Rules" be updated from the obsolete ORC based standards to the newer ISF standards dominated by European interest. The reasons for changes are two fold. First, the original ORC standards were more biased towards cruisers that were raced and they don't apply very well to modern boats designed as race boats. How often has anybody used a "lead line" as to measure depth or a "fitted bucket" as a toilet? Second, there is a growing conflict between the PHRF standards and One Design class regulations that do not lend themselves to uniform application across a number of boat designs. This is especially true of interior construction details, the critical safety issue of Lifelines and class weight restrictions. This entire subject is very political in nature and I suspect that changes will be slow over time.

The second issue is PHRF High Point splits. The CBYRA High Point competition is hotly contested in northern Bay in Regions I, II and III. We are in Region IV which is divided into Region IV South which is Hampton and Region IV North which is FBYC and the Rappahannock River boats. We have traditionally had two classes – PHRF Spin Overall and PHRF Non-Spin. Last year we tried three separate classes with A up to 113, B up to 166 and C 167 and above. In general we did not have enough boats for a C start and thus had a combined B/C start. With MORC no longer active a separate C class would provide a separate start for MORC stalwarts such as J-24, S-2 etc. without having to compete with 114 rated boats. When racing with time on distance scoring, windward/leeward courses and in conditions of changing current the faster boats have an advantage over slower boats. With the present B/C fleet ranging from 114 to over 200 it is very difficult for the over 200 boats to compete effectively with the 114 rated boats. If we change to three splits we would narrow the spread in each class and hopefully have more competitive racing.

If we have enough boats PHRF would provide a First, Second and third place trophy. Since FBYC has by far the largest fleet we tend to carry the vote for Region IV North. If we elect to have three separate fleets we probably would one have enough boats in any one class to qualify for a Trophy – we would be substituting three first place trophy's for the first, second and third place. For next year I would propose that we retain the current A/B split at 113 and the B/C split at 166 that we used this year plus a one headsail non-spinnaker class.

found anywhere. There were also numerous other club members and staff who volunteered their time and support to help us staff regattas and keep the wheels on (literally) so our children could have a memorable summer. Many thanks to all of you.

FBYC Juniors slipped in one last travel event before the end of the summer attending Severn Sailing Association's End of Summer Optimist Regatta in late



August. Thirty-three Optimist sailors attended the two-day regatta held on Saturday and Sunday, August 22nd/23rd. On Saturday, the east to south-east breeze filled in nicely and the sailors slogged it out through five races in choppy seas near the mouth of the Severn River. On Sunday, the wind dropped to almost nil but eventually filled in very light and shifty from the northwest enough to sneak in three more races before the breeze went again dead. In spite of the difficult conditions, FBYC sailors captured six of the ten top overall positions starting with Alex Jacob (2nd), Austin Powers (3rd), Madeleine Alderman (4th), Kendall Swenson (6th), Conrad Roos (7th), Graeme Alderman (9th), Erin Jacob (12th) and Eric Roos (22nd). In addition, FBYC sailors grabbed one or more of the top three positions in each of the Red, Blue and White Fleets. One of the race's finest highlights and a "certified mommy/daddy moment" was when Conrad Roos and Kendall Swenson glided across the finish line in 2nd and 3rd place respectively on the fourth race. With the summer racing season now a sweet memory, the team returns home to begin preparing for the USODA Optimist Atlantic Coast Championship, which will be held in Norfolk, VA in early October.

A dream come true

Way back in 1998 Dick Cole and I held two of the most demanding Board positions, Off-shore and

One Design Race Committee Chairs. The stated guidance we received was "find race committee chairs for each scheduled event", and unstated "the best of luck"! What we had going for us was the inspired approach whereby for the first time the club had decided to use One Design racers as Race Committee Chairs for Off-shore and vice versa, with the objective of keeping more boats on the race course. We started our search in November '97 and later agreed to fill only Race Committee Chair slots and ask Chairs to use four experienced, and no more than two newcomers, as crew to increase the participation base across the membership.

Unhappily, by this time, I had filled almost all the crew slots for both One Design and Junior Race Committees, a time consuming task at best. As a result of this folly I worked with Judy Buis, our Commodore for '99, to make the Race Committee Chair task more manageable for my successor. Unhappily our proposals fell on deaf ears, and it is not appropriate at this time to discuss why. Moving forward to 2007 we have a Volunteer program in place, clearly documented in the September 2007 Log, that will allow us to:

- vastly simplify the task of Race Committee Chairs,
- allow all members to specify their volunteer preferences,
- do this early in the season, and
- manage this effort using our web based system rather than employ a clerk for \$25M/year.

Perhaps most important, rather than having a common enemy, the Race Committee Chair, to abuse we will have an inanimate object, a computer. Clearly we have a lot of learning to do as we move to a web based system, and our participation goals have been set accordingly. For example our long range plan requires we meet a goal of 80% of the membership participating in volunteer programs in 2009. We were at 40% in 2006 which included a goodly number of members excused because of age, health and domicile, and our goal for '07 was 60%. Only time will tell whether we make it, but I have my doubts.

The bottom line, we have a wonderful system that will vastly simplify recruiting "volunteers", drop the and help us meet our long term objectives, and make the task of the Race Committee Chairs at least tolerable. Our major needs are insuring all members understand and buy into our system. Equally important, that all Board members both understand, and buy into our objectives. By, David Hazlehurst



Some History Miscellany

Recently I received a surprising call from Richard Chenery, a non-member but river neighbor with a cottage on Meachim Creek off the Rappahannock River. He said he had an old chart to donate to the club and would like to meet with me the following weekend. This I eagerly agreed to do. Upstairs in the clubhouse, he opened his briefcase and presented me with an absolutely pristine July, 1943 U.S. Coast and Geodetic Survey chart of the Chesapeake Bay, Wolf Trap to Smith Point as long as I would pledge to frame and hang it in the clubhouse. Richard had acquired



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the chart, along with some others, from the widow of a retired Coast Guardsman living on the Eastern Shore.

Of course I was curious about this act of benevolence toward the yacht club. Evidently he is a history buff and had read our history postings on the website. Also, he attended one of our Leukemia Cup Regattas a few years ago as a spectator and was impressed with the historical artifacts that we display in our clubhouse. In appreciation, he wanted us to have this chart which depicted the bay area during the time that

the club was founded at Urbanna and later relocated to its present site on Fishing Bay. I suppose this demonstrates what good things can happen when the club reaches out to include members of the community at large through its various events and programs.

There are a few observations about this chart which make this chart special. Neither the Rappahannock River (Norris) Bridge nor Piankatank River Bridge are shown since they both post-date the chart. Instead the old ferry routes are designated at these locations. Ruins of the old Deltaville steamboat wharf stretching across Jackson Creek to the area of the first channel marker are shown. The wharf was destroyed in the Great Hurricane of 1933. Also, a substantially larger Grog Island is indicated at the mouth of Dyer Creek illustrating the relentless effect of erosion upon our shorelines. No doubt there are other changes that will become apparent after a more careful examination by our membership.

Later, as I was leaving my meeting with Richard Chenery, I was intercepted by Manager Dixon Cole who introduced me to a tall stranger who had just strolled over from our Jackson Creek piers. His name was Bill Noonan and a one-time junior member who left the club in 1952 after his father passed away. I immediately realized that his mother was Edna Noonan who taught me art at St. Christopher's School in the early 1960's.

Bill's family had joined the club about the time that we relocated from Urbanna, had built a Penguin, named Pogo, in their backyard, and had been active members until the father's death. Later in life, Bill moved away from the Richmond area and eventually ended up in the San Francisco area. He never lost his love of sailing, and, when he retired in 2001, he and his wife Cynthia purchased an Island Packet 380, named Crème Brule, and began sailing it from California through the Panama Canal and Caribbean and up the east coast in 3-month increments. Although his journey was nearing its end, one of his objectives was to visit FBYC for which he had so many fond youthful memories.

While berthed in Cape Charles earlier this summer, he happened to meet member Ted Bennett who also was cruising on his Island Packet 380, Pharos. Ted assured Bill that he was welcome to visit FBYC and accordingly Crème Brule became a guest at our pier. Next stop for the Noonans was to be Solomon Island from where the boat would be trucked back to San Diego and eventually sailed to a permanent berth in Puerto Vallarta, Mexico. Meanwhile, the

owners will return to their new home base on Bainbridge Island, Washington.

Before departing, they left behind a South Beach Yacht Club of San Francisco burgee and a DVD of their experiences transiting the Panama Canal. It is indeed gratifying to encounter former members such as Bill Noonan who retain their affections toward FBYC, even after half a century.

On the Sunday of the same weekend when all the above events occurred, Dave Porter, member and avid master Laser sailor, prodded my memory about a discussion we had had a year or so ago. He had told me then that his widowed mother-in-law, Betty Sue Sawyer, was a resident of a nursing home in Wilmington, Delaware and the object of romantic affections from another resident, a widower by the name of Will who claimed to have been a founding member of FBYC. Knowing the names of the founders, I knew he could not have been a founding member and could make no club connection whatever with the person that Dave described.

However, it now turns out that the Will in the nursing home was coincidentally the same Will Ransom who was the topic of two history articles in the Log last year. In those articles, I related to you the surprising circumstance of receiving a tattered FBYC burgee from Dave Ransom of Falls Church, Virginia with a note attached identifying the owner as his Father, who had died in a nursing home at age 91 and had been a loyal long time member of our yacht club. The burgee attached to a varnished pigstick was subsequently hung in the flag gallery on the second floor of the clubhouse. Nonetheless, there remained a mystery: no one at FBYC remembered Will Ransom. Research indicated that he had been an absentee member of some 40 years from 1949-1989. Except for some possible early visits during the construction of our first clubhouse on Fishing Bay, he and his family had moved from Richmond, never to return during those 40 years.

A subsequent story submitted to the Log by his son Dave explained that his family had flown the FBYC burgee on many charter boats around the world and retained their membership to obtain reciprocal privileges at the many yacht clubs they encountered in their extensive travels.

Of course this will sound trite, but it is indeed a small world, especially when the observation is applied to the sailing community.

Can you believe that we are approaching the end of another cruising season? Fall is upon us and we turn our thoughts to getting in as many cruising days as


