Meeting called to order at 6:00 p.m. by Commodore Ric Bauer. **REAR COMMODORE** C. MAYO TABB, JR. Jay Buhl announced that the co-ed sailing

team made up of stu-dents from St. Christopher's School and St. Catherine's School will be invited to race the club's 420's in the Leukemia Cup One Design Challenge on May 31. Their parents will also be invited and Jay plans for them to be in "watch" boats near the race

course. **LOG** – Jim Morrison hopes to produce a color Log by the June issue. Most of the advertisers are willing to pay higher advertising rates for color ads.

HOUSE – Ric Bauer reported for Ken Odell that the pool pavilion construction is underway. A new gas grill has been placed at Fannie's House; ceiling fans in the main clubhouse have been repaired; an interior electrical switch has been installed in the barn; the screening contractor has completed his work but some painting touch-up and cleaning remain to be done; and Richard Arnold has a crew of 10 lined up to paint the barn the weekend of June 22. Rob Slotnick advised that he and Dixon are working on ways to boost the internet signal strength in the two clubhouses.

DOCKS – David Hinckle reported that there is only one slip available and none of the nine boats on the waiting list will fit. Mayo Tabb sent word that solar lights have been installed on the outer pilings of the middle and east docks to mark them for night entry. Temporary solar lights will be installed on the pool steps until we have completed construction in the area. Five 30-amp shore power feeds on the mid-

dle dock have been re-wired. A new pump housing for the pump-out has been installed, the pump has been rebuilt and conduit has been installed for a future Mr. Roberts pump-out. A key lock and keys have been purchased and numbered keys will be issued within a month for dry sail hoist use. Arrangements will be made for One Design Fleet Measurers to use the hoist as set forth in the Rules for use of the lift facility (pages 94-95 of the Sailing Event Book).

SOCIAL – The Rosegill party will take place on May 24 beginning with cocktails from 4:00 to 5:30 in the main house, courtesy of the Alfred and Strother Scott families, followed by a meal under a tent and a party in the barn.

GROUNDS – Charles Lytton reported that asphalt patches have been applied to potholes, water cut-off boxes have been raised, and he and the landscape contractor have agreed on terms.

WEBMASTER – Strother Scott reported that the Event Managers are doing an awesome job complying with the automatic Tuesday morning emails. The names of the volunteers have even been entered in advance of the events in some cases. David Hazlehurst has been keeping track of who volunteers on a spreadsheet in an effort to make sure the volunteer load is spread out among the membership. Strother plans to replace the spreadsheet by creating web-based reports that will show who has and who has not participated, possibly in relation to the volunteer interests they expressed. Those members who have not selected their areas of interest will be encouraged to do so.

PUBLICITY – Valerie Hubbard has sent out notices about offshore events to the usual names on her distribution list and she has also been talking to various media outlets about coverage of the Leukemia Cup Regatta.

Noel encouraged the different fleets to get out as many boats as possible. Matt Braun advised that problems with getting the scores up the first week have been resolved and scoring should be up on time for the remainder of the season.

CRUISING DIVISION – The Safetyat-Sea Seminar was a sold-out event. Ed O'Connor reported that there are cruises scheduled for the month of May – the Indian Creek Cruise May 17-18, the FBYC to Rosegill and Urbanna to YPYC Cruise on Memorial Day weekend, and the Progressive Dinner Cruise on May 31-June 1.

OLD BUSINESS – Ric Bauer reported that a new house usage plan by members for private events is not ready for discussion or vote.

IN MEMORIAM MATTHEW TEMPLE BLACKWOOD 2/1/28 – 4/26/08

Matthew Temple "Tim" Blackwood of Irvington, VA passed away on April 26, 2008. He is survived by his wife, Helen (known as "Lenny"); children, Eileen, Laurie, Terry and Temple; five grandchildren; and his lifelong friend, Elise Hilbert. Of the four children, only Terry lives in Virginia. He and his wife, Mo, joined FBYC in 2000 and they have three children, Conor, Mallory and Emma. After graduating from Culver Military Academy and Cornell University, Tim served four years of active military duty and 12 years in the USMC reserves. His deep sense of responsibility to the community led to numerous volunteer activities during the years he lived in Richmond. After moving to Deltaville in 1994, he also became involved with the Virginia Institute of Marine Science (VIMS), Save the Old Piankatank, the Deltaville Library and the Middlesex County Museum. He was a founding member and first president of the Deltaville Maritime Museum and Holly Point Nature Park in Deltaville, and it is through his and others' generosity that a 240' x 8' pier will soon be constructed that will encircle the shoreline restoration area implanted last year. Tim and Lenny joined Fishing Bay Yacht Club in 1969. He served as Docks & Grounds Chair (1974), Fleet Captain (1975), Rear Commodore (1976), Vice Commodore (1977), Commodore (1978), Memberat-Large (1979), CBYRA Delegate (1993-1994), and Protest Chair (1995-1998). Tim also served as one of the club's first PHRF Handicappers. While Protest Chair, he was recognized as the undisputed expert in the intricacies of the Racing Rules of sailing and because of this, he was invited to serve as Judge at the 1995 Lightning NA's. One of the first boats owned by the Blackwood family was a Columbia 22 and all six family members would "pile in" to race/sail the boat. After that, Tim raced Lyra, an Ericson 29, and Paradox, a Tartan 37. The last time he raced Paradox was Stingray '04. Paradox was the recipient of the Performance perpetual trophy, which is awarded to the yacht finishing the greatest number of FBYC-sponsored events during the regular racing season, in 1990, 1996, 1997 and 1998. Tim also owned Myth, a Laser, and actively raced it at the club for many years. Tim's primary concern was always to share his knowledge of sailing and racing rules when the occasion arose. Sailing Green Times Past – Times Present Jere Dennison

mania for going "green." It seems today that every human activity must be wrapped in the mantle of environmental empathy with "green" being the applicable politically-correct speak. But just what is "green" as it applies to our beloved sport, sailing?

In fact, I contend that sailing is one of the "greenest" sporting endeavors that has ever existed. For untold centuries, sailors have been going "green," especially obvious when retreating to the lee rail for a bit of chumming during heavy weather and high seas. (Fearing they are going to die, but more afraid that they won't.) But, beyond that dreaded malady, sailors can rely primarily on gloriously free (and as yet untaxed) wind to power their craft around planet earth without a single pit stop at a marina to blow past credit card limits at the fuel pump. And the sailing "carbon footprint?"...it's so small that even Al Gore can't find it with an electron microscope.

Well yes, some misguided souls will say that our fiberglass hulls, carbon-fiber spars, and synthetic sails require for their production the noxious chemicals from those nasty fossil fuel molecules. However, I say we are at worst "carbon-neutral" because we save millions of

photosynthesizing trees from being harvested to support the creation of our sleek, handsome vessels. And think of the Egyptian cotton that can be u s e d t o clothe the world's needy children be-



A few historical observations about the current cause it is no longer needed for sailcloth. These facts are just not arguable and cannot be ignored. It is only fair that the owners of gas-guzzling stinkpotters be required to buy "carbon credits" from the sailing community if they insist on polluting our fair planet with their nauseating exhaust fumes. Call your Congressman to get the political ball rolling on this important environmental and (wink-wink) financial issue.

> What lessons have we learned from the past? During our last energy crisis during the 1970s, sailboats were in high demand when fuel was scarce and fuel costs soaring. Dealerships sprung up overnight to handle the increased production of many sailboat builders which no longer exist: Cal, Columbia, O'Day, Irwin, Pearson, Venture, Ranger, Erickson, Bristol, Coronado, Grampian, Morgan, and Islander to name a few. Even several FBYC club members got into the act to ride the wave of sailing's exploding popularity. Bev and Susan Crump, Drew Sinnickson, and Hobbs Goodwin established Bay Sailing Inc. which operated out of Norton's Marina. In addition to a brokerage business, lines carried included Cal, Ranger, O'Day, and the new upstart Hunter. Eventually, the business was devolved to Norton's Yacht Sales, now run by

members Ken and Carolyn Norton Schmalenberger, and has become one of the largest Hunter dealerships in the nation.

But still sailing has not regained that exalted status once enjoyed during that earlier energy crisis. What happened in intervening years was a precipitous drop in fuel costs relative to the cost of living, and this may have attracted boaters into energyhogging power barges. Maybe going "green" in combination with the non-relenting elevated cost of fuel will usher in a new golden age of sail.

Perhaps a change in terminology is needed to accelerate this reversal. In the old days, we called our cruising sailboats, Auxiliary Sailing Vessels. A simple etymological tweak here could aid our cause immensely. Let's start referring to our yachts as Wind/Diesel Hybrid Vessels, and expand our sport exponentially in harmony with the current environmental movement.
