REAR COMMODORE – C. MAYO TABB, JR. LOG – Jim Morrison will ask the publisher to send copies of the Log to the club each month.

DOCKS - David Hinckle reported that the dry sail hoist has now been repaired and that the club also obtained a back-up part. The dry sail lot is full unless the club's trailers are moved elsewhere on the property. When one of the larger slips was recently vacated, David was able to assign the slip to a boat that has been on the slip waiting list since December 2005. David plans to meet with our contractor to discuss the extension of the final one-third of the sea wall.

MEMBER-AT-LARGE Ric Bauer appointed Member-at-Large Allan Heyward to serve as Chair of the Nominating Committee for the 2009 Board. Jay Buhl, Lud Kimbrough and Ric Bauer will serve on the committee with him. Allan asked that Board members who are not interested in serving on next year's Board relay that information to him and he would also appreciate receiving recommendations for Board positions.

WEBMASTER - Strother

Scott reported that in a continuing effort to reduce the web site's SPAM problem, he and Mary Spencer have spent time cleaning up data and eliminating stale user accounts. Several of the "fbyc.net" web mailing lists that do not work with moderation have also been eliminated. Marketing to nonmembers who have signed up for club events was discussed at last month's Board meeting. Strother has prepared a link to that list of people for Ric Bauer and George Burke. He asked for feedback from Board members about possible changes to the home page of the web site. Using a printed sheet of the home page layout, he discussed each section and got a hand vote on whether to keep, move or delete each section. By making the changes, the posted articles will appear higher up on the home page and some of the lists now at the top of the page will be accessed by a link.

OPERATIONS MANAGER – Dixon Cole has completed the second pumpout for Mr. Roberts.

VICE COMMODORE – R. NOEL CLINARD

The Leukemia & Lymphoma Society presented a plaque to Fishing Bay Yacht Club for hosting the 10th Leukemia Cup Regatta. Jere Dennison will be asked to find an appropriate place for the plaque in the clubhouse. Ric Bauer advised that there were over 75 volunteers for the regatta, including many from the cruising and Wednesday Night groups and even some nonmembers.

OFFSHORE DIVISION – The final major event for 2008 is the Stingray Point Regatta. Mike Dale reported he has lined up a number of sponsors and predictably that he needs volunteers.

ONE DESIGN DIVISION - Tom O'Connell reported that 73 One Design boats and 13 Optis participated in the Annual One Design Regatta. Total revenue exceeded the total expenses for the regatta. Ric Bauer said he is seeing a new trend in our larger regattas in that we either break even or make money and attributes this to doing a better marketing job. David Hazlehurst thinks event management also has a lot to do with it. Matt Braun is Event Chair for the Indian Summer/ Sail Against SIDS Regatta on October 4. His goal is to have at least 35 One Design boats plus Juniors in 420's and Optis participating.

CRUISING DIVISION – Ed O'Connor reported that there were three boats on the Grog Cruise and that 10 boats participated in the Cruise Regatta. The Leonard Creek Cruise was cancelled. Upcoming cruises include the Tides Inn Rendezvous, Captain's Choice Cruise and a 2-week cruise beginning September 14 organized by Sam Stoakley. The final September cruise is a Race to the Crab Feast in Reedville.

JUNIOR DIVISION — Eric Powers reported that 16 Juniors have participated in the extended program in about 12 traveling events. All nine of the Juniors who went to the Opti Nationals qualified for Spring Trials next year. The YMCA Sailing Camp was held this week at the club. One Junior coach will leave on August 24 and the other leaves on August 28, bringing an end to a very busy and very successful season.

TROPHIES – A notice requesting perpetual trophy nominations will be in the September and October Logs. Nominations should be sent to Blackwell Nottingham.

CBYRA – Tom Roberts reported that CBYRA is now helping clubs promote and plan their regattas by offering online registration through their website. This could become the standard way to register for a regatta. Our club could use it as a supplement to our own for regatta registration for events. U.S. Sailing sent a representative to the last CBYRA Board meeting and reported they have applied for a grant from Homeland Security to fund a program to assist with education of the DHS Waterways Watch program that will teach those on the water to recognize problems and how to contact authorities. This is especially important in the Hampton Roads area.

PARTICIPATION – David Hazle-hurst recommended that we look for ways to improve recruitment of members to build fences, paint barns or whatever needs doing to supplement the efforts of those who regularly attend the Spring and Fall clean-ups. David advised that the names of all of the volunteers at the 69th Annual One Design Regatta have been recorded online and that these include more than the usual number of new members. He has found a volunteer to help him with our annual participation records.



In addition, Strother's program has the potential for further reducing this onerous task. Because VCU is a relatively untapped resource for crew candidates and possibly new members, David has been working with two crew candidates from their Education Department and has developed leads with their Student Development/Sports Clubs Director.

OLD BUSINESS – Alex Alvis was asked last year to keep up with the status of the dredging of the Jackson Creek channel. He reported that shoaling hasn't increased too much this year but the depth and width of the channel is well below what it should be. He talked with the newly-appointed project manager and learned that nothing is scheduled for the Jackson Creek project. Alex will write a letter to the Corps of Engineers Division in an attempt to get the survey made because that will help us know where dredging needs to be done. The Corps of Engineers and Middlesex County together are responsible for the channel.

NEW BUSINESS – Ric Bauer presented to the Board a new perpetual trophy entitled the "Becca Boat Trophy." By motion duly made and seconded, the Board accepted this trophy to be awarded beginning in 2008. (See related article elsewhere in Log.). Tom Roberts thanked the club for allowing the Mobjack Nationals to be held in connection with the Annual One Design Regatta and requested permission to hold the 50th anniversary meeting at the club on the weekend following the 2009 AOD. Ric Bauer was not sure the Board could commit to that date this soon but that the Sailing Events Committee could certainly try to allow that date when the schedule is made for next year's events.

There being no additional business, the meeting was adjourned at 7:45 p.m.

Web Report

pam Problem - We are still working on our spam problem and the results are still not where we want them. For example, we learned one of our forwards was forwarding about 20 spam messages per day to a member, but because he had a good spam filter, it was not a big deal for him. The best start we can give our young sailors

Good sailing genes and committed parents have to rank high on the list. Couple that with a Junior program that continuously improves and there is no stopping some of our young sailors. It's easy to recognize good boat handling and an aggressive attitude on the race course and I've had the privilege of seeing this close up on the nonspinnaker course at our Annual One Design Regatta for most of the last 10 vears. Kyle Swenson was obviously a comer based on what I saw last year when he edged out two ladies, one his mother, sailing a Laser Radial. This year he went on to beat all but three adults in the Laser District 11 championships; compete results for this event have been posted on the club web site. Anthony Kupersmith was our last Junior to place so well in this event when it was sailed at Hampton YC

some seven years ago; unhappily he sails on the northern Bay but was with us for the first Summer Seabreeze Regatta in June.

F o r t unately for our Juniors we start them off as Opti Kids with their parents alongside them in the water for two days; what better start? As they

move on to our extended race program and travel to other clubs, both on the Bay and further afield, they are supported by a cadre of par-

ents, their own or parents of other sailors, who put in untold hours helping their offspring compete against the best young sailors they can find. It's interesting also to see how many younger siblings join their elders in this activity. A cynic could say the "youngers" have to go along because the parents can't be in two places at once but I've yet to see any evidence whatsoever of younger juniors expressing displeasure at being on the water at any time. It's even hard to keep some of them off.

Aside from sailing single handed on Optimists and Lasers some of our young sailors move on to race double handed on 420's or other classes, sometimes with their parents, and some few race on off-shore boats while continuing to compete with other juniors in their chosen One Design class. I don't know what happens to the family that sails together but they certainly have an interesting time. I vividly remember going to the US Sailing One Design Sailing Symposium in Annapolis in November, 2006 where the discussion on the final day was how to get more sailors on the water. One question we were asked was "how do you compete with soccer and other sports"? One mother answered "that's easy, my family know what they are going to do each summer, that's sail". It may not always be as easy as that for some families particularly if they are already going in different directions. But if you pay for a membership in a club with great facilities and a good Junior program it makes no sense not to use it. Come join in, you will be get a warm welcome, all the help you could possibly want, and I doubt you'll ever regret it.





ONLY ONE RACE LEFT IN DISTANCE SERIES

t 1400 hrs., August 16, 11 brave Offshore skippers and crews set off into an almost breathless afternoon, hoping to beat the time limit and claim honors in this year's Smith Point Race, the fourth race in the five-race Distance Series. As the seven Spinnaker boats headed North on the "B" course and the

Non-Spin b o a t s headed East on the "C" course, the race committee sat for almost two hours, enjoying the beautiful afternoon and watching the boats sail. The only problem was that after almost two hours, the race committee could still see the boats.

As the sun was setting, the full moon was rising, and with the clear skies, visibility was exceptional. It was a perfect evening for a sail, except for the wind. On August 9-10, FBYC held its 69th Annual One Design Regatta. Over 80 boats attended including four 420s, six Albacores, twenty-three Flying Scots, nine Front Runners, seven Mobjacks, four Hampton One Designs, twelve Lasers, five Laser Radials (including four Juniors of which three were Girls) and thirteen Optis (of Fleets, two were Red, seven were Blue, four were White and one was Green). Joining the regatta for the first time were four San Juan 21s, led from afar by FBYC's Mike Chesser. The Mobjacks combined the Event with their 2008 National Regatta, beginning early on Friday for a three day championship regatta for that class.

The regatta was sailed on three courses with separate Race Committees chaired by Rick Klein, David Hazlehurst and Joe Roos. The Albacores, 420s, Lasers, Radials, and the Optis, sailed in the Piankatank River and in Fishing Bay both days, with Sunday having a light thermal breeze. 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



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
