Last month I described the austerity measures the Club would implement in light of the economic storms on the horizon. Already this past month, we have implemented that cautious approach by postponing deferrable renovation on the bottom of *Mr. Roberts* for a year and selecting the least expensive repair approach to the engine for *Wildcat*, which burned a cylinder. But, apart from these financial reef points, the club continues to beat to windward on the usual course.

As usual, the winter watch is working hard on the Sailing Events Schedule under the leadership of Vice Commodore Mayo Tabb. The most recent draft of that Schedule appears elsewhere in this issue of the *Log*. In the next six weeks they will be finalizing that schedule and printing the Sailing Events Book for 2009, so if you spot any conflicts they may have missed, please let Mayo know immediately.

In parallel to the Sailing Events Committee work, Mary Spencer will be

revising the Yearbook for 2009 as well. In particular, the new Yearbook will include changes to the club protocol for recognition of One Design Fleets. Mayo Tabb and Jere Dennison are chairing a special committee to update the provisions in the Yearbook and Bylaws to reflect the identities of one design fleets which remain active at the club, new offshore one design fleets such as the J-105s which have sought recognition, and to address the process for changing the status of increasingly inactive fleets and the related storage fees for non-fleet or inactive fleet boats. However, as indicated last month in this column, no storage fees will increase this year.

To take advantage of the lull in capital expenditures this year, Tom O'Connell, last year's One Design Division Commander and this year's Docks Chair is chairing another long term, special Fishing Bay Dock Committee to consider design alternatives for a new dock on Fishing Bay. That committee will work in phases, including an orientation phase in which old design proposals and long range land use plans will be reviewed, a discussion phase to identify the needs of the one design and junior divisions, a final planning phase, a member and community input phase, a permitting phase, a bid solicitation and contracting phase, and culminating with a construction phase in the Winter of 2010-2011. Upon the recommendation of the Community Advisory Board ("CAB"), our non-member neighbor Robert Whitehurst, has been asked to participate in the committee's work as a representative of the CAB. Our member neighbors, the Jacob and Swenson families have also been included, as has Ed O'Connor, our Cruising Division Commander. We have assured the CAB that the mission of this committee is to plan for less congested one design and junior launching and recovery, not large boat slips or long term mooring.

Set forth in this issue are several articles by Jay Buhl, Junior Division Commander, regarding the extraordinary plans for the junior program this year, the bios of the exceptional national and international coaches, and the planned organization of the junior parents to spread the enormous responsibilities. Special thanks to all those people who will be the heart and pulse of this year's program, too many to list here. The junior program has special meaning to me, because I took that divisional path in the club. The program is about to round the mark for a new leg of the course begun many years ago by recent Junior Division leaders Lud Kimbrough, Jan Monnier, and Kelly O'Toole, and continuing with Ruthanna Jenkins, myself and Eric and Danelle Powers. The sailors who were young enough to be amused by my ridiculous appearance as "OptiMan" pictured above, a children's "superhero" based on "Artie" in the show Pete & Pete, and play "pooperscooper" in the "Dog Days Regatta" now sail on national teams and are almost ready to "age out" into interscholastic or collegiate competition. While continuing to serve those exemplary juniors in their finest hour, one primary focus of this year's program will be to entice a new generation of young sailors to join the fun and glory. Since it cannot be pointed out too many times, please note NOW that Junior Week and Opti-Kids have slipped one week in the sailing events calendar to accommodate later school closings in 2009 and SAVE THE DATE.

REAR COMMODORE – DAVID S. HINCKLE SECRETARY – George Burke named the members of his Membership Committee: Alex Alvis, Lyons Burke, David Hazlehurst, David Hinckle, Susan O'Connell, Ed O'Connor, and Carrie Russell. HOUSE – Ken Odell reported that the floor in the pump house is too low and concrete will be poured to raise the level.

DOCKS – Tom O'Connell has named a committee to put together plans for a new Fishing Bay dock. He expects to have a working plan in place by the end of 2009. The date construction will begin will then depend on when the club is financially able to go forward with the project.

LONG RANGE – Lud Kimbrough has identified an "oyster farmer" who will help us with an oyster-planting program. The VMRC requires us to plant oysters to preserve our leases and we will do so in the early Spring.

WEBMASTER – Strother Scott has hired a pro to help him with the navigation improvements on the web site. When completed, there will be cascading lists when you "mouse over" the links in the banner. Jon Deutsch fixed a problem with Mary Spencer's email so that the notices going to club members will now show that they are coming from execute (a by the strother than from her personal email

OPERATIONS MANAGER -

Dixon Cole has been making repairs to the well and working with Wes Jones about water system issues.

VICE COMMODORE – C. MAYO TABB, JR. FLEET CAPTAIN – Allan Heyward is making plans for a seminar in March on the New Rules of Racing as well as crew training classes and PRO and race management seminars.

OFFSHORE DIVISION - Alex

Alvis advised that just under half of the PRO's for next year's offshore races have been identified and that Rick Klein is working on dates for PRO and race management seminars. **ONE DESIGN DIVISION** – Matt Braun expects to have Fleet Captains lined up for the one design fleets on time. He will inventory the boats in the small boat lot when the weather warms up. Travis Weisleder has loaded JavaScore and believes he will be able to use the program. Matt Lambert is using the web volunteer lists to obtain telephone numbers and email addresses of members who have indicated a willingness to serve as PRO's for one design races.

CRUISING DIVISION - Ed O'Connor reported that six events for 2009 have Chairs and they hope to have at least six additional cruising events. A planning meeting has been scheduled. JUNIOR DIVISION - Jay Buhl discussed the 2009 Junior Division Organizational Structure and reported that two Junior coaches have been hired for the coming year. Peter Strong will serve as the Opti Race Team Coach and Alejandro Coos will serve as the Laser Race Team Coach. Club members will be taking responsibility for various aspects of the Junior program (see related article elsewhere in the Log).

FLEET LT. – Jim Poindexter is working with Dixon on repairs to the Wildcat motor. A piston was blown because of an obstruction in the fuel lines. Mayo Tabb advised that we need to install some big auxiliary filters because the only gas now avail-

able for use in Deltaville contains ethanol and it is causing major problems with boat motors. The bottom of *Mr. Roberts* will be painted but some other work has been deferred.

PROTEST – Brooks Zerkel is putting together a "protest panel" to hear protests next year and also plans to hold training sessions using the newest rules book and other materials.

OLD BUSINESS - Noel Clinard reported that Mayo Tabb is chairing a committee to study and establish club policy concerning use of the clubhouse for private events by members. The committee will set up guidelines if it is determined that the clubhouse will be available. Noel asked Mayo Tabb and Jere Dennison to chair a fleet committee to make recommendation about our one design fleet provisions as they now exist, determine what to do about the J-24 one design fleet status, suggest fee plans, and address the establishment of one design fleets. The committee will make recommendations about offshore one design fleets and the issues that must be worked out before the Board can act on the request by the J-105 Fleet for active fleet status.

NEW BUSINESS - Mayo Tabb introduced a Bylaws change relating to the make up of the Sailing Events Committee. Upon Motion duly made and seconded, the Board approved the following Bylaws change:

RESOLUTION CHANGING THE MEMBERS OF THE SAILING EVENTS COMMITTEE FIND-INGS AND RATIONALE: Since the list of Board members who make up the Sailing Events Committee does not include more recently established Board positions, the list of members needs to be increased to include the Cruising Division Lieutenant Commander, the Junior Division Commander, the Junior Division Commander, the Junior Division Division Race Chair

RESOLUTION RESOLVED, that the Bylaws be amended to include the Cruising Division Lieutenant Commander, the Junior Division Commander, the Junior Division Lieutenant Commander and the Junior Division Race Chair on the permanent list of members of the Sailing Events CommitteeProposed and X_adopted/_rejected by vote of the Trustees of Fishing Bay Yacht Club this 11th day of December 2008.

There being no additional business, the meeting was adjourned at 6:50 p.m.

Join the Opti Development Team (ODT) - 2009

Read This..... If you have children between the ages of 9-12 or want to sail in a program that is not as rigorous and the Opti Race Team

Schedule - Practice Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday following Junior week for 3-4 hours per day. Practice Starts June 25th, following Junior Week and runs through mid August.

ODT Coach – Cori Radtke - Dedicated Coach whose skill set is aligned with this category of sailors.

Parental Commitment - Program Fee \$250. Regatta schedule will be defined by the parents and sailors of the ODT. Parents will be expected to be responsible for travel logistics to include Optis and the Coach Boat which will be provided.

ODT Coordinator - Ted Steadman

Sign Up Deadline April 1st 2009 - Purpose for the deadline is to understand interest so we can plan for coaching, understand finances, review travel schedules etc. Deciding you want to be part of the program June 1st does not allow enough planning time for a high quality program.

Why Join the ODT?.....

This program is a great follow up to Junior Week, a great introduction to next level of sailing, and provides a glimpse of what the Race Team is all about without such a large financial investment and time commitment. ODT is a low risk minimal investment program that will help you gauge whether or not your kids want to take sailing to the next level.

Over the past 5 years the FBYC Junior Sailors and the Race Team Program have become well known and respected not only on the Chesapeake Bay, but in the junior sailing community across the United States. Developing and sustaining a first class Race Team Program remains a top priority for our club, our board, and is articulated in the FBYC Long Range Plan. There are three key ingredients that make up a successful program: 1. Commitment from the Yacht Club, 2. First Class Coaches, and 3. Parental Commitment.. Financial commitment and leadership will drive the provision of First Class Coaches. The most critical ingredient is commitment from the Parents. Ask any current or past member of either the Opti or Laser Race Teams what this means. It is a lot of work and is very rewarding. But the real reward is the experience our sailors are provided.

The ODT is a low key way for parents and sailors to test the waters. Members of the Race Team did not just wake up one day and decide they wanted to spend their summer practicing and traveling to regattas. The kids desire and dedication to sailing happened over time. The *kids* decided this is what they wanted. Once they are hooked, parents need to hang on!! You should go for it!

I'm Pisces By Reverend Bill Egelhoff

Sometimes I wonder if in my former life I was a fish. So much of my life over the past 90 years seems to have revolved around water. Maybe it began with my baptism, though I don't remember that.

What I do remember as a nine year-old was learning to swim at Kamp Kaaterskill in Vermont. It was on Barber's Pond where blood suckers patrolled the shore. The sooner we learned to swim, the sooner we could swim away from the blood suckers. We all learned quickly so we could navigate the deeper water.

My ability to swim prompted Dad to teach my brother and me to sail. So in 1930 we had our first sail boat, a Ricelake sailing canoe which we learned to sail on Lake Erie outside Buffalo. If nothing else we learned how to capsize a canoe.

Other than ferry boat rides each summer from Buffalo over to Crystal Beach, a wonderful amusement park across Lake Erie in Canada, my next sail occurred in 1927 on my parents' 15th wedding anniversary. To celebrate they took brother Bob and me for a repeat of their honeymoon. From Buffalo we took a sleeper to Milwaukee to visit Dad's extended family there, then on to New Orleans, staying in the elegant Maison Blanc hotel. After a few days' exploration we boarded a ship bound for New York City. It was January and the Gulf of Mexico was not calm. So this was my first and only taste of sea sickness. But it was worth it — I couldn't believe how big the Atlantic Ocean was, particularly for an 8 year-old.

The summer of 1936 I really 'went to sea' with a job as third steward on the *Juanita*, a passenger ship plying the Great Lakes from Buffalo to Duluth and return. It was an 8 day cruise, stopping along the way at such places as Sault Sainte Marie, the Sault Locks, connecting Lakes Superior and Huron, as well as a stop at scenic Mackinaw Island, where no cars were allowed. As third steward I proudly wore a uniform and officer's cap. My job was to assign dining room seats for the passengers and serve as the magician's assistant. As such I had my head chopped off in the guillotine. It was great fun and I was paid \$50 a month, a lot of money back then!

Three years later after our junior year at Williams College another friend and I boarded the British freighter, *Cairnmona* in Montreal for a summer of biking through England and Europe on the eve of World War II. Other than dodging icebergs in the North Atlantic the crossing was routine and uneventful, as was the food in the officers' mess. There was no question, biking through Germany, that the Nazi *Wehrmacht* was prepared. It seemed that we were always

just one step ahead of their troops. One day, we biked along a prison wall in Dachau, only to learn later that we'd passed the notorious concentration camp.

September 2nd we boarded another British freighter, *Cairnross*, in Leith, outside Edinburgh, heading home. The next day the ship's wireless operator called us twelve passengers to meet with the officers to hear Prime Minister Chamberlain declare war on Germany. With the British National anthem ended, the Captain informed us we were at war and under his command. His first order was for us all to join him with a drink. It was about the last thing I wanted at that point.


The wireless operator further informed us that a German U-boat had torpedoed the British passenger liner *Athenia* 80 miles to the south. As if that wasn't enough, the Captain added that if the U-boat headed due north it would cross our bow at midnight. Naturally we stayed up most of that night! From that point on we zigzagged across the North Atlantic all the way to Montreal without an incident. Three months later both of those freighters were resting on the bottom of the ocean.

WWII found me in the Navy at NAS Quonset Point, R.I., where I sailed Lightnings over at the Naval Base in Newport. My big-time sailing, however, was as air ordinance

officer aboard the newly commissioned aircraft carrier *Midway* in the North Atlantic near the end of the war.

Peacetime brought sailing Penguins in Hampton Roads at the Norfolk Yacht Club with Joe Kelly, one of FBYC's earliest members. With the early '80s, Dot and I proudly joined Fishing Bay Yacht Club and soon I was serving as Club Chaplain. Our first daysailor as members was a beautiful Hampton One, #138, one of Mr. Serio's originals. Before long we were proud owners of *C'est La Vie*, an Aquarius 23, allowing us easy beaching up and down the Piankatank. From the Aquarius we soon moved on to our O'Day 28, *Liebchen*, for many memorable cruises on Chesapeake Bay. Highlights were sailing over to Onancock where my Episcopal ministry began at Holy Trinity Church.

The late '70s opened up another "sailing chaplaincy," serving as chaplain on cruise ships. In the past 30 years Dot and I have enjoyed over 35 cruises, ranging from a week to over several months. We've sailed the Caribbean, the Pacific, to Alaska, the Pacific, the Atlantic, the Mediterranean, the Black Sea, the Baltic, the Artic, Round the Horn, and to French Polynesia, and too many ports to mention. Needless to say, we never get tired of being on the water. It's good I'm a Pisces and that Dot loves the water too.





