In early July, with great pride, we hung a commemorative plaque celebrating that incredible accomplishment. The plaque was made possible through the efforts of a group designing, manufacturing and framing the plaque, including Jere Dennison, Steve Gillispie, Chip Hall, and, of course, our Executive Secretary Mary Spencer. As I previously communicated, we quickly learned to our chagrin that a number of donors were inadvertently omitted from the plaque due to clerical errors in moving the donor names from spreadsheets to the document which became the plaque. We apologize again for these omissions. The plaque has been taken down until it can be corrected and promptly replaced. Thanks to those same volunteers, and Mary, who are working hard to make it right.

Despite the challenging economic environment, the 11th Annual Southern Chesapeake Leukemia Cup Regatta, (from the co-chaired beginning years ago) by Judy Buis and Carolyn Schmalenberger, and supported by a large committee of FBYC members and others from co-host Stingray Harbor Yacht Club and the community, succeeded in raising over \$160,000 in contributions and gifts in kind for the Special additional recognition cure. goes to members Carolyn and Joe Schott for food preparation, service and logistics, Jere Dennison for publicity, Rear Commodore David Hinckle for being primary FBYC liaison, and other members of the Regatta Committee from FBYC and elsewhere.

As reported in more detail within, FBYC again provided facilities, boats and coaches for the Middlesex Family YMCA youth sailing program. The YMCA and FBYC are especially grateful to Dr. Ron David for funding a number of scholarships for disadvantaged local youth to this important outreach program, and to Steve Gillespie for taking the children out on his yacht *Gratitude*.

TREASURER – Chip Hall presented the Treasurer's Report and advised that the club is purchasing a new motor for one of the powerboats. David Hinckle advised that the club is going forward with the remaining portion of the bulkhead project.

DOCKS – Tom O'Connell reported that one slip became available this week and he will re-assign it to a boat on the waiting list.

SOCIAL – Michael Calkins thanked Nica and Jeremy Waters for chairing the July 4th cookout. There were approximately 70 people in attendance.

<u>GROUNDS</u> – Temporary repairs have been made to the grass ramp. The ramp will be re-graded and seeded in the Fall.

MEMBER-AT-LARGE – Ric Bauer reported that a new Laser rack has been built and there is room to prepare more sail lockers in the barn now that the original lockers have been rented. Ric has been in contact with the Deltaville Fire Department and Rescue Squad to determine if any of their members own tractors that they would be willing to use for launching boats during the Annual One Design Regatta.

The Cruise Regatta is scheduled for July 25. August cruises include the Tides Inn Cruise and the Corrotoman River Cruise to Gordon Nelson's home. Ed read a thank you letter from the Ocean Cruising Club members who anchored in Jackson Creek on June 2-3 and used the club's facilities. George Burke discussed the plans for the July 26 Safety and Seamanship Seminar and advised that it would be beneficial for cruisers and racers to attend.



FBYC JUNIOR SAILING PROGRAM OPTI KIDS AND JUNIOR WEEK A RECORD-BREAKING SUCCESS!

This year's Opti Kids program succeeded in inspiring another generation of junior sailors, despite often rainy and windy conditions. Thirty-two brave young sailors set out Saturday, June 13th for two weekends of top-notch sailing instruction from Cori Radkte, assisted by Chris Rouzie, Boyd Clary, and a small army of

parents and grandparents. Thankfully, most shrieks this year were joyous, as there were few stinging nettles in Fishing Bay.

Junior Week began on a gourmet note, with a delicious low-country boil for the Coaches Dinner hosted by Commodore Clinard, Meg Clinard, and their children. It was a beautiful evening and bode well for the week, which commenced with clear skies and an easy 5-10 knots of breeze. Dixon Cole and Paul Howle, aided by Ted Steadman, Art Wildman and Charlie Jones had an armada of motor boats launched, fueled up and ready to go daily. Mark Hayes, Paul Almany, and Nica Waters, assisted by Margaret Patterson, Neil Quimby, Mitchell Webb, and several other helpful parents did a terrific job teaching the 29 Beginner Opti sailors the fundamentals of sailing. Capsizing Optis, sinking Mark's kayak, treasuring hunting, and chasing greased watermelons were all part of the fun, in addition to the more serious work of rigging, knot-tying, learning points of sail, and actually sailing around the octopus mark. Cori Radtke and Boyd Clary, very ably assisted by Alex Jacob, Austin Powers, and Philip Halsey introduced a large Intermediate Opti sailing class of 22 to more advanced sailing skills and basic racing, interspersed with occasional watergun fights, tubing and capsizing drills to keep things light.

Fourteen Racing Opti sailors were fortunate to spend their days soaking up the wisdom and sailing brilliance of U.S. National Opti Team Coach Peter Strong, who was assisted by our own Ben Buhl. The class enjoyed a week of advanced instruction, targeted drills and challenging racing, as did the eight sailors in the Racing Laser class, headed by the talented Alejandro Cloos. The excellent finishes of the Opti and Laser Race Team participants in the regattas following Junior Week evidence the outstanding coaching provided to our sailors by Peter and Alejandro.

Mike Toms and Carrie Russell taught the eight novice 420 sailors the basics and more about double-handed sailing. Their lessons that included advanced sailing physics, such as sailing without a rudder and how to sail blindfolded. Jeremy Waters, Terry Blackwood, and Don Wood all did an exceptional job of introducing the thirteen Group Sailing participants to an array of multi-handed boats, including the Mobjack, Flying Scot and 420. Matt Braun loaned both his Front Runner and his talent to the class; likewise, Art and Jo Wildman kindly took all interested Group Sailors out for an afternoon of exceptionally light air sailing on their Beneteau, Wildwind. If appearances are an

accurate indicator, the Group Sailors learned much, including how to fly spinnakers on a range of boats. In all, Junior Week was an exceptional week of learning and fun, thanks to the incredible generosity and talent of numerous volunteers, both on the water and on shore. In particular, FBYC and all the junior week participants want to recognize Jay Buhl and Noel Clinard. Their experience, attention to detail and tireless efforts insured the week's success.


