We should be very proud of the Annual One Design and Virginia State Championship Junior Regattas just hosted at FBYC. The winds for 100 or more boats were light and shifty, but the three separate race committees got off 5 to 8 races on each course: (1) Flying Scots, Front Runners, Mobjacks, Albacores, Mobjacks, San Juan 21s and Typhoons; (2) Lasers, Radials and 420s, and (3) Optis. But the *piece de resistance* was the splendid activity on shore. The written "thank you" notes of three guests sum it up, on and off the water.

"Hi there! I attended the regatta this past weekend at FBYC with my son and other juniors. What a pleasure it was to visit your club. This was our first regatta and it was a fabulous experience. The members and staff were wonderful and we will be sure to attend events as often as we can at FBYC."

"WOW...our blue fleet – Opti sailor had a blast!!! He met some really nice people and was able to sail with good friends!! We saw Fishing Bay for the first time – I promise it won't be the last...your hospitality was phenomenal!!!"

These kudos were well deserved by a huge group of dedicated volunteers. The dual adult/junior event was Co-Chaired by Mayo Tabb and Jay Buhl, with Rick Klein as Race Committee Chair, and John Hubbard (assisted by his friend, Jim Strickland, the entire Hubbard clan, and over 60 volunteers) as Social Chair. It is not possible to name everyone, but stalwart group leaders included Mary Buhl at registration, Meg Clinard at apparel, Ric Bauer and his team in the boat yard and parking field, Sharon Bauer at breakfast, Mike and Amy Miller directing bar tenders who froze their fingers selling Margueritas, numerous race committee members, boat donors and operators, including James and Barbara Jacob, Jay Buhl, Steve and Jacie Swenson, Cathy Clark, Mike Dale and many others, Betsy Murphy in the kitchen, Dixon on his tractor, and other unsung heroes who cleaned up the mess. What a performance!

A few statistics tell the tale: 25 gallons of frozen Margueritas, 700 pieces of chicken, 12 gallons of Gazpacho, 1,100 pounds of ice, 12 strings of Christmas lights, 2 paper lanterns, 15 tablecloths, 287 pieces of regatta apparel, 9 race committee boats and 1 Marguerita machine.

Speaking of performances, we were entertained by Kevin Davis and his steel band *Ban Caribe* who played a repertory of Caribbean and modern tunes under the tree canopy overlooking Fishing Bay, its limbs festooned with strings of white lights and paper lanterns by John Hubbard and David Neff. The setting was so extraordinary that Kevin described it as the most beautiful he has played in, and asked for a picture for his next promotional piece. So, if anyone captured the tinkling and twinkling magic on film, please send it to Jon Deutsch.

Feeding over 300 for dinner did tax the capacity of our kitchen and underscore the need for increased space and equipment, particularly for refrigeration and dishwashing. Among the observations of kitchen workers was to ask whether the "Members' Kitchen" portion of the Main Clubhouse is used sufficiently (as distinguished from the commercial kitchen or the Members' Kitchen in Fannies) to justify continued preservation of that space for private use. If you are an unrecognized private user of that member kitchen space in the main clubhouse and have a contrary view, I'd like to hear from you.

The launching and recovery of the large fleet also reinforced the need for improvement to our facilities on Fishing Bay. Continuing years of work by several "special" committees looking into One Design needs, another such committee, chaired by Tom O'Connell, is currently studying increases to the capacity of the One Design dock by lengthening the lateral space alongside the dock and installing some form of hoist apparatus to reach both sides of the dock. One preliminary concept was posted at the regatta to get input from One Design sailors and neighbors, and more will be discussed as we approach the end of the sailing season with our awards dinner on Saturday, November 7 (Reminder: the dinner will be at the James River Clubhouse of the Country Club of Virginia, NOT the Westhampton Clubhouse).

By the time you read this, David Hinckle and his own band of volunteers will have done it again at the Stingray Regatta.

Meeting called to order at 6:05 p.m. by Commodore Noel Clinard.

REAR COMMODORE – DAVID S. HINCKLE

HOUSE – Gutters have been installed on the pool pavilion and hooked to drain tile, the upstairs east balcony floor has had fiberglass repair, and there has been some touch-up paint work in the main clubhouse. Ken Odell expects to replace the concrete outside the clubhouse bathrooms in September. Ken advised that parents should check the lost and found box by the pool and club members should be reminded of the "NO DOG" policy.

DOCKS – Noel Clinard displayed a poster showing the emerging favorite design for a Fishing Bay dock based on deliberations by the Special Docks Committee. The poster will be on display during the Annual One Design Regatta. Noel reiterated that this is not a final design and he will encourage members to ask questions or offer suggestions and comments.

<u>GROUNDS</u> – Mike Dale will set a date for Fall Clean-Up Day.

WEB – Strother Scott gave a refresher course about the online registration system to educate the Board on some of the basic elements of the system that need to be understood when planning and managing events. He explained what our "deadline" means, and that the early discount, if any, terminates at the deadline. He described what items need to be included in the online registration set up and how we handle disclosure of prices and early bird discounts. There was a general discussion by the Board agreeing that we should develop a more consistent strategy with regard to the normal deadline (usually 2-9 days before the event) and the early bird pricing discount (usually none to 15-30) but no specific changes were recommended.

<u>VICE COMMODORE – C.</u> MAYO TABB, JR.

CRUISING DIVISION – Ed O'Connor reported that 12 boats participated in the Cruise Regatta and over 60 people enjoyed dinner at the club following the regatta. The Safety and Seamanship Seminar had to be canceled and could not be re-scheduled for this year. Four boats took part in the Tides Inn Cruise. There are four remaining cruises for 2009: Corrotoman River Cruise, Mid-Bay Cruise, Crab Feast Cruise and the Wilton Creek Cruise.

JUNIOR DIVISION – Jay Buhl reported that the Race Team Schedule for 2009 has been completed. There will be a race team dinner at the club on August 14 and gifts will be presented to the coaches, who will be leaving on Monday. This weekend the Virginia State Championships will be held at the club in conjunction with the Annual One Design Regatta. Jay has been trying to come up with sailing options for the junior racers for the Fall and discussed several options. The junior racers also are interested in participating in a number of Winter regattas.

NEW BUSINESS –Noel Clinard (1) advised that in addition to budget recommendations, Board members need to be thinking about their year-end reports; (2) changes have been made to the donor plaque list based on member response and the revised list will be in the September Log; (3) reported that FBYC has been asked to participate with Hampton Yacht Club and Norfolk Yacht & Country Club in obtaining a perpetual trophy that will be presented to the overall winner at the Virginia State Championships, with the trophy being displayed in the home club of each year's winner; (4) appointed Ric Bauer as Chair of the Nominating Committee (Committee members are the current Flag Officers, the three most current Past Commodores and the Junior Division Commander; and (5) advised that he will be in communication with Judy Hawksworth concerning an appropriate gift that she would like to donate to commemorate John Hawksworth's contributions to the Junior program at FBYC.

Mayo Tabb reported that it has been determined that the club needs to add leak detection to the water system and that will take place later in the year.

Chip Hall discussed his observations about serving on race committee recently aboard Mr. Roberts and suggested that the club should have one person solely in charge of Mr. Roberts. The issue is two-fold in that it concerns care of the boat as well as having race committee equipment on the boat ready when the committee shows up to do its job. There was a general discussion by Board members with most being of the opinion that the Fleet Lt. should remain responsible for Mr. Roberts. However, some consideration could be given to putting the Division Race Chairs in charge of seeing that the race committee equipment is ready for use before each race.

There being no additional business, the meeting was adjourned at 7:15 p.m.

Membership DEATH: Mrs. Jane T. Anderson In Memoriam JANE T. ANDERSON 4/5/44 - 7/22/09 Mrs. Jane T. Anderson, 2001 Garland Estates Court, Richmond, VA 23229, died on July 22, 2009 in the Hospice Unit at Retreat Hospital. Jane is survived by her husband of 42 years, the Rev. Dr. Douglas L. Anderson; daughter and son-in-law, Leslie and Matthew Straw; son and daughter-in-law, Barclay and Kelli Anderson; granddaughter, Laura Jane Straw; and brother, William P. Thurman, Jr. Jane and Doug met when they were attending the University of Richmond. After graduating in 1966, she served as the Acting Director of Religious Activities at Westhampton College until moving to Kentucky in 1968. She was a child adoption social worker for the Kentucky Department of Child Welfare and an Adoption Specialist for the Kentucky Baptist Board of Child Care while living there. Jane and Doug moved to Nashville, TN in 1976 where she helped found the Second Harvest Food Bank. In 1986, she became the Medical Staff Coordinator and the Volunteer Staff Coordinator at a Nashville HCA hospital. Following Doug's retirement in 2005, Jane and Doug moved back to Richmond to be near their children and Jane worked at Retreat Hospital and Henrico Doctor's Hospital (both HCA hospitals) in Physicians' Services until her death. Their daughter lived nearby and Jane often went for morning walks with her. Jane was so pleased to be able to have such a wonderful "adult relationship" with Leslie and was very proud of her children, their spouses and her grandchild. Active sailors for 37 years, Jane and Doug were tenured members of the Percy Priest Yacht Club in Nashville where Doug served as Commodore in 1981. They learned to sail on a Sunfish before moving up to an O'Day Javelin and then a Flying Scot. They were instrumental in developing an 18-member fleet of FS's in middle Tennessee and southern Kentucky. In 1983, they purchased one of the first J-22's and played an active part in starting the J-22 Class Association. Doug was the first Class Association President. The J-22 was traded for a Pearson 28. When Doug and Jane joined FBYC in June 2006, they owned a Knockabout 15 but soon after bought a Beneteau 323. It was replaced in March 2008 with Red Sky, a Hanse 370, which they actively raced in the non-spinnaker fleet. One club member, recalling often crossing paths with Doug and Jane out on the waters around the green #3 buoy, said she was happy being on the wheel or trimming the sails, just enjoying the sun and breeze. Sometimes on Saturday evenings sitting around in Fannie's House, Ed O'Connor would strum a guitar and Jane and Doug would lead the group singing the "oldies." After Jane's health began to deteriorate last Fall because of a recurrence of cancer, she wasn't able to go out on the boat as often but she loved going down to the boat and "chilling out" while Doug raced on Mike Dale's boat. The Andersons became very active at FBYC immediately upon joining. Jane volunteered to help with the Flying Scot NACs in June 2007. After helping with registration all day long on Saturday, she came back to help with breakfast every morning during the event. A memorial service was held on August 2, 2009 at River Road Church, Baptist. In lieu of flowers, Jane asked that memorial gifts be made to the Chesapeake Bay Foundation, a local area Food Bank, or a charity of your choice.



FBYC OPTIMIST DEVELOPMENT TEAM ENJOYS FIRST-YEAR SUCCESS

FBYC Seeing a need to prepare the Club's younger sailors and their families for the FBYC Junior Race Team, Ted Steadman helped secure professional coaching and support for the six junior sailors who made up the FBYC 2009 Opti Development Team: Julia Lennarz (12); Claire Lennarz (11); Hanna Steadman (10); Luke Hayes (9); Julian Waters (9); and Nicolas Lennarz (8). Fishing Bay's own Cori Radke served as the coach and the ODT practiced Thursday-Sunday every week and competed in eight regattas throughout the summer. The sailors improved their skills and confidence in the eight weeks they spent together and grew and matured as a team as well. "Even though they were at different levels in their development, each member brought something special to help build the team," reflected Cori. "By the end of the season, it was clear that they loved sailing in large part because of the close friendships they developed. They could be very serious at the regattas, and yet play and have fun when the racing was done," continued Cori. "I am proud that each improved dramatically throughout our season, and I know each can go as far in sailing as they choose."

The success of a season can be gauged in many ways; from the team members placing at every regatta, to the smiles on the faces and the laughter heard from each sailor. Equally important, however, is the lasting impression the team makes on the members of the Yacht Clubs they visit. Consistent feedback from hosting clubs was that the ODT sailors showed great sportsmanship and were courteous guests. It's unanimous: the season was a huge success. The parents are grateful to Coach Cori, to Ted Steadman for carrying out his

vision, and to the club for supplying the coach's boat and Opti trailer. Get to know these young sailors. You'll surely see them in the winner's circle at future regattas. Following are some highlights of the ODT season.

The ODT claimed four of the top five positions at the RRYC Junior regatta: Hannah Steadman (1); Claire Lennarz (2); Julia Lennarz (4); Nic Lennarz (5); and Luke Hayes (8). The Norfolk YC regatta featured 18-20 knot breezes and waves for the 20 competitors who competed. Hannah Steadman finished 1st Overall and 1st in the White Fleet and Julia Lennarz competed on the Green Fleet course. At the Governor's Cup regatta hosted by Ware River Yacht Club, the team swept the top positions with Jed Londrey finishing 1st overall, followed by Hannah Steadman in 2nd (1st in White Fleet), Claire Lennarz 3rd overall (2nd in Blue Fleet), and Julia Lennarz 3rd in Blue Fleet. Luke Hayes and Nic Lennarz both served notice on the Green

THE FBYC JUNIOR RACING TEAM "SPLITS TACKS" IN THE NORTHEAST

Ed. note: a number of premier northeast regattas were held within a 10 day period in August: Hyannis Yacht Club Annual Regatta, Opti New England Championships, 420 Nationals, Laser Nationals, and the Buzzard's Bay Regatta. Following is a recap of those regattas.

FBYC JUNIORS SERVE "VIRGINIA COCKTAIL" AT HYANNIS

If the Hyannis Yacht Club members didn't know about Fishing Bay before, they certainly know where the yacht club is located now. This popular One-Design and PHRF class regatta on Cape Cod "draws boats from as far west as Chicago, as far south as Annapolis, and as far north as Canada," according to the HYC website. Next year the regatta organizers may want to rewrite their regatta promotions as the FBYC Junior Racing team virtually swept the results this year. In the 42-boat Laser Radial fleet, Kyle Swenson, Ben Buhl, Madeleine Alderman, Austin Powers, and Conrad Roos placed 2, 7, 11, 12, and 30 respectively. Kyle Swenson actually tied for first overall but lost the tiebreaker. On the Opti course, the junior sailing team of Alexander Hanna, Graeme Alderman, Will Whitmore, Erin Jacob, and Jeremy Herrin took five of the top 10 positions, 1, 2, 3, 5, 8 respectively while Gray Kiger and Eric Roos ensured the entire team placed in the top half of the 42-boat Opti fleet with their strong 18 and 19 places. In the 420 class, Alex Jacob was the only boat to set a spinnaker in the heavy winds caused by a squall that came through on day one. He subsequently broke his mast after broaching. Thanks to his "pit crew" on shore, he rebounded the next two days to finish 18 out of 104 boats.

366 OPTI SAILORS COMPETE IN THE NEW ENGLAND CHAMPIONSHIPS

Following Hyannis, the Opti race team headed to Newport for the ever-popular New England Championship regatta. SailNewport hosted a well-managed regatta, both on and off the water. Even though the winds were uncharacteristically light and the current was characteristically heavy, the Committee ran nine races over three days. Alexander Hanna sailed an outstanding regatta to finish 17 overall and 3rd in the Blue Fleet. He was followed by Kendall Swenson (50), Graeme Alderman (56), Erin Jacob (65), Jeremy Herrin (66), Will Whitmore (77), Gray Kiger (133), and Eric Roos (202).

RECORD-BREAKING NUMBER OF LASER SAILORS LAND AT LONG BEACH ISLAND

Further south on the New Jersey shore, Brant Beach Yacht Club hosted the largest Laser regatta in North America with 276 sailors descending on Long Beach Island. Many of the sailors were familiar with the waters as BBYC hosted both the Laser and Opti ACCs in 2008 and were all too familiar with the seaweed that enjoys the Jersey shore almost as much as the beach enthusiasts. Competitors were seen clearing their blades regularly throughout the race course. All FBYC junior sailors finished in the top half of a heavily-stacked Laser Radial fleet of 142 boats, with many of the sailors using the venue to train for the upcoming Laser Worlds in Halifax. Kyle Swenson finished 27, followed by Ben Buhl (41), Madeleine Alderman (70), Austin Powers (100), Conrad Roos (107), and McKay Hanna (121).

TWO 420 REGATTAS DRAW LARGE FLEETS

Alex Jacob left Hyannis to complete his 420 circuit by competing in the 420 National Championship hosted by the Conanicut and Jamestown Yacht Clubs. He posted a strong finish of 32 out of 152 boats in the Nationals. Later in the week he went on to compete in the Buzzard's Bay Regatta hosted by New Bedford Yacht Club in Massachusetts. This year's BBR competitors were challenged with light conditions at the beginning of the regatta which eventually filled in on the subsequent days. Alex Jacob finished 21 out of the 127-boat 420 fleet.

US JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIPS

US Sailing hosts junior championships for single-, double-, and triple-handed sailboats and describes these championships as "ladder events in which eliminations are held among 1000+ yacht clubs and 150+ community sailing programs that comprise US Sailing today." The top two winners of the Area eliminations go on to compete in the finals. This year, Kyle Swenson competed in the Area C eliminations held July 24 at Severn Sailing Association and secured one of two berths in the finals. He left the Laser Nationals immediately after the racing finished on Sunday to drive back up to Massachusetts for the event. Twenty of the nations' top Laser sailors from 11 Areas arrived at Pleon YC in Marblehead to unpack brand new boats, sails, and hardware they would sail for the next four days courtesy of Laser Performance. Kyle finished 12th in the 10-race series with just two points separating the 10-12 place finishers.

A CLEAN SWEEP AT THE FBYC ANNUAL REGATTA: BUHL, HANNA WIN VIRGINIA STATE CHAMPS

The junior racing team relished "coming home" to Fishing Bay after being on the road since late July. While it had been three weeks since they had sailed on their home waters, it didn't take the Opti or Laser team long to reacquaint themselves with the local conditions. Both Opti and Laser PROs set their courses in the river and were able to run eight races even though they were challenged with light, shifty breezes throughout both days. Strong finishes for both fleets confirmed what FBYC already knows: our Opti and Laser sailors are champions...even beyond our state line. Their strong finishes also will help boost their CBYRA standings since the Annual Regatta/Virginia State Champs counted as a 1.5 high point qualifier.
