During the course of July, we reached the halfway point in the scheduled events of our sailing programs for this season. We are proud to say that all of our sailing divisions have had numerous positive experiences! Our Junior Division conducted a fabulous Junior Week, with 118 participants and a lot of help from our volunteers! A big thanks goes out to Mark and Michelle Hayes for leading the volunteer efforts! The Race Teams are having much success on the Summer Circuit. The participation in the OP Sail events in and around Norfolk, as well as other excursions are providing our Cruising Division with new war The One Design Division concluded the Spring Series and is now involved in the Summer Sea Breeze and Laser events. Our Offshore Division had a number of boats attend the Southern Bay Race Week and the 2012 Screwpile Challenge in Solomans and are now into the Distance Series.

Deltaville's Leukemia Cup Regatta took place in July and had eighty- three boats participating. This event has evolved into a true community endeavor and now has the support and involvement from a number of local sponsors and boating organizations. The experience was enhanced this year by Gary Jobson's presentation and participation on Friday

night. The fund raising effort of this event, the sailboat races and social components were all a great success, despite the weather. We are expecting to see about 120 boats for AOD and hope to have 55 to 60 boats at Stingray. Both of these events are our premiere regattas of the season. If you have not registered yet, please remember to do so. The parties for both of these regattas promise to be well worth your time and money, so remember to register even if you are not racing a boat.

By now all may have heard the news of the fire at the Deltaville Marine Museum. As I write this, the news is one day old. An investigation is on going and more information will come forward relative to plans for recovery and funding. The museum is a very important element of the Deltaville community, as plans develop, I'm sure we will all be supportive of the effort.

The New York Yacht Club Qualifying Series will be sailed in early September. The team is now in the final stages of preparation for this event. Please see Noel's article later in this newsletter for more information.

Meeting called to order at 6:00 p.m. by Commodore Alex Alvis.

REAR COMMODORE - JOHN B. WAKE JR.

TREASURER – **Mason Chapman**, reporting for **Elizabeth Staas**, commended the leaders of the junior program for implementing and enforcing the new safety program. From his role as the club's insurance person, Mason said this was a good way to raise awareness of safety and promote a culture of safety at the club.

HOUSE – A part has been ordered for the air-conditioner in Fannie's House. A new oven was installed in the caterer's kitchen and the LP gas system upgraded.

SOCIAL - Jon Moody served approximately 70 people at the July 4th cookout

LONG RANGE – **Noel Clinard** and **Strother Scott** have been working on a new survey for club members. Flag Officers should receive it next week for a test run before it is circulated to the membership.

MARKETING – Jay Buhl has received the regatta cups, hats and coolies for AOD and Stingray and skipper's bags for Stingray are on order. **Doug Anderson** reported that new member brochures have been re-printed and **Jon Deutsch** has produced a CD from the club video that is on the web site.

HISTORIAN – **Jere Dennison** is trying to come up with ideas for commemorating the club's Diamond Anniversary that will take place in two years.

OPERATIONS MANAGER – **Dixon Cole** reported that he is getting everything lined up with **Keith Ruse** at Deltaville Boatyard for a floating dock for the Annual One Design.

VICE COMMODORE - GEORGE W. BURKE III

FLEET CAPTAIN – **Matt Braun** found some templates from U.S.Sailing that could be customized for a safety program for the club.

ONE DESIGN DIVISION – The Spring Series races have been completed and there was a good turnout for the Long Distance Race. The Summer Seabreeze races are coming up as well as the Annual One Design Regatta.

JUNIOR DIVISION – OptiKids and Junior Week (118 participants) were both successful as was the Commonwealth of Virginia Junior Championship Regatta on June 23-24th. The ODT team participated in a Hampton Yacht Club Regatta and seven ODT members traveled to the Junior Olympics in Annapolis July 5-8th, which was a first for ODT members. The Opti and Laser Race Teams had impressive results at the Junior Olympics. David Lennarz has received positive feedback from parents and children about Laser coach Gabriel Moran and Opti coach Edgar Diminch. S.B. and Jef Londrey are in the planning stages for the AOD Regatta and are soliciting for course PRO's and other volunteers. Over 50 hours of private sailing lessons to both club members and non-members who participated in OptiKids and Junior Week have been sold. Ben Buhl is the primary coach for the private lessons but Will Bomar is handling some sessions as well.

OLD BUSINESS – At the last Board meeting, **Matt Braun** was asked to lead the participation/volunteerism effort. **Matt** reported that the Club Rule states that members should serve two days of volunteer service each year. He was able to download the lists of all volunteers from the program set up on the web site in 2007. The program was well implemented in 2008 with event chairs posting the names of all volunteers for all events. That has

fallen off some in recent years because event chairs have not been as diligent about posting the names of volunteers. About one-third of the membership is carrying the volunteer load. Based on figures Matt has been able to put together, he has come to the following conclusions: (1) we should make an attempt to enter the names of all volunteers; (2) we need to encourage participation because that usually means volunteerism goes up; (3) we need to recognize members who have volunteered way beyond any requirement; (4) if possible, the MyFBYC link on the web site should be utilized as a way for members to enter their volunteer preferences; and (5) new members should be encouraged to volunteer and they should be actively recruited by social and race chairs. Matt will continue to follow up on this study and will present an annual report at the end of the year. Alex Alvis asked the Division Commanders to work with Matt. There was a suggestion that new applicants should be asked which of the four Divisions they have the most interest in and the membership committee should then see that the Division receives that information.

There being no additional business, the meeting was adjourned at 6:45 p.m.

Things that go bump in the night trigger our primordial fears. A water pump failure while single-handedly motoring down to HYC (Craig Wright), or a freeze plug in the engine block bursts and floods your bilge (Dick Cole), or you accidentally pull your spin halyard 58' to the top of the mast (unnamed), or you have a MOB incident (Paul Wash), or you fall off your boat at the dock and fracture your skull (Willard Strickland), each can bring to life that moment of anxiety. Tornados are examples, too.

While these incidents are on a continuum from inconveniences to life threatening, and clearly differ by an order of magnitude, the sense of being embraced by your Club members who know you is an order of magnitude better than being alone. The upside of these incidents is the sense of community you experience when your fellow Club members come to assist you, or to commiserate with you.

The take away from this discussion is the importance of community, specifically the community we call FBYC. This matchless community encompasses the folks you race and cruise with, or socialize with at events, the folks you have communal meals with at Fannie's House, the group childcare you share at the pool and on Fishing Bay beach, and our children at play, catching crabs or lightning bugs, having fun, safely.

It also includes fellow Club members who provide us essential services, such as, Rick Farinholt, Lee Farinholt (Chesapeake Boat Works), Jerry Latell (Ullman Sails), Blackwell Nottingham (West Marine-Richmond), Brent Halsey and Jim Rogers (Stingray Point Marina), Keith Ruse (Deltaville Boat Yard), Ken and Carolyn Schmalenberger (Norton Yachts), and Julie Ann Wash (FBYC Store, our unique Club shopping experience).

Twenty-One Area Youth Participate in YMCA Junior Sailing Camp at FBYC

The week of July 9, 21 area youth participated in the Middlesex Family YMCA's junior sailing camp hosted by FBYC. Head Coach Eric Bokinsky and YMCA Director Rosabeth Kisman led the program with coaches Nick Baez, Will Bomar, Ben Buhl, Sam Russell, and Conrad Roos managing the mayhem.



Some participants were returning veterans looking to improve their skills, but most of the attendees learned to sail for the first time. This year, two YMCA members who attended FBYC's Junior Week assisted the YMCA coaches as Counselors in Training. This year the teacher/student ratio was dramatically increased so class could be divided into three sections, according to age. This provided more intensive training and much greater learning accomplishment, as well as improved safety control.

The highlight of the week involved FBYC members Ted Bennett, Karen Soule, and Brad Miller taking the junior sailors on their offshore boats. While enjoying lunch, the children learned the similarities and differences between yachts and the smaller craft being utilized at Fishing Bay Yacht Club.

YMCA Director Kisman said, "I am amazed by the progress of our sailors. Over the week, I watched as kids flourished from beginning sailing abilities to confident navigation in shifting winds. The skill of the Fishing Bay Yacht Club instructors and patience with our youth was unparalleled. This is a once in a lifetime experience for many of our Y kids made possible by the FBYC. I look forward to watching our sailors deepen their connection with the sport for years to come,"

The collaboration between FBYC and the YMCA is a significant FBYC initiative to provide an impactful outreach to promote the sport of sailing to local youth. Conrad Roos, a leading FBYC sailor who volunteered to teach at this year's camp, discovered FBYC through the YMCA sailing program, and the Roos family has been extremely active at the Club ever since.

Lud Kimbrough spoke briefly to the youth and their parents at their closing ceremony, saying, "Junior Sailors are the future of our sport. The confidence that builds from sailing one's own boat is a foundation that pays benefits throughout life. We encourage everyone interested in the sport to talk to us about how they can stay involved and improve their skills, and we will continue to reach out and broaden community participation in the sport."

What a start to summer for Fishing Bay Yacht Club Juniors! On the weekends of June 8TH and 16th, 32 sailors as young as 5 began their sailing careers by attending Opti Kids with their parents. It was a huge success with great weather, great coaching, and great fun for all the families. Also during these weekends our race teams began practicing with their professional coaches. This year we have a total of 34 juniors participating on three different teams!

Junior Week followed immediately after Opti Kids. Again, we were blessed with beautiful weather and light winds.. 118 sailors between the ages of 6 and 17 participated, along with over 70 volunteers, comprising 11 separate classes-including Optis, Lasers, 420s, and keel racing and cruising boats! We had five perfect days of sailing and fun, including two ice cream socials, a pool party with a teen rock band called ZIG ZAG, a special "mad scientist" who entertained the children with a program on "The Power of Wind", a family cookout for nearly 300 children and parents, and the Leukemia Sail-A-Thon! Included in the above numbers were 48 beginners divided into three classes. We even had to borrow our neighbor's beach to accommodate all the kids. It was a very special week with an amazing group of children, parents, grandparents and special friends. Everyone left with new friends, special memories, and making plans to attend next year. Junior Week ended on June 23, and our competitive race season began on June 24 with our club hosting the Commonwealth of Virginia Junior Championship Regatta. We did not even have time to clear our boats out of the one-design yard before boats from Maryland, North Carolina, and of course, other clubs in Virginia, began arriving for the regatta! We hosted a total of 72 junior sailors from around the Bay, including 20 first time racers in the Opti Green Fleet. Our own Hannah Steadman and Garret Levy finished first and third, respectively, in the overall Opti Red, White and Blue, with Austin Powers finishing third in the Laser Radial Class.

Our race teams-and their parents then dove into the Chesapeake Bay Yacht Racing Association Junior race schedule. Following the Commonwealth, our teams participated in regattas hosted by Hampton Yacht Club, the Chesapeake Bay Junior Olympics hosted jointly by Annapolis Yacht Club and Severn Sailing Association, Gibson Island Yacht Squadron, Baltimore County Sailing Center, Corsica River Yacht Club, Miles River Yacht Club and Rappahannock River Yacht Club, all as of press time! Next week the Laser Team will travel to Hyannis Yacht Club in Massachusetts, where they will sail in their largest regatta of the summer, and the Opti Race Team will travel to Sandusky, Ohio for the Opti National Championships! Both teams will then race at the Maryland State Championships. The Opti Development Team will race at Ware River Yacht Club before finishing out the summer season at the Annual One Design. Fishing Bay Yacht Club juniors have placed in every regatta they have attended! Look for future write-ups in the Log.


On line registration begins **May 30th**. Due to the extended Racing, enhanced Socials and Live Entertainment we expect record attendance so early reservations are strongly recommended.

The most anticipated event of the summer is just around the corner for the sexagenarian set (age 60 & over) as well for sleek Classic boats. The ranks of Club membership are swelling with a growing number of candidates for the Legacy of Sail Regatta on August 25...that's just one week before the club's signature Stingray Regatta over Labor Day weekend.

Being rebranded with a new name

(though still whimsically nicknamed the 'Geezer Regatta'), the Legacy of Sail Regatta: Classic Boats & Vintage Skippers will also include not only One-Designs, but Classic small boats as well. Other changes this year will allow non-FBYC sailors to skipper O-Ds and Classics and will eliminate the sexagenarian age restriction for the Classics skippers. One-Design skippers will still need to be 60 & over.

Because we plan on hosting an enhanced *après* race social for participants and their entourages, we need a headcount fast to determine our food and beverage and trophy requirements for this first annual FBYC regatta designed specifically for old boats and old folks.

So please visit the FBYC website ASAP and sign up for the Legacy of Sail Regatta whether you are going to race, want to serve on the R/C, want to volunteer for the social activities, or just want to be present at this inaugural event.

Here are the exciting details of the Legacy of Sail Regatta:

What: Regatta in Flying Scots and other OD classes with three or more entries (Lasers, Optis, 420s, Front Runners, Mobjacks, etc.) and Classic small boats under 25' LWL. The Classics will be scored by Portsmouth Handican.

When: Saturday, August 25 – one day only

Where: FBYC

Why: For fun and senior bragging rights.

Who: For the One-Design Division, skippers must be 60 and over. So the younger whippersnappers won't feel entirely left out, they will be permitted to crew, but not take the helm nor ridicule the skipper. There is no FBYC membership requirement for skippers and crew.

For the Classic Division, skippers and crew may be of any age. There is no FBYC membership requirement for skippers and crew.

Trophies: A mix of serious competition trophies and whimsical awards are a possibility.

The Social: Directly following the racing, a groaning board of delectables provided by our distinguished Social Committee will be offered and a bar featuring set-ups and beer will be activated. Cost per person is \$5/head paid by cash or check at the gate when you arrive.

National Chairman of the Leukemia Cup Regattas and America's Cup sailor, Gary Jobson, was on hand Friday night to welcome participants and sponsors to the event and regale them with his repertoire of scintillating sea stories.



The 2011 Southern Chesapeake Leukemia Cup was honored to have been recently voted the Best Regatta on the Bay by the readers of Chesapeake Bay Magazine. However, after this year's event, it may enjoy the dubious distinction of being judged the Hottest Regatta on the Bay as well. The weekend racing unfortunately coincided with the two hottest days of this summer's record shattering heat wave with heat index readings near 110 on both Saturday and Sunday. Needless to say, bottled water was much in demand, and, to the racers' credit, everyone survived the sweltering challenge in high spirits.

The top fundraiser for the second consecutive year was skipper Diane Simon who hails the Fishing Bay Yacht Club as the home port for her 33-foot racing sloop Happy Place. She took home the coveted Roy F. Meyer Perpetual Trophy presented to the event's top fundraiser. Despite the record heat we had a very successful weekend. Everyone should be proud of their efforts toward raising money to finding a cure for all blood cancers."

Imminent Survey of Club Members by Noel Clinard, Long Range Planning Chair

Watch for the distribution of the FBYC Club Member Survey in the next 90 days!

Periodically, we survey the perceptions, goals and aspirations of members regarding the yacht club. These surveys provide irreplaceable guidance to the Club's Long Range Plan (LRP). It has been many years since our last survey and we need new input to facilitate updating of the LRP by a Committee and the Board during the off-season of 2012-13. To enhance the validity of results, it is important that the survey be completed by as many members as possible, so it will be available to all members, including junior members.

Like the last version, the 2012 Member Survey will be conducted on-line, employing the user friendly application at **www. zoomerang.com**. This application facilitates broad and rapid distribution, efficient completion, and detailed analysis of results. For the few not comfortable with the application, the survey may also be available in another form.

The survey will assess many facets of the Club, including the activities of the Offshore, One-Design, Cruising and Junior Divisions, as well as facilities, scope of services, governance, pricing, member satisfaction, and possible strategic initiatives. While some of the sections of the survey, such as governance and pricing, will be required of all, the survey will also feature prefatory questions to categorize your particular interests and direct you to the relevant parts of the survey for you (e.g. Junior Members will be directed to the Junior section). The goal is to take up a minimum of your time.

It's your Club; be sure to provide your views on future direction.

He frequently represents both Southern YC and New York YC in national team racing competitions. He was Bowman on the winning *Arethusa* crew in the inaugural NYYC Invitational Cup. He serves on the Board of the Stuart Walker Foundation at College of Charleston.

John Wake (Tactician) who is an active one design sailor and accomplished Triathlete. He has crewed extensively on J24, JY15, Mobjacks, J29, Melges 24, J105 and Sonar classes at local, regional and national events. He served as Tactician on *Patriot*, the J29 campaigned by FBYC's Case Whittemore. For the last several years he has crewed on Flying Scots, often with John Aras of Annapolis, finishing in the top 10 in national events. John is a former One Design Division Commander and is currently Rear Commodore of FBYC.

Matt Braun who began racing Optis in 1974 at Orlando Yacht Club, graduated to Sunfish and Thistles in high school and was active in the Daytona Beach catamaran racing circuit. Matt has participated widely in offshore and one design racing, as skipper and crew. He received the 2010 Commodore's Bowl, awarded to outstanding skipper at FBYC, was first overall in the Annual One Design Regatta in the Front Runner fleet in 2010, and was Front Runner Midwinter's Champion in 2009. Matt has raced in the Chesapeake for 16 years in Front Runners, Sonars, J22s, J24s, Typhoons, Flying Scots, Colgate 26s and J105s. Matt is a former One Design Division Commander, is currently Fleet Captain of FBYC, and has a leadership role in its Junior Program.

In the next month, our Team will sail *Prophet*, Sonar #725, in the NE Sonar Championships in Falmouth MA and the Sonar NAs in Rochester NY to hone their skills in large fleets of the nation's best Sonar sailors. Among the final steps of qualification for the NYYC USQS, is the FBYC Flag's certification of the Team members' U.S. citizenship, long term regular Club membership, classification as amateurs under ISAF, and their weight. The certification process serves as a reminder of the underlying purpose of the NYYC Invitational Cup and its qualifying event, this USQS. Today's other top regattas feature America's Cup like events, with immense budgets, abandonment of nationality requirements, and

highly compensated professional crews recruited aggressively for the event. Instead, NYYC set out to create a premier international regatta, and a national "qualifying series" for it, sailed by Corinthian amateurs with longstanding club loyalty, in existing one design boats, such as Swan 42s, Sonars and J70s. Put another way, your FBYC Team is about to compete with the nation's preeminent yacht clubs in the qualifying series of an event harkening back to



the ideals of the Americas Cup Trials of yesteryear. In short, this is a "big deal" and you have reason to be proud of the Club and its Team for the NYYC selection.




