TIME TO LAUNCH...

If you didn't make it to the YAM get together on March 9th (you're never too old), missed the Spring Clean-Up Day and Bermuda High Party on March 25th (thank you Ullmans!), and missed the Winter Program Speaker event on March 29th, then it's high time you plan to join in on an April event: crew, offshore, and one design training, the cruiser's party, and Opening Day are all great ways to reconnect with Club members you haven't seen over the winter. I am pleased to report that the two East Dock Committees are diligently working towards a fall 2017 project start date. The Construction Committee has been meeting with contractors, gathering estimates, and working with an engineer to prepare the necessary permit application.

The Dock Finance Committee is crunching the numbers to help determine the best way to structure paying for the improvement. As outlined in summer and fall presentations and *Log* articles, a combination of cash and debt will be used to pay for the new dock, with those wishing to move to the new dock paying a higher slip fee once completed in 2018. Next step: the Board will vote at our April 13th meeting to submit the permitting application.

Our Junior Program planning is well underway. Registration for Opti-Kids, Junior Week, and the Race Teams opened on February 1st and are quickly filling to capacity. The new 420 Race Team program is already at full capacity and has us joining forces with Christ Church School for what should be an exciting new addition to summer sailing. In recognition of this new program, I have named the 420 Class as the Challenge Bowl recipient and will base the award on participation in Junior Program activities.

But why should kids have all the fun? Karen Soule and her Adult Sailing Committee, along with General Manager Brian Ankrom, have been busy putting the finishing touches on a Club-owned Boat Program. The program is designed to have low barriers to entry: an easy qualification process, an attractive annual fee with nearly unlimited use, and two types of boats that are prepared and ready for you to race or day sail with family or friends. More information about this program will soon be posted on the Club website and include how to register for the Program and reserve your time on the water.

IN MEMORIAM

DAVID A. HAZLEHURST 12/9/1930 - 3/9/2017

David Anthony Hazlehurst,

86, was born a grumpy old man in Runcorn, Cheshire, a town just outside Liverpool, England. Gone before him are his beloved parents, David, a wounded WWI soldier, and Doris, a schoolteacher; Peter, his younger brother; and William, David's infant son who died in 1962. Left to sort through his clothes are his adoring, spunky wife of 56 years, June (née Beresford); his level-headed son Tim, and Tim's efficient and lovely wife Gwen of Cary, NC; David's slightly bossy daughter Naomi Delzell and her long-suffering husband Bob of Roanoke; his ever-faithful cat Chloe; and six grandchildren who affectionately called him "Boop." Hannah, Rachel Corvin (and Alex), Zach (and Julia), Will, and Sophie and Fiona Delzell.

David attended Liverpool University where he studied Chemistry, played rugby, and sang exuberantly and off-key to bawdy rugby songs. He earned his PhD in Chemistry in 1956 and took the Queen Mary to a faraway land called America where he completed his post-doc at the University of Texas in Austin. Here he began to learn American, but sadly, never became fluent.

He returned to Liverpool where he met June, a saucy young nurse from Manchester, and three months later, they were married. David joined DuPont in Martinsville, VA in 1963, a magical place where they raised their two children. In the early 70s, David and the family learned to sail in the YMCA pool, and he became an avid sailor on Smith Mountain Lake where he served as Commodore of Virginia Inland Sailing Yacht Club for several years. In 1983, David and June moved to Richmond where they joined Fishing Bay Yacht Club. David organized sailing camps for underprivileged children, managed regattas and again became the club Commodore in 2004 and a Life Member in 2010.

David relished his retirement and began sailing in the Laser World Masters races, making great friends, drinking beer and coming in DFL (Dead Last) in regattas in Chile, Mexico, Ireland and Australia. In 1996, he helped run the Olympic sailing races in Savannah, GA. In 2010, David and June moved to Roanoke.

David loved military marching music, especially at 7 o'clock on Sunday mornings. He was a talented woodworker and

rose gardener and a longtime member of the Fan Civic Association in Richmond. Having lived through the horrors of war and hyper-nationalism, he was a lifelong activist, marching for women's rights, sane gun laws and general good sense.

The family would like to thank all of the friends who pitched in with food, love, camaraderie and whisky, with a special thanks to Ethan, Becky, Ellen and Wendy for the sunshine they swept in every day. THE FLYING SCOT, SANDY DOUGLASS'S CROWNING DESIGN ACHIEVEMENT, CELEBRATES 60 YEARS By Debbie Cycotte, FSSA Historian



Gordon K. Douglass, or Sandy, as he is known to thousands of sailors who own one of his boats, is considered one of the best small boat helmsmen this country has produced and a brilliant boat designer.

Sandy is best known as the designer of three different one-design dinghies, the 17-foot Thistle (launched in 1945, with about 4,000 boats built so far), the 20-foot Highlander (launched in 1951, 1,100 boats built so far) and the 19-foot Flying Scot, which is celebrating its 60th year this year. All three classes are boat names that reflect Sandy's Scottish heritage.

Sandy was a colorful, energetic man who lived his life in pursuit of excellence and was unafraid of innovation. He said of himself, "If it can be done, I can do it better." He brought the concept of a planing hull to the United States and the Thistle, the Highlander and the Flying Scot all reflect that.

Sandy believed that the more specialized anything becomes, the fewer people will enjoy it. So his goal was to build boats with a broad appeal, and that included family use.

By the time Sandy designed the Flying Scot, he had had 20 years of experience building wooden boats. The Flying Scot was one of the first one-design boats made

from fiberglass. Sandy only designed a new boat to fill a void. With the advent of fiberglass, which was lower maintenance than wood and had greater design potential, Sandy now saw a reason to build an attractive alternative to the Lightning.

Designing the hull was no problem for Sandy because he had a clear idea of what was needed for a planing family boat. Such a boat should have the safety of wide side decks and also a roomy cockpit. Wide side decks help keep the boat from filling up in a knockdown but leaves little cockpit space. Sandy conceived the idea of having both wide side decks and a roomy cockpit by lowering half of a wide side deck and giving it the shape of a comfortably inclined seat, which provided for a roomy cockpit. He "wondered why no one had thought of this before?"

Unfortunately, it turned out that none of the salesmen or engineers of fiberglass who called on Sandy knew much more than he did. Sandy had to teach himself how to build with this new material. Sandy, the gregarious, optimistic and supremely confident and accomplished man he was, stepped right up.

Sandy's goal was to design and manufacture a boat that was well built, but exciting and able to be sailed by a wide range of people, in size, number and skill level. He always felt that a strict one-design boat was in the best interest of all purchasers, past and future, and was the truest test of one's sailing skill.

Advertised as the "culmination of the best features of the other Douglass designs," the Flying Scot quickly caught the eye of small-boat racers. The Flying Scot is larger, has more beam and is more stable than the Thistle. The prohibition of hiking straps was an effort to make the boat more competitive for smaller-sized people, like Sandy and his wife, Mary, who crewed for him for 30 years.

With more than 6,100 boats built and a continuous primary builder throughout its history, the Flying Scot is one of the leading one-design classes in the US. A strong class association ensures strict one-design competitive racing to attract top-caliber sailors. The class also enjoys family camaraderie and teams are often comprised of family members. They are the only one-design class to host a Wife-Husband National Championship each year.

The Flying Scot was inducted into the American Sailboat Hall of Fame in 1998.

FS sailors around the United States are multigenerational, welcoming and generous. Snobs are conspicuously absent. Friendly helpful sailors are everywhere.

2017 brings training, and coaching to our Fleet 103 skippers and crews. Don't own a boat—no worries, we welcome crew. Join us at the **One Design Training day on April 15*** to jumpstart your 2017 racing year. Our **top sailors will help us set up boats and coach us on the practice course**. We'll conclude with practice races to consolidate the learning, and then dash off to the docks and party.

We will have a short "start sequence" clinic before Spring Series 1. The instructor will remain on the course to coach the back half of the fleet. Spring Series 2 will also include on the water coaching for the back half of the fleet.

We run short courses near the Club launching ramp in Fishing Bay. We typically log three to five races and one great party each race day. That's lots of tacks, jibes, sets, douses, and mark roundings in a day. You'll have plenty to discuss with new and old friends over great food and beverages.

Don't have time for U-Tube how to videos and self directed practice sessions? You are not alone. Our on water coaching program is far more fun and more effective than anything you could do on your own.

We generally have sometimes formal, often informal race day recaps with the top finishers. This is where pick up pointers, and simply celebrate a great day on the water. 2017 Schedule is chocked full of laid back Club races, special events, including the Annual One Design Regatta and the Atlantic Coast Championships. THESE BOATS ARE YOUR BOATS By Karen Soule

Ever see an adult sail an Opti? It's not a pretty sight...in fact, it's pretty funny!

Well, adult members can now use adult-sized boats to learn to sail, to race or just for a day on the water. *Easy to Slip*, a J/24, and *Les Geezers*, a Flying Scot, will be ready on Opening Day and for the rest of the season for your sailing pleasure.

These boats are available to any FBYC member in good standing who has completed a sailing course or demonstrated sailing competence and has a Virginia Boating License. **To encourage usage, there is a ONE TIME ONLY \$100 fee** which puts you on the helm of either boat for the entire season. (Heck of a deal!)

Here's how to reserve a boat:

- Go to the website FBYC.net and click on "Get Sailing/ Adult Sailing."
- 2. Fill out the reservation form, noting your sailing experience in the Comments section.
- 3. If this is the first time you're reserving a boat, please enter your credit card information and the \$100 fee. You can make more reservations in the future and NOT pay any additional fees.

Once we receive your request, you'll get an email confirming your reservation, a copy of the Procedures for Use, a Liability Waiver Form and a Float Plan request.

So that as many members as possible can have access, the boats can be reserved one month in advance for up to **two weekend days** (including holidays) each month.

RACING / ADULT SAILING / JUNIOR

For example, reservations for June 1 can be requested as early as May 1. We also ask that you reserve a boat at least 48 hours in advance so that our general manager or operations supervisor can make sure the Flying Scot will be in the water (on the Fishing Bay side) or the J/24 (on the Jackson Creek side) are ready for you. You can also reserve a boat for a weekday—just give us 48 hours notice.

In Addition... We've set aside three days this season, **May 6, June 3** and **July 16** for sailing instruction on the boats. (These dates don't conflict with scheduled racing series.) We will have instructors available to teach you how to safely and successfully skipper either the Flying Scot or the J/24. There is no additional charge for this instruction, but you must reserve a boat and pay the seasonal fee. We can accommodate up to six "students" on each of these days, so don't wait too long to reserve a boat if you want instruction.

We hope Easy to Slip and Les Geezers will help members who don't own their own boat enjoy the water and the Club more fully and that they will be a powerful incentive for others to join FBYC.

JUNIOR ALL STARS ON THE RISE

Just when you think we are done, we have one more fantastic standout this year. Our own junior sailor Gannon Troutman was one of the highlighted sailors in the "Junior All Stars on the Rise" article that was done by Gary Jobson last month for Sailing World. Gannon was among eight junior sailors that were interviewed and recognized as up and coming. Included in the article were: Ashton Borcherding, 17, from Connecticut who currently sails 420s including internationally; Leo Boucher .16, from West River in Maryland who sails Lasers and many of our laser team members can remember from past regattas as outstanding; Blaire McCarthy, 16, sailing in St. Petersburg, Florida in several different types of boats including 420s, Lasers and Etchells; Cate Mollerus, 17, from Larchmont, New York and crew on a 29er among other boats; Jack Parkin, 18, of Connecticut sailing 420s and 470s; Sophia Reineke, 18, of Florida sailing mainly Lasers; Wiley Rogers ,17, of Texas who sails 420s and 470s; and finally the youngest of the group Gannon Troutman, 14, of Gloucester, Virginia.

Gary Jobson wrote about Gannon: "Gannon Troutman, 14, of Gloucester, Virginia, sails out of the Fishing Bay YC. He has taken a different path than most young sailors.

Troutman is home-schooled, though he plans to attend high school next year. He does not play any other organized sports but is an enthusiastic skateboarder. Unfortunately, Troutman broke his arm trying out a skateboard when he was in San Diego for the 2016 J/70 North Americans. 'I could still sail, but I let my team down,' he says. 'It was embarrassing admitting to everyone that I wiped out on my skateboard.'

Troutman races a Laser Radial and is a regular skipper on the J/70 circuit. His team's best finish was at Charleston Race Week, where they finished second overall, and at the J/70 Worlds in 2016, he won a race. Of the experience, Troutman says: 'I have met a lot of world-class sailors. Many of them have offered me advice and ¬encouragement.'

He was also in the top third of the J/70 fleet at Quantum Key West, Miami Bacardi Race Week, the Helly Hansen NOOD Regatta in Annapolis, and the Rolex Big Boat Series in San Francisco. Long-term, he hopes to compete in long-distance races like the Volvo Ocean Race and the Transpac."

Gannon has been part of the FBYC junior program for more than four years now starting with Optis and moving to Lasers about two years ago. He has had wonderful experiences sailing with his dad in his J/70 all over the world including France and California. He has decided this summer to focus on sailing the 420s with FBYC and the new Race Team that has been developed. We expect to see great things from the team this summer with such talent. Congratulations Gannon for being recognized. We are truly blessed to have such wonderful sailors recognized that are recognized all over the country for their performances, but also for the outstanding their sportsmanship and great attitudes. The entire race team over the past few years have continued to excel with the support of wonderful parents, coaches and Club members.
