Highlights from the May 2017 Board meeting.

REAR COMMODORE –

HOUSE CHAIR – Most recent visible work power washing and painting some exterior surfaces to finish the "refresh" of our front entrance. Recommended that All-Around Construction (Gloucester) be retained at a cost of \$5900 to re-roof Fannie's House. One other bid was obtained from a Deltaville company at a higher cost; several contractors declined the invitation.

SOCIAL CHAIR – Opening Day was a success: 16 boats, 154 party attendees (11 more than last year). Net Cost of party was about \$200 less than last year. General Manager Brian Ankrom was especially helpful in making this event a success.

GROUNDS CHAIR – Termites in the barn are turning into a big project. Floors, lockers, and vents need to be torn out. Put down new flooring and lockers. Cost would be a minimum of \$500. Driveways have had gravel put down. We had a leak in the waterline going to the pool. The waterline is being replaced at a minimum cost of about \$250.

WEB MASTER – Longer term the goal will be to move all the web pages we edit and update to a Content Management System (CMS) that operates well with Django.

OLD BUSINESS: Update on the Middlesex Water Authority: Subscription Agreement rates for water line connection needed by FBYC are the same as two years ago. The current, promotional fee for hook-up is \$25,000. Club will send signed agreement along with \$2,500 deposit to lock in fee. Neighbor agreement has been made for the use of field over-flow parking. The agreement is for one year and includes six Club events.

NEW BUSINESS: Ramp on Fishing Bay is decaying slowly. Six feet of the ramp has already been lost. RFIs have been sent out to estimate the cost of repairing. Other items:

LASER ACCS IN WRIGHTSVILLE, NC BY JENNIFER BENDURA

It was the morning after tornado threats and torrential downpours that the Laser Atlantic Coast Championships (ACCs) were being held in Wrightsville, NC at the Carolina Yacht

Club. The rain had stopped, but the heavy winds rolled in making it challenging even for the most experienced of sailors. There were more than 100 Laser sailors ranging in age from 14 up to almost 70. They had 4.7; radial and full-rig classes sailing for this event.

With great help from volunteers, all the sailors launched without getting injured or breaking their boats. It was a sight to see as two by two they set out for the regatta. They left by the sound side, through a jetty and out into the Atlantic Ocean for the races. It was tough going with boats being pushed into the narrow passages out of the docks and dangerously close to the rocky jetties.

As the sailors waited patiently to launch on shore, it was unbelievable how near deafening was the sound of the sails flapping in the wind. You could see the boats almost ready to take off from the dollies where they were resting. It was a chilly morning as well, so many warm layers were needed for these sailors.

On Saturday, the race committee managed to get off three races for all three fleets before calling it quits for the day. Several sailors were challenged to the point that they could not even finish the three races and headed back to shore before finishing the first race. One older sailor said that one minute he was in his boat and the next he was five feet in front of it. At that point, he said it was safer to go in then to injure someone else or himself. The wind stayed a constant 20 with gusts of 30+ at times. They also had lots of wave action going on to make it even more of a challenge.

I stood there watching as the sailors started to come in for the day and the craziness that went on. It was more challenging, I think, for them to get back in then it was to launch. Several sailors could not get in no matter what they seemed to do, multiple sailors ended up in the water and had to rely on safety boats to bring them ashore.

The next day was not quite as much of a challenge. The temperatures were a bit warmer and the winds had died down making it closer to 15 knots. The race committee once again got off three races that day with none of the sailors going in early. They had sailors from all over including Canada and Turks and Caicos.

We had one junior sailor at this event. Jordan Bendura, a member of FBYC Laser Race team, who participated in the ACCs. Although a challenge overall, he ended up finishing mid-pack for Radials. Even though he did not finish where he had hoped in the Regatta, he felt like it challenged his skills and made him a better sailor for participating. He had one good race the second day – finishing 10th for one of the races. He said the trip was well worth it and his parents agreed.

The club itself was extremely hospitable. They offered parts of boats or helped find parts for any sailors who found they were missing items or even the wrong items with them. There was one sailor that had a full-rig sail, but the rigging for a Radial. Another family from the club went home and picked up an extra they had so that he could sail that weekend. Overall a good experience.

TEAM OPTIMIST TRIALS BY JENNIFER BENDURA

What does it take to get to this point in competition? It takes practice, practice, practice and, of course, the love of sailing. Our junior sailors continue to excel and shine. We had six of our junior sailors from the Optimist Race Team qualify to participate in Team Trials in Brant Beach, NJ in May. This is one of two qualifiers each year where the best of the best from around the United States compete for limited spots for U.S. teams to participate in international regattas. John Vail, Baylor Goldwaithe, Reed McCallister, Joshua Bendura, Guthrie Braun and Thomas Sitzmann all qualified at various Optimist events throughout the year. Learning under such wonderful coaching of Tommy Dietrich and Francisco Renna over the summer helped our current sailors excel.

How do you qualify for team trials? You have to be in the top 50 percent at Nationals or top 25 percent at a few other team trial regattas throughout the year. It might

sound easy, but when you start to think that these junior sailors who qualify are the best of the best – it makes for some tough competition.

For team trials in Brant Beach we paired up with AYC and one other club to combine coaching. They

were lucky to have Connor Conrad and Francisco Renna coaching them for practice and the Regatta. It was nice to have a coach they already knew along with another experienced coach working together to make them stronger sailors.

Unfortunately, due to conflicts, not all of the sailors that qualified from FBYC were able to go to Team Trials. Three out of the six represented FBYC – Guthrie a second-time qualifier, and Josh and Thomas, who were both first-time participants.

It was really windy the first weekend of practice and cold. If they did not have a dry suit already, the sailors had one by the start of the actual regatta. Temperatures were low to mid-50s most of the week and the water was not at all warm.

The first day of the regatta you could feel the excitement from the sailors and parents. There were 226 qualifiers for the event from all over United States. the They were split up into three fleets each day with seven races total taking place. The races were supposed to go through Saturday to determine the Gold and Silver fleets. but due to

heavy rain, high winds and fog, no races took place on Saturday.



The kids hung out at the venue while the race committee tried hard to make the right decision as to race or not race. The kids played cards, shared stories and ran through the puddles having fun and relieving stress while waiting for the verdict. It was a combo of cheers and sadness when the races for that day were called.

Sunday ended up a complete 180 degrees from the day before. It was chilly at 43 degrees, but the sun was shining and the winds were perfect. The teams were separated into one Gold fleet and two Silver fleets. Guthrie and Thomas qualified for Gold fleet and Josh for Silver. As the day went on, the wind continued to shift around making it harder to sail the course, but the sailors all hung in there.

Thomas had a fantastic day ending up the highest that FBYC has ever finished in Team Trials. He was 13th in Gold fleet, even finishing one race in first by a large margin. This has qualified him to go to Asians in Hong Kong in October. Guthrie had almost as good of a day finishing 25th in Gold fleet earning him a spot on the North American International Regatta in Toronto. Josh started the day out well getting a seventh in the Silver fleet, but sadly he was black flagged at the start of the last race, leaving him at 78 overall in Silver fleet. Gold fleet was 75 boats and Silver was 151 boats total.

Overall, the kids did great and seemed to have a lot of fun. They hung out with sailors from all over when they were not racing or practicing. They went to the movies, played putt-putt golf and ran on the beach even in the cold. They all came away with better skills, wider range of friends and great memories. I know they are all aiming to qualify again next year. Hopefully this time it will be in a bit warmer location. The club did a great job with the event and managed parents, sailors and parking beautifully.

THE PIANKATANK TROPHY (A/K/A THE ROCKING CHAIR) BY JERE DENNISON, HISTORIAN

(If this article seems vaguely familiar to readers, it is because it is similar to an earlier version submitted to **The Log** in 2011. However, it has been revised and

updated in response to popular request.)

One of our oldest, yet surely not the most coveted, of FBYC's perpetual trophies bears the name of the Piankatank Trophy. It takes the form of a full-sized wooden rocking chair covered with brass plates engraved with the names of recipients since first awarded to Andy Sinnickson in 1951. During most of its existence, a ceramic jug filled with rum was attached as an analgesic to cushion the public "humiliation" to which the recipient would be treated. Alas, the jug has been lost. It is also mystifying that there was no award made for a full decade bracketed by Peter Roughton in 1956 and Jerry Kambourian in 1967 and for 2016 as well. It is hard to believe that there were no eligible candidates during these periods.

Officially the deed requires that the Trophy be awarded to the Club member "whose actions during the sailing season best exemplify the principle that all is not lost until the boat sinks." Obviously the award is a gleeful exercise in roasting a member for his sailing mishaps over the past year. That is not to say that recipients lack the requisite boat handling skills to stay out of trouble most of the time. The names of some of our more experienced and accomplished sailors embellish the Rocking Chair. However, when the stars malignantly align, even the best among us often cannot avoid a fateful encounter with misfortune.

The Rocking Chair award is normally the most highly anticipated presentation at the Annual Meeting each year. This is due to the amusing citation recited while the 'victim' is humbly enthroned on his rocker. The citations can be either poetry or prose, composed by a member or members who are especially knowledgeable about the embarrassing incidents that qualify candidates for the award. This brings me to the main point of this article...we have not always maintained an archive of these citations so many of the actions for which the past winners were credited have been lost to history. Of course, this robs many members unable to attend the Annual Meeting of the opportunity to participate in the jocularity of the moment.

Consequently your Historian issued a Decree back in 2010 that henceforth every citation for the Piankatank Trophy be published in the Log as soon as practical after each Annual Meeting and be maintained in the archives for the bemusement of future generation of Club sailors. I am pleased to report a success in this endeavor. The following citations are now under the perpetual protection of the Club Historian: 2010 John Wake; 2011 Wayland Rennie; 2012 Alex Alvis; 2013 Phil Webb; and 2015 Bob Fleck & Glenn Doncaster. Disappointingly, as previously mentioned, no member qualified as a recipient in 2016, a travesty that I find hard to comprehend!
