TOWARD THE WINDWARD MARK

With the hot days and summer sea breeze now upon us, thoughts of next year are already in the minds and emails of FBYC members. Yes, planning for an annual event often starts right after the current event has finished.

A heartfelt thanks to those who worked so hard to make FBYC's support of the 17th year of the Leukemia Cup Regatta such a success. We had two days of moderate temperatures and winds, combined with a fun competitive spirit and a worthy cause. Lud Kimbrough and David Hinckle ran excellent race courses, and the onshore events were lively and well attended. Most importantly, FBYC helped raise more than \$108,000 for this important cause. For the 2018 Leukemia Cup, Hampton Yacht Club member Alan Bomar will be passing the Event Chair reigns to FBYC's own Diane Simon. We look forward to FBYC again providing support.

In mid-July FBYC received a notice of approval for the East Dock replacement. The permit was issued by the Virginia Marine Resources Commission and allows us to replace the fixed wooden dock with a slightly larger, more easterly floating dock. At its July Board Meeting, the Board of Trustees voted unanimously to approve payment of the permit royalty. Having the permit allows us to proceed with the East Dock replacement on our own schedule, as the permit is valid for up to 10 years. David Clark's and Ted Bennett's leadership and hours of effort and coordination were critical to the successful permitting process.

Also at the July Board meeting, the East Dock Finance Committee, led by FBYC Treasurer Steve Quiriconi and Finance Chair Veronica Hinckle, presented their recommendations for how to finance the cost of building the floating dock. The preferred model, among a number of options they considered, involves a combination of cash and debt. As with any large capital expense, much discussion and debate has taken place over the past two years. Almost all of us agree, however, that when we finally replace the East Dock, we should use new technology and design.

At the August10th Board Meeting, discussion will continue to address the financing and the timing of the project, and a vote will determine if the project will move forward in late 2017-2018. If the project does not move forward in that time frame, simply having the permit in hand is a significant accomplishment that provides the Club with tremendous flexibility.

The Braun family has been members at FBYC since May 2000. Matt Braun held numerous positions on committees and the Board of Trustees, culminating in his service as Commodore in 2015. He has been a staunch One-Design Division supporter, owning and sailing several Front Runners (and always happy to loan them out), as well as an early and enthusiastic adopter of the J/70 class. His wife A.L. Braun has also held leadership positions in the Junior Division, most recently running another very successful Junior Week. Sadly for us, they have decided to move to Florida so they can sail year-round! Matt and A.L.'s son, Guthrie, has enjoyed great success on the Opti circuit and will pursue sailing at a higher level. On behalf of FBYC, I would like to thank the Brauns for their many contributions to FBYC: they will be sorely missed and always welcome back.

REAR COMMODORE -

HOUSE CHAIR – Reported the following:

- All-Around Construction (Gloucester) completed the re-roofing of Fannie's House at a cost of \$400 above the original quote.
- A standardized contract for use with all contractors has been created and will be put into use.

SOCIAL CHAIR – Shared the following:

 July 4th Cookout: About 100 people attended. Many thanks to Ted Bennett and Tony Sakowski for their great work at the grills, Brad Squires for pulling drafts, Myra Bennett and Kate Sakowski for their help in the kitchen, Brian for setting up and icing down the drinks, and Allene for great slaw, beans, and mac and cheese.

GROUNDS CHAIR – Reported:

- Dixon has done a great job getting annuals planted near the pool and Main Clubhouse.
- Propose reducing the number of storage units. Currently we have 33 units but only 16 are paying.

YAM CHAIR – Reported:

- Good participation by the YAMs at the Leukemia Cup event.
- Upcoming activities include a Cornhole Tournament on the Sunday of the Stingray Regatta and an Octoberfest Event (location to be determined.

VICE COMMODORE -

FLEET CAPTAIN – Reported that he did an extensive flag inventory and all is in good shape.

OFFSHORE DIV CDR. – Reported the following:

- Distance Series
 - Upcoming Races: Smith Point, August 19th; Wolf Trap, September 9th.

ONE DESIGN DIV. CDR. – Reported:

 The Fourth of July celebration (on July 2nd) in conjunction with the OD Long Distance Race was well attended with almost 20 boats and a light but steady breeze.

CRUISING DIV. CDR – Shared that the upcoming Captain's Choice Cruise has good participation with 12 boats/30 people. Urbanna is the destination and Ted Bennett has the lead. August will host the Wee Dram, as well as another three-day Captain's Choice.

JUNIOR DIV. CDR – Reported the following:

- Opti Kids
 - Paul and Julie Ann Wash did an outstanding job leading for third year and were supported by

coach Luke Hayes, Claire Lennarz and Amanda Almany along with CITs Michael Mason and Anne-Kinsey Wash.

- Participating sailors numbered 26.
- Junior Week
 - A.L. Braun lead for the second year and was assisted by Julie Ann Wash.
 - More than 40 people volunteered their time for the entire week serving as instructors, coach boat managers, on-shore logistics, first aid and safety boats.
 - Commodore David Lennarz hosted a dinner for the full-time volunteers and their families on Sunday night before Junior Week.
 - Almost 170 juniors participated (including CITs).
- Development Teams
 - Team has increased to nine sailors with plans to participate in local regattas as well as USODA Nationals being held in Norfolk in late July.
- Race Teams
 - Three race (420, Laser & Opti) teams made up of 45 sailors began practice on Sat 6/10 and will sail six days a week through 8/13.
- Annual Junior Regatta -
 - Charlie and Sandy Brewer ran for a second consecutive year.
 - Exactly 130 Sailors participated in the event
 - Sandy and team ensured sailors were well-fed with continental breakfast each day and a wonderful BBQ dinner on Saturday Night.

FLEET LIEUTENANT – Reported that all Club boats must have all the necessary safety items on board at all times. An audit of each boat will be done to ensure that all safety gear is in place and readily available.

GENERAL MANAGER – Reported on the following:

- All members are now able and encouraged to post news articles to the website.
- The ramp is being power-washed on a weekly basis.

OLD BUSINESS: Notice received regarding the current agreement concerning the cut-out slip. The current arrangement with a local property owner who owns a percentage of the slip property allows for the Club to use the slip. The owner has given a year's notice to terminate the agreement.

NEW BUSINESS: David reported that there was a recent death on Stove Point. It is currently being investigated, and the Flag is following the police released information closely.

MINUTES / SPECIAL NOTICES

The county has purchased property on Paradise Lane with the intent of building a public boat ramp and parking. Many neighbors have voiced opposition, including the Stove Point Improvement Association, for fear of increased traffic on Jackson Creek. Discussion on whether or not the Club should also send a letter of concern.

There is a current movement for a "No Wake" zone on Jackson Creek. Brian is investigating the process for establishing no wake zones, should the Club be interested in pursuing this for Jackson Creek.

There has been some discussion about possibility eliminating the printing of the Yearbook each year as well as scaling back the production of the *Log*. Steve and Veronica will pull together the numbers for producing both of these items so that that Board has a good idea of costs.

Member Brooks Zerkel gave a presentation on creating new safety procedures for both offshore and One-Design sailing divisions. He is working to put a new plan of action into place that will include "On The Water Emergency Response Cards." These cards contain step by step instructions on what to do should there be a medical emergency on your boat. The cards will be laminated and made available to all members; they will also be posted around the Clubhouses and on Club-owned boats. The local rescue squads and Coast Guard would like to have a drill with Club members. The Off-Shore Commander and Fleet Captain will be working with Brooks on an emergency action plan for the Club.

East Dock Replacement – Finance Committee Funding Recommendations:

Steve Quiriconi gave a presentation to the Board to recommend a funding solution to the Board of Directors of FBYC for the replacement /construction of the East Dock. The projected cost is \$500,000 inclusive of all permits and paperwork. Commodore's comments:

- Combination of cash and debt
- Must utilize Annual Dues increases (3%-5% range) to be viable
- Premium fees for east dock slip holders (it is already full subscribed)
- Why now?
 - Dock approval received from Marine Resource Commission (permit)
 - East dock is only in fair condition and is the most vulnerable
 - Delaying will likely cause greater financial strain in several years if middle or west docks need

- replacement all around the same time
- Neighboring marinas moving to floating docks (need to remain competitive)
- By year eight substantial cash generation

Steve presented various funding options to the Board for their consideration. These options are to be considered and are open for discussion. An August vote will be needed to get the new dock completed in 2018.

Marine Resource Commission Permit: After much work, this permit for the potential new docks has been issued. The royalty amount was negotiated from \$40,000 to \$25,000. This permit is good for 10 years, but is now ready to be funded and issued. A motion was made to pay for the permit at a total of \$25,410.25, the motion was seconded and unanimously approved.

4TH ANNUAL WEE DRAM CRUISE BY JIM RAPER

The Wee Dram will again venture to Cape Charles, VA on August 12th...their slips are a confirmed 18' depth. We have reserved 'C' dock at the Town Harbor and if we should need more slips, those are available:

This remains a casual cruise/race format with a formal (shorts and tee shirts – no holes) social Saturday afternoon in Cape Charles.

To emphasize the cruising aspect of the 'getting there,' and to assure a worthy recipient of the 2017 Wee Dram burgee, each boat will submit two scavenger hunt tickets naming items typically found on a proper cruising vessel... i.e. in-boom furling, electric winch, a third anchor, water maker, microwave, rail mounted grill, dingy – etc. These tickets will be collected before departure on the table in Fannie's, placed in Mason jar and guarded by the event chairman until drawn.

Saturday afternoon, on the dock at Cape Charles, while we are sampling brown bag Scotch Whisky and eating appetizers, each skipper will draw two tickets from the jar at random. If a skipper draws a ticket naming an item that is present on his vessel at Cape Charles, that ticket earns him 30 seconds per mile of additional handicap to his rating – and if he has both, then a one minute increase to the boat's handicap.

VAGABOND CRUISE 2017

Vagabonds are aimless wanderers. Who among us hasn't met a sailor fitting that description? To honor the vagabonds within our ranks, the Cruising Division sponsored a Bay cruise with four planned rendezvous points separated by days of freelance wandering. This report's intent is to tell what we learned at each of the planned destinations.

6/8/17- Gibson Island, where *Pharos, Tender Mercies*, and *Reveille* gathered to share a meal. The venerable Gibson Island Yacht Squadron, founded in 1924, remains an elegant private club to this day, now with superb new facilities. GIYS reciprocates with FBYC, has both transient moorings and slips, and charges FBYC sailors below market rates. But when you go to Gibson Island, bring a checkbook and a collared shirt, perhaps with a blazer, because credit cards and T-shirts are NOT part of the GIYS dinner scene.



6/10/17- Havre de Grace, where *Pharos*, *Tender Mercies*, and *Reveille* gathered to try a new destination. Like many Bay towns, this one is in transition from a working waterman's town to a recreational

boating destination. Here a menagerie of craft gather, from old deadrises to blazing cigarette boats, from trawlers to sailboats of every variety, including two harbor shipwrecks, one still partially submerged against a seawall, the other dangling pathetically at a mooring.

The town has numerous restaurants, shops, a well-stocked marina store, and a jewel of a little maritime museum, as well as nearby grocery and liquor stores accessible by a loaner vehicle from the Tidewater Marina. For sailors traversing the C&D Canal who need provisions and have time for a layover, Havre de Grace represents an alternative to the convenient but sparsely supplied marinas that currently dot that route.

6/14/17- Chestertown, home to Washington College, where *Pharos* and *Tender Mercies* sampled the offerings of the National Music festival while the crew of *Reveille* slept. On the following day all FBYC crews and guests boarded the Chester River Packet for a sunset dinner cruise down the idyllic and historic Chester River. One caveat: The Town Marina facilities are dilapidated and dreary. Visit Chestertown, but wait until next season when new floating docks are scheduled to be completed.

6/20/17- Cambridge, where Reveille and Tender Mercies landed while Southern Cross underwent minor repairs in nearby Oxford. The Cambridge Yacht Club exceeded our expectations. CYC's Wednesday night special dinner for members and transients was irresistible and very affordable. The Wednesday night races enlisted 15 keelboats, many skippered by parents or grandparents and crewed by their families. An active group of juniors spent each day mastering the art of sailing under the tutelage of 7 paid instructors. Clearly CYC is doing something right. The town of Cambridge, like other Eastern Shore towns, has many fine old homes in good repair, magnificent large sycamores, and museums. One of the latter honors Harriet Tubman, who achieved fame for her heroic service to runaway slaves in the Underground Railroad.

Although the Vagabond cruisers were a small flotilla, they are not short on opinions. The skipper and first mate of *Tender Mercies* provided a consensus summary of the Vagabond experience; "we were able to spend the night in 13 anchorages or marinas that we had never visited before- an unusual experience after 20 years of cruising on the Chesapeake......The Vagabond Cruise experience was a concept worth repeating."


