ACROSS THE FINISH...

Almost a year ago, my first Log article outlined several goals for 2017. While much remains to be done, the Board accomplished three of its most significant goals:

1. Hiring a New General Manager This time last year, a small committee

set out to hire a new General Manager. By now, many of you have met Brian Ankrom and have had the opportunity to observe his hard work over the past year. His support for all divisions, from helping with Junior Week, after race and Friday night socials, new member meetings, set-up and breakdown of large events such as the Open House Regatta, AOD Regatta, Stingray Point Regatta, Cruising Division dinners and weddings, plus his regular attendance

2. Building a New East Dock

With Board approval, our various dock committees completed a design and received Virginia Marine Resource Commission approval for construction of our new floating East dock. The real challenge was how to pay for the \$500,000 project. Again with the approval and encouragement of the Board, Rob Whittemore, Paul Wash, Ted Bennett, Bev Crump, and I kicked off on a fundraising campaign to raise at least \$150,000 in donations toward this project. I actually hoped to reach \$200,000.

on grounds and at Board meetings, has been well received

by members. Now that Brian has experienced nearly a first full year, we anticipate tasking him with new projects in

2018 to provide even more support to our Club activities.

I am pleased to report that as of mid-October we exceeded our goal and have raised \$191,650

Members pledged donations of all sizes, and many who donated are not even slip holders. Contributions came from the Junior, Cruising, Offshore, and One Design Divisions, and nearly all Board members. With contracts for construction of the dock signed, our Finance Committee is now in the process of finalizing financing. By mid-January, the new

docks should be arriving by truck. Installation is scheduled to be completed by Opening Day 2018.

Thank you very much to all who pledged a contribution. With your generous support, this project will come to fruition and bring tremendous financial benefit to the entire Club for years to come.

3. An Unplanned Loss and a Welcomed Addition

On October 6th, Meg Rock resigned as Executive Secretary. Meg interacted with many of you during her four year tenure. She was organized, professional, and always a joy to work with. She kept the Board on track and organized, and she dedicated herself to FBYC right up to her last weeks.

On October 14th she succumbed to cancer following nearly a decade long battle. The large contingent of FBYC members who attended her funeral on October 20th was a testament and tribute to Meg's contributions and an indication of just how much we will miss her.

Shortly after announcing her resignation, Meg helped us to hire her replacement. The hiring committee selected Donna Mason to serve as Executive Secretary. Donna is a logical choice, as she worked with Meg for many years and helped with FBYC matters during Meg's absences. With extensive professional experience, Donna is also a natural fit for the position, bringing enthusiasm and willingness to learn what Meg could not teach her. We are fortunate to have her join us.

FBYC is in a strong financial position, and we enjoy a vibrant membership. New and returning FBYC Board members have set their goals for 2018. I'm confident that their leadership of FBYC is strong, and we have much to be thankful for as we look to the year ahead.

NOTICE TO JACKSON CREEK SLIP HOLDERS

Effective January 1, 2018, slip rental rates for the West and Middle docks will be calculated on a per foot basis (\$4.85 month / \$58.20 year / 25' minimum), versus the current size-range rate schedule, based on the published Length Over All (LOA). This change is being implemented to modernize our billing practice in line with current technology and industry standards. Note that East Dock rates will be billed the same way, but at a higher level (\$7.30 month / \$87.60 year/25' minimum) to reflect the added value of the new floating docks. LOWER POTOMAC CRUISE (SEPT 9-16) GORDON AND JANE CUTLER

After anxiously watching hurricane Irma, the Lower Potomac Cruise got underway on schedule with seven boats, tacking into NE winds at 13-23 knots to the Crazy Crab marina and restaurant in Reedville. The Bennetts, Koedels, Walkers, and Galloways tied up to the face dock, while the Sadlers, Schotts, and Cutlers anchored out. It had been a while since the FBYC cruisers had returned to this nearby destination, and we were pleased with the service and quality of the dinner at Crazy Crab.

Sunday again brought breezy NE winds. After motoring to Smith Point, we turned up the Potomac and sailed at hull speed to White Point marina on the Yeocomico River—a new destination for our cruising group. Ann and GG Gray joined the cruise there, having made the trip from Deltaville in one day. The White Point Yacht Club graciously made their adjacent club facilities available to us. We grilled dinners of our choice, made use of their club dishware, and enjoyed a very pleasant evening at picnic tables on the club's front patio.

Monday brought more NE to E winds, perfect for the sail to Breton Bay and Leonardtown—another new destination for our fleet. Despite cruise guide warnings of 4-5 foot depths at the town landing, 3 boats were able to dock in 5-6 foot water at the western end of the town landing, and 4 boats anchored a short distance offshore. Due to Jane's excellent planning, the mayor's office had been notified of our arrival, and the mayor himself greeted us with two bottles of wine courtesy of the town, and one of his staff members drove eight of us to the restaurant up the hill from the landing. We dined at The Front Porch restaurant in the historic Sterling House, constructed in the 1850s.

Leonardtown has become popular for employees from

the nearby Patuxent Naval Air Station, with new condos, beautifully renovated older homes, and interesting shops. The waterfront, which 16 years ago had become a dilapidated collection of rotting pilings and obsolete commercial buildings, has been completely restored to a lovely town landing, park, and elevated walkway over natural marshland. In the future, floating docks are planned for the east end of the waterfront, which will make this an even more attractive destination for visiting boaters.

On Tuesday the brisk winds abandoned us, and we motored down Breton Bay and up the Potomac to Colonial Beach, where we spent an extra day to allow time for varied individual activities. We dined at The Lighthouse on Thai-French cuisine, and many of the fleet rented golf carts for a tour of the town.

Thursday we motor-sailed in 5-10 knots wind to St. Mary's College (on the St. Mary's River). School was in session, and after docking—with the college's permission—at the college waterfront, we sat in Bar Harbor chairs and watched the sailing and rowing teams doing their daily practice. Some of us wondered: "Why didn't I go to college here?" We dined at the college Campus Center—where the food was much better and varied than I remember from our college days—and then anchored a short way off their docks for the evening. Several students decided on an evening swim off the rowing docks, and a lovely voice floated over the waters from a student singing on the docks.

On Friday all but one of our fleet made the trip back to Deltaville after a lovely September week with near perfect weather. The Galloways opted for one more night on the water, dropping anchor in Little Bay. All in all, it was a delightful week, with three new destinations for many of us on the cruise.
