FISHING BAY YACHT CLUB - BOARD MEETING

July 12, 2018 - Retreat Hospital

HOUSE CHAIR – Stephen H. Montgomery: BATH HOUSE UPGRADES:

We will be concentrating on completing the porch refresh plan going forward. The floor will be finished next and then furnishings redone or replaced. Our progress has been limited by staff resignations; this work is "on the list" when we get to it.

OTHER: We awarded a painting contract for exterior work on the Club House and other miscellaneous areas at a very reasonable cost. The roofs on the two walk out porches will be painted as soon as the fiberglass repairman can arrange it. The large grill at the Clubhouse has been replaced. The smaller grill works but needs a new igniter, and will likely be moved to outside the Bath House porch. We have had a nagging condensate drip on the front porch; it was determined one of the AC units upstairs never had the primary and back up condensate lines installed correctly. For a modest amount that is being corrected for a permanent solution.

SOCIAL CHAIR – Geoff Cahill:4th of July Long Distance Race and Family Cookout was well attended despite warm temperatures and light breezes. Craig Wright and his Race Committee team gave the sailors a challenging course followed by a great Awards Ceremony during the cookout. Ed and Diane O'Connor and their cookout crew provided excellent food for close to 100 hungry partygoers including a good number of new members. November 17th is the Commodore's Ball at the Commonwealth Club. Preliminary arrangements have been made with the venue people and Allene and I are starting to put together our crew of helpers. Allene will be looking for help with flower arrangements that afternoon. I'll be recruiting help at the Registration Desk and with drink ticket sales.

JUNIOR DIV. CDR. - Mark Wensell:

- **Opti Kids:** Tim Feehan did an outstanding job leading the class of 14 new sailors and was ably assisted by coaches Trent and Garrett Levy. The class was held over two weekends (June 9/10 and 16/17) in perfect weather conditions. During the 4 ½ day sessions the sailors did a tremendous amount of learning and sailing, as well as enjoying a family ice cream social and picnic lunch. Kudos to Julie-Ann Wash and Joanna Wensell for organizing the social activities.
- Junior Week: Occurred on the week of 6/18 6/22.
 Melanie Mason led the effort and was assisted by Julie-Ann Wash, Jennifer Bendura and Joanna Wensell.
 45 people volunteered their time for the entire week serving as instructors, coach boat managers, on shore

IN MEMORIAM

Robert R. Rock
November 15, 1933 - June 16, 2018



Robert R. Rock, 84, patriarch of a loving family, an accomplished sailor, long-time coach and football official, passed away peacefully, surrounded by his family, on June 16, 2018. Born in Baltimore, he

lived in Ruxton, Maryland, graduating from Loyola-Blakefield. He was an immensely proud graduate of Villanova University, having earned a degree in mechanical engineering. Upon graduation, he was commissioned as an ensign in the U.S. Navy and served as a Naval flight officer, retiring as a Lieutenant Commander.

He began his storied coaching career in Towson, Maryland, with the Rodger's Forge Reds. In 1968, he moved to Richmond as Branch Manager for American Air Filter. In 1969, he was the first Head Football Coach at St. Edward; during his time there his winning percentage was .950. For nearly 20 years, he served as player-manager of the St. Edward men's softball team. A legendary coach in the Benedictine Middies program, he enjoyed seeing and being recognized by his former players, many of whom went on to play at the college level. He was an official of the Virginia High School League, officiating football for over 20 years. A past Commodore of Fishing Bay Yacht Club, he raced fast boats (Shamrock I and II) and not so fast (Valiant) with many dedicated, loyal crew members.

He was a parishioner of St. Edward Catholic Church for 50 years. He was predeceased by his parents, Leo Peter and Catherine Robertson Rock; and his daughter, Meg Rock. He is survived by his wife, Margaret Rock; his son, Robert R. Rock Jr. (Lisa) of Jacksonville, Florida; and his grandchildren, Timothy Rock of Tallahassee, Tess Rock of New York City, Hank Reidy and Robert Reidy, both of Richmond. CAPTAIN'S CHOICE CRUISE JULY 6-8, 2018 JANE AND GORDON CUTLER

On the evening of July 6—as Tropical Depression 3 (later Tropical Storm Chris) moved up the East Coast, causing cancellation of the Seabreeze Regatta, and as the Young Adult Members gathered for movie night on the clubhouse porch—the Cruising Group, representing 12 boats and 36 crew and guests, met upstairs for a pre-cruise dinner. Special attendees included former FBYC "First Ladies" Connie Garrett and Myra Bennett, and Nancy and Sam Stoakley—who for many years cruised their beloved Reflections—sailing with George and Francis Sadler. Also attending were Scott and Louisa Sirles, who have just returned Joyful in good repair, and Stella and Charlie Jones, with Nugget repaired from hail damage over the winter. With help from Brian and crew setting up tables. members contributing food and table decorations, and Jane providing main dishes, a fine time was had by all. The fleet had hoped that the forecast winds would be safely manageable for a cruise up the Rappahannock to Yankee Point, but Saturday arrived with 25-30 knot NE winds pinning many boats in their slips, and leaving slips and sailing around Stingray Point did not seem prudent under the conditions. Nonetheless. Tender Mercies. Miss Kate, and Jabberwock (leaving from Broad Creek) made the sail to Yankee Point Marina, which proved to be a pleasant reach once safely in the river. Riding with the Sakowskis were friends Bill and Jane Ranson, and with the Grays were Andy Soyars and Steve and Margaret Montgomery. By evening, the winds had moderated and most of the planned attendees arrived by car to enjoy appetizers together under clear skies and dinner at Windows on the Water.

Sunday arrived with bright sunshine, low temperature and humidity, and 15-22 knot NE winds, which allowed

for a single port tack on a close reach down the Rappahannock—just over 2 hours from Yankee Point Marina to Stingray Point Light. While we relearned that nature has the upper hand in the cooperative venture between sailors and nature, it was, all in all, a lovely weekend with a great group of friends brought together by their love of sailing.

THE LEGEND OF STINGRAY POINT REVISITED BY GEORGE BURKE, FBYC HISTORIAN

All of you know the story well. America's first hero, Captain John Smith, leads a series of expeditions from Jamestown to explore the shores of the Chesapeake. In the spring of 1608, his shallop runs aground in eelgrass on a shoal at the southern point of the Rappahannock. A migratory school of Cownose Rays are spotted feeding in the grasses, and Smith, in his zeal, spears one with the point of his sword, incurring an intolerably painful arm wound from the animal's poisonous tail.

Then the story becomes enchanting. Nearby Native Americans, observing the captain's distress, come to the rescue by transporting him to the north point of the Rappahannock, where they administer a curative poultice from the magical mud of a nearby creek, thereafter called "Antipoison Creek." Smith is cured, subsequently eats the stingray, and names the site of the incident "Stingray Point." By explaining geography, making history more palpable, depicting a harmonious episode between two cultures, even invoking a hint of animism, the story is charming on many levels. But is it true? Multiple sources, including Walter Cronkite's Around America, Dozier's Waterway Guide, and Wikipedia's article on Stingray Point, Virginia, tell the above version.

However, the only eyewitness account of the episode, that of Captain John Smith, is recounted in his journal published in London in 1612 under the title *The General Historie of Virginia*, *New England*, *the Summer Isles*. That work tells a different tale. Smith describes his distress over the wound with the following: "Yet it pleased God by a precious oyle Doctor Russell at the first applyed to it when he sounded with a probe this tormenting paine was so well assuaged that he (Smith) eate of the fish to his supper....". There is no mention of Indians to the rescue, magical poultices, or a journey to a creek. As happens so often, a doctor has spoiled the story. The version we tell appears to be what today we know as FAKE NEWS.

How, then, did Antipoison Creek become part of the legend? Lancaster County's *Record Book*, which dates back to the 1600s, contains an early reference to "Nantepoison Neck," restated in other entries as "Nantepoizen," "Nantypoyson," and even "Nanty Rorson." What were the origins of these names? Were they corruptions of a Native American term? The name of a local settler misspelled, as so often occurred in those days? Who knows? What we do know is that "Antipoison" did not appear in the record until the 19th century.

S-o-o-o, how did Nantepoizen become Antipoison? Your historian prefers the whimsical explanation proffered in a Rappahnnock Record editorial addressing the same question in 1967: "Like an old worn coin, the name was passed around until one of its letters got rubbed off and then.... Picture a group of long-ago Virginia Gentlemen seated before the commanding windows of the Westmoreland Club in Richmond, and one of them says, 'Tom, you're from Lancaster. What've you got in that far-off spot anyway?' The one addressed, State Senator Tom Downing (who served in the late 19th and early 20th century), squints judiciously into his tall frosty glass and begins ex tempore, 'What've we got?' He pauses, letting his silence sharpen attention. He turns his glass to catch the sunset glow, raises it, lowers it, smiles, 'We've got sir, the everlasting honor of saving the life of the fearless Englishman to whom every Virginian pays allegiance, Captain John Smith!'

Most myths are true on some level, even if untrue literally. Perhaps that is the justification for most who like to tell the charming "fake news" version of the legend rather than the one supported by the facts. But your historian also prefers the fake news version, and will continue shamelessly to tell it to visitors, because nothing should stand in the way of a good story.



SAILING'S LEGACY

In the July edition of the Log there was an announcement that the Legacy of Sail Regatta, originally the Geezer Regatta, will now become the Jere Dennison Legacy Regatta to be held on August 25. With the name change, there is also a new competition category, the Vintage Skipper award.

The genesis of the event was primarily Jere's idea. As he looked around the One Design fleets and saw ancient mariners beginning to recede, he conceived of a way to keep them in the game by creating a competition open only to skippers 60 or older, i.e. "geezers". Jere earned the naming rights for this regatta the honest way, by eventually becoming a geezer himself. But his lasting contributions started long before that, beginning in 1955 with his exploits as a junior racer, continuing with his long tenure on the FBYC Board including becoming our youngest Commodore in 1975, and culminating in his service as our gifted Club Historian for 15 years. From Jolly Boats to Lasers to Mobjacks to Scots, there was hardly a One Design that Jere didn't skipper or crew over those years. No one more than Jere understood that sailing is a lifelong adventure for all ages and an ancient legacy to be passed from generation to generation.

JUNIORS SAILING ABROAD BY JORDAN BENDURA

This winter while in Argentina sailing in a "once in a lifetime event," I was offered another opportunity that I could not resist. In fact, it's one that I don't think any sailor could. All around this trip was one of the best that I have ever been on, and I was able to learn a lot as a sailor and also as a person by experiencing a new culture. I am sure the same goes for Jackson, as he made the whole trip possible and made it a blast.


