CLUB-OWNED BOATS: THE WAY FORWARD

It is hard to believe that summer is basically over. By the time you read this, the kids will all be back in school. AOD was another great success, thanks to Becca Doncaster, Massey Whorley, and their team of volunteers. This event is our biggest resource challenge every year, and I can't thank all the on-the-water and shoreside volunteers enough for all of the effort that they put into this great event. Congrats to John and Sharon Wake for winning the Hawksworth Trophy!

Over the years, many of our membership-related studies and polls have listed one of the big impediments to Fishing Bay Yacht Club membership as boat ownership. For this reason, the majority of successful yacht clubs all over the country now have some sort of a club-owned boat program. The Board has been gradually exploring the idea of starting a club-owned boat program at Fishing Bay. While there are many challenges to such a program, the potential benefits far outweigh the costs. Thanks to the generous donations from the Geezer Syndicate (Ted Bennett, Doug Andersen, Ed O'Connor, and George Burke), Buck and Maxine Brewer, and former member Marshall Orr, the Club now owns three Flying Scots.

While I freely admit that the Flying Scot isn't the sexiest boat out there, I firmly believe it is the right boat for our

Club to start our own club-owned boat program. The boat fits well with our existing shoreside and financial limitations, as there is no required crane launching and the boats are affordable and have a strong resale market in the event the program fails to meet our expectations. If we create a successful program, we will also have the ability to upgrade our fleet.

Ideally, the goal of this program would be to provide a platform for members to **learn how to sail** and would augment our existing **one-design fleet racing** program. In addition, having Club-owned boats available for member use potentially draws new members who would like to sail, but who currently don't own a boat. Finally, this program would also allow us to start **match** and team racing (again). Our hope is that this program will attract former college sailors (either former members of our junior program or new members) who are looking to be involved in team racing after college.

One of our biggest challenges as a club is **retaining** and bringing back our junior members after they graduate from college. I look around the Club and I don't see too many of my childhood peers active in the Club. Yes, there are exceptions, but not many. Our hope is that a club-owned program will help bring these sailors back to the Club once they graduate, and that over time they will transition into boat ownership themselves. The goal is to keep these people involved in the Club for life!

The Club does a great job of making sure that our children all know how to sail, but there are many families with only one spouse who knows how to sail (yes, mine included). Through the club-owned boat program, we hope to be able to create training opportunities. Our goal should be to provide an opportunity for **every Club member who wants to learn to sail** to do so!

Yes, a club-owned boat program is an ambitious undertaking for our Club, but so was a new clubhouse, various land purchases, and a floating dock. I think we are up to the challenge!

MINUTES - August 2018

FISHING BAY YACHT CLUB - BOARD MEETING

August 9, 2018 – Retreat Hospital

HOUSE CHAIR – Stephen H. Montgomery:

STAFF CHANGES: Eric Perkins has joined Brian's staff as general maintenance and projects person.

BATH HOUSE UPGRADES: We will be concentrating on the completing the porch refresh plan going forward. The floor will be finished next and then furnishings redone or replaced. It is our next priority for attention.

MEMBER ACCESS AND SECURITY PLAN: The Board approved a short-term planning team to recommend improvements in member access, safety and security. I do not expect to have anything for the Board until the Fall. Members agreeing to serve include Tracey Schwarzschild, Lud Kimbrough, Paul Almany, Mary Catherine Ciszewski, and Jeremy Waters.

OTHER: Painting exterior work on the Club House should begin very soon. Our septic tank had to be pumped out; the overflowing conditions most likely were related to the rain and flooded drain field.

DOCKS CHAIR - Mayo Tabb:

- 1. All slips are leased, and boats are moving in; 6 boats on the waiting list – 29,33,37,43 and 44 feet, 4 boats on Priority list for transfer to East Dock
- 2. Some slip holders have been leaving power corded plugged in and laying on dock when they leave which is very dangerous as live electrical cord could fall into the water. Some slip holders are turning off power with the breakers in Power Pedestals marked "For Equipment protection only" these GFI breakers are not designed to be turned on and off and if do so will fail prematurely. A notification to all slip holders on AC power safety will be sent out including the above.
- **3.** The pump-out line has failed underground at the head of the pump out dock. Brian has engaged Bromley to pump out concrete storage tank and dig and repair failed underground 2" PVC line.

WEB MASTER – **R. Strother Scott**: Strother submitted a written report:

Event Registration Reports - We have several reports, but if someone finds reports that don't provide the information needed, please let me know and tell me what needs to be changed.

Club Boats - During the month, I updated https://www.fbyc.net/fleets/club-boats/, but it still needs Brian to add a few pictures of Club-owned boats and update actual fleet. I think the list is dated.

Event Confirmation emails - I significantly revised the layout and format, though the actual information remains the same. I am interested if people like the idea of encouraging people to like Facebook? I got one generally positive response. Please like FBYC on Facebook.

FLEET CAPTAIN – Brad Miller:

- Replacement Flags ordered.
- Contacted Coast Guard regarding debris floating down the bay. They will keep me posted on announcements on cleaning the debris prior to any events and races.

OFFSHORE DIV CDR. – James L. Raper:

Administration: The FBYC B buoy application is close to being completed and submitted, and the buoy is likely to be installed next spring

Events:

- Distance 1 Cut Channel, 14 participants
- Distance 2 Moonlight* 9 boats registered. Abandoned due to current conditions and forecast for diminishing wind. (Forecast was optimistic; there was less wind than forecast.)
- Distance 4 Wolf Trap Light September 8

Discussion is ongoing about event guidelines to be utilized by FBYC PROs when determining to abandon a race based on forecast conditions. Concern raised was that the Moonlight event was abandoned early (2pm for a scheduled 7pm start), and if wrong, it is detrimental to the FBYC Offshore racing program to cancel events. Further discussion about rescheduling the Moonlight event after Wolf Trap, tentatively September 15, 1st Quarter, 36% visible.

OFFSHORE DIV. RACE CHAIR – Ruthanna M. Jenkins: PROs are in place for all upcoming races except for Fall Offshore #2 on Sunday, October 7.

There is a much smaller pool of people to call on to be PRO for an Offshore Event. I believe that we need to begin a campaign to get more people involved in race committee work on a higher level. It is easy to find someone to be coached through the flags or to agree to record finishes. But finding someone who is willing to take responsibility for other aspects of managing the race is becoming difficult. For instance, we have a very small pool of people who are good mark setters, and when the course is shortened or marks are moved, to pull that off successfully often requires thorough coaching by the PRO.

During the past two years race committee training classes have not been held due to lack of interest. I propose a first step in developing a larger pool of trained RC could be recruiting/inviting people to go out on a mark boat as a trainee during a race with one of our key mark setters

to get experience, so that they are confident that they can do a good job on the mark boat.

JUNIOR DIV. CDR. – Mark Wensell:

• Development Teams:

- Elizabeth Staas has been leading with Trent Levy, Garrett Levy and Nick Cabell coaching;
- 14 sailors have been sailing 4 ½ day sessions per week and will attend 6 local regattas;
- Several are already planning on attending their first USODA event in August in New Jersey;
- Well on their way to completing 25 practices and 8 days of regatta sailing.

Race Teams:

- Three race (420, Laser & Opti) teams made up of 30 sailors have practiced a combined 89 days and raced 77 days of regattas since 6/1;
- Teams will have participated in 18 regattas, including USODA National Championship, USODA Girls National Championship, Laser Qualifiers and the Hyannis Regatta. The teams have also strongly represented FBYC in CBRYA Junior events;
- Already looking ahead to plan off-season practice and regatta opportunities.

August Opti Week:

 7 sailors participated. Even was run by Junior Division Coaches Trent Levy and Garrett Levy. We have had extremely positive feedback on how well they ran the camp, especially considering several days of adverse weather.

2019 Planning:

- Our professional coaches held a well-attended feedback session for Race and Development Team parents. We will be incorporating this feedback into our 2019 planning;
- Working with Junior Division parents to identify 2019 leaders and organizational structure;
- Working with Brian Ankrom, present and past Junior leadership to inventory and assess all program equipment and to develop a maintenance schedule and multi-year capital plan.

FLEET LIEUTENANT – Bob Fleck: Bob stated:

We will be retiring one of the RIB's this year. The windlass for *Mr. Roberts* will be installed by us to cut costs.

ADULT SAILING PROGRAM – **Karen Soule**: Karen submitted a written report:

FBYC now owns three Flying Scots.

Ron Jenkins has done tremendous work surveying, cleaning and refurbishing them. Three one-design boats gives FBYC many opportunities for instruction,

racing, and most importantly attracting new members. It also raises the questions: How do we best utilize these boats? Do we need to direct additional (non-volunteer) resources to take advantage of these boats? Do we want to acquire more Flying Scots and are they the best boats for this purpose?

Sign-ups are underway for the bus trip to the Annapolis Boat Show, VIP Day Thursday, October 4.

GENERAL MANAGER – Brian Ankrom:

The following tasks have been completed since the last Board Meeting:

- New full-time employee Eric Perkins Eric is doing a great job!
- New time keeping platform for the Lifeguards is working well.
- Water system is up and running for AOD.
- Pool will close September 30, 2018

NEW BUSINESS: Commodore Robert Whittemore proposed to the Board the need to look into transition in management of the water system. A committee will be formed to oversee long-range management of the water system. We have been very fortunate to have Wes Jones and David Soule managing the system for years, but in fairness to them and to assure management continuity until public water becomes available in the county, the goal is to identify a professional water management company that may be able to take over the maintenance of the water system. While this will be costly, the importance of the water system to the club demands that we do what we can to make sure that we have appropriate management in place. A request for proposals will be sent out soon attached with costs and timeline.

Our annual town hall meeting will be held on Labor Day, which will include a financial presentation by Veronica Hinkle and a membership overview by Joe Roos. Please send any additional topics that need to be addressed to Rob ahead of the meeting.

WOMEN'S SAILING CLINIC

The 2018 Women's Sailing Clinic was another great success with 22 registrants participating. What's more, we were blessed with fair winds and great instruction. The class was free for members, which is a great member benefit! About half of the students were non-members. and we hope that the class spurred their interest to join. There was a beginner class taught by FBYC's own Caroline Garrett, and a racing class taught by Arabella Denvir, an accomplished international sailor. We started off with a short "chalk talk" for the respective classes, and then the students went out to the parking lot to learn how to rig the Flying Scots and 420s. We used all 3 club-owned Flying Scots and several 420s. Many thanks to Ron Jenkins for getting these boats up and running in short order! Several ladies brought their own Flying Scots, which was great! Once in the water, the beginner students had "free-sail" time while learning skills with an instructor in the boat. They worked on skills such as finding the wind, steering. trimming, and tacking and gybing maneuvers. Meanwhile, the racing class practiced starts and trimming for speed. while sailors gained valuable tiller time. Thunderstorms threatened the weather forecast, but they never appeared.

For the second part of the day, the students joined the Seabreeze Regatta in the afternoon. One Flying Scot from the class joined the regatta, and individual ladies volunteered as crew on other boats. The sea breeze for which the regatta is named decided to kick in later than normal that day, and the wind died after the first race. However, everyone had fun and the consensus was that everyone learned a lot. We hope to see you all back next year!

JOIN THE RACE COMMITTEE TEAM

Our Club's racing program depends on the group of volunteers who serve on the race committee teams. Have you thought about joining our team? We would love to have you, and welcome you to come out and learn one of the specialized jobs.

ADULT SAILING / CRUISING

There are plenty of different jobs on the race committee, and all are vital to a well-run regatta. US Sailing offers training courses for Race Officers. Race Officer status must be renewed every second year by attending a one-day course and passing an online exam. The Principal Race Officer is in charge of and runs the event. Other jobs include Recorder, Scorer, Wind Boss, Boat Driver, Flag Captain, Finisher, Mark Boat Operators, Safety Boat Operator. Training for these jobs is usually done at the club level.

Outside of jobs on the committee boat, mark boat jobs are equally important. For instance, without someone to set the marks, there can't be a race course. And while setting those marks might look easy, getting the mark exactly where the Principal Race Officer wants it requires knowing the system of steps necessary to get the mark and tackle prepared, keeping in mind that the mark needs to be set at a specific distance and bearing from the committee boat. The Mark Boat crew also performs other functions, including moving marks and shortening course. We have some skilled mark setters, and we would be happy to set up a training opportunity on a race day.

Our current team would love to have you join us. Let us know which race committee job you are interested in, and we will set up an on-the-job training day for you so that you can be confident in your ability to be a competent team member. Remember that there is not a race without a race committee. The more capable people Fishing Bay Yacht Club has on race committees, the better able we are to run quality races. 


