BUILDING THE PYRAMID

June is a month of milestones, and we are officially halfway through the year. You may ask yourself, how are we doing? The answer is pretty complex, but not because I cannot answer. Rather, it's because there is

so much going on. We've drawn a lot of parallels between sailing and Club operations already, so I'll continue with that example and update you on the state of affairs.

Someone once explained that sailing and racing is like a pyramid: Start with the basics, and each level of the pyramid is more specialized and builds on the lower level. Much like prepping a boat, the Club Board worked tirelessly to engage volunteers, organize resources, and prepare programs. Without this base, nothing would happen – a credit to the numerous people that make our volunteer-run organization so successful. Once the boat is prepped, now you can actually start sailing. At first, you learn the mechanics: sails up, trim, ease, steer, tune. Most people try and sail with a plan (even if the plan is that there is no plan), so we as a Board established a fourpoint set of goals to provide focus and direction as we sailed through the Club waters: replace the boat ramp, focus on Club-owned boats, increase junior participation across other Club areas, and update our administrative and volunteer processes.

The next level is execution of the plan, applying tactics and strategy, and we jumped right in. First we began looking into what it would take to replace the deteriorating boat ramp. We appointed Mayo Tabb as the de-facto project manager. His first move was to engage an engineering firm to design a ramp that will serve the Club and withstand the rigors of the harsh environment. His next move was to distribute an RFP to all vendors with an eye towards starting the build near or around the final months of 2019. We are on track.

Second, we continue to build the Club-owned boats program. With our three Flying Scots, Caroline Patrick and Ron Jenkins have continued to refine the program. They have introduced a certification step to ensure that those using the boats are qualified. They have also updated policies and procedures and, more importantly, they have continued to drive, recruit, and generally generate interest in using the boats. We want to own more, so if you have a line on a Flying Scot, let a Board member know!

Third, Juniors, Juniors, Juniors. At this point, Junior Week and the Junior Regatta have already happened. While a smashing success under the leadership of Joanna Wensell and droves of volunteers, it is bittersweet. Junior activity signifies the beginning of summer, but coming out of June, it means the end of summer is quickly approaching. So how are we doing? When I look around, I see Juniors everywhere. On offshore, one-design, and cruising boats. I see them volunteering to help support the events. They are in Annapolis, Hampton, and other places. They are participating in Down the Bay, Southern Bay Race Week, Block Island Race Week. You name it, Juniors are there. The Fishing Bay Challenge Bowl is in full effect. Who will win this year? The bottom line is that we are doing exactly what I hoped would happen. Let's keep this pace up!

Fourth, it sounds mundane, but behind the scenes we have implemented numerous updates to our administrative and volunteer processes. If you haven't heard, Strother Scott is retiring from the FBYC webmaster position in which he has served for countless years. He has been working with a committee since December to transition his numerous responsibilities to new owners. These owners are well aligned to handle these tasks. While we will absolutely miss Strother, this does denote a new chapter of modernization for the Club.

In other news, we started looking at Regatta Network in the dead of winter. Now I'm happy to report that we have

adopted the system as the scoring standard for series racing. Next, we transitioned to an electronic log. This has been a huge success and has generated huge cost savings. As we continue throughout the year, we will work to centralize data to a secure cloud drive. This supports the future Board and Flag of the Club, ensuring data is available, accessible, and protected.

Ok, so now we are at the top level of the pyramid and you may ask, what is the sailing parallel? I would say consistency. Now that we have the plan, the execution, the tactics, the strategy, how can we make sure we keep it going? The answer is repetition. Can we continue making strides the rest of the year? Our goal as a Board is to ensure that we position the next Board for success. Just like crew rotating on a boat, the Board rotates and continues to build on the lessons learned each year. Having said that, we are well on the way to achieving this goal, only to repeat it again in six months!

FISHING BAY YACHT CLUB - BOARD MEETING

June 13, 2019 – Retreat Hospital

HOUSE CHAIR – Stephen H. Montgomery:

TOP PRIORITY: The Clubhouse kitchen exhaust hood fire extinguishing system was replaced on May 20. Inspection and certification are the next steps, but can't start until the county approves the "as-built" drawings.

- 1. The extinguishing system installer noted that we lacked the inspection and certification sticker on the exhaust hood indicating the duct had been properly cleaned and degreased at least annually. To my knowledge, the duct has never been properly cleaned. He suggested the fire inspector, when he visited to certify the new extinguishing system, would likely see the lack of this cleaning and either cite us or shut down the kitchen until it is cleaned. To avoid the worst-case situation, I arranged for a proper cleaning and will fund its \$400 cost from operations. This will need to be repeated annually.
- 2. I have evaluated the number and placement of portable fire extinguishers and identified a need for 22 on the campus to meet the simplest NFPA standard of extinguishers in buildings being no more than 75 feet apart. We need to add 16 extinguishers to meet the need. Five-pound ABC rechargeable units will run \$50-\$55 each. I have some more shopping to do, but will likely purchase them over time as budget allows.

- 3. Also, under the safety heading, I am reviewing the need to add smoke detectors for Fannie's and the Clubhouse, as well as carbon monoxide detectors for the Clubhouse. These are standard in private and public buildings to protect occupants, but lacking at FRYC.
- 4. We bought a new grill for the Clubhouse and moved one of the older ones to Fannie's House to replace its grill.

DOCKS CHAIR – James L. Raper:

- All slips are leased.
- There are 15 boats on the waiting list, 8 of which desire a floating slip.
- There are bulkhead repairs required near the lift that are expected to be more substantial than we should attempt in-season. Temporary screws are being added to the planks; it is likely that stringers will need to be replaced in the off-season.
- The crane delivery remains on-schedule as communicated; about 4 weeks out; the existing crane has been performing reliably in the interim (knock on wood).

GROUNDS CHAIR – Douglas S. Bendura:

1. Projects

- a. <u>Poisonous plants</u> They are being removed around the campus this week.
- b. <u>Junior Yard</u> Hourly staff will stake out the yard this weekend ahead of Junior Week
- c. <u>Push mower</u> It is starting to fail. We'll need to purchase another one.
- d. Pests/Insects Vendor is treating Fishing Bay side this week; the cost is \$140. Staff will spray the Jackson Creek side of the property at the same time to see if there's a difference between the vendor service & available lawn products.
- e. Flower bed between club house and Ric's place

 Paused on replacing with gravel to consider additional alternatives.
- f. Water bottle refill stations Partnering with Carrie Russel, Steve Montgomery, and Mayo Tabb to refill bottles at Fannie's, Ric's Place, and possibly main Clubhouse. Will eliminate need to refill water coolers across property during large events and will promote use of re-usable drinkware.
- 2. **Water Service** Continues to run well with no leaks. Replaced pool foot-wash.

The changeover to Regatta Network has been a learning experience, but we are beginning to learn the system and should be able to take advantage of its benefits. A long-term issue for our Club has been getting people to sign up for races in advance. With Regatta Network, we have been unable to accommodate and score a competitor who did not sign up. The good news is that once a boat has signed up for a series event, it does not have to re-register for the following series events. Competitors can register by cellphone or use the Club's computer

to register on the day of the event. We have been able to assist skippers identified as unregistered after the Captain's Briefing.

While the results entered into Regatta Network are automatically posted on the Regatta Network site, they do not post to FBYC's website without a link. Craig Wright has set up the rest of the Offshore Events for the year, and has taken a leadership role in mastering the system. Joe Nelson has been the key individual for One-Design.

We have entered results into Regatta Network on the committee boat by cellphone and by laptop using a hotspot. This is, of course, ideal. We have also entered results from Fannie's House using a texted photo of the finish sheet. This is superb on a day with lots of wave action.


