THE STARTING SEQUENCE HAS BEGUN!

Wow - so many initiatives and projects that it is not easy identifying where to start. Luckily, we have a 5-Star Board and Committee collaborating to not only identify needs but also

manage them positively through to fruition.

Our Docks Committee has been concentrating on the plans, permits and partners for the replacement of the Middle Dock. Under the leadership of our Rear Commodore, Dr. Mark Wensell, the well-vetted committee has numerous tasks in the process requiring talent, tenure and attention. They have made significant progress to ensure our Club receives the best materials for the right price. As our docks are a significant asset to our Club, ensuring their viability as well as providing best in class is our mission. The recent study of area marinas continued to validate that we are the most economical in Middlesex - hence we always have a waiting list. As members buy and sell their boats often we continue to juggle boats and slips to ensure we have the proper size for everyone.

There has also been much assessment and planning for upgrading the electrical footprint of the West Dock. While

this dock is in very solid condition—the electrical system needs refreshment not only for use but also for safety. Mayo Tabb, Ken Johnson and David Hinckle have been appraising best methods for this upgrade and have plans well afoot to design a top-grade system replacement.

Main Clubhouse Mold No More! As many of you have seen or were aware, the mold problem in the Main Clubhouse 2nd floor ceiling has been a struggle the latter half of 2020. Most recently we have had a large section of sheetrock removed in the process of identifying the source and remediating. I have confidence in sharing the area and source have been treated and repairs are underway. We hope to have this process completed by Opening Day - if at all possible. Until it is finished, the 2nd floor is off limits for safety.

The Flag Officers met with the neighbors via our annual Community Advisory Board meeting in early March. Many joined via Zoom which allowed more attendance. The representatives and Club leadership meet annually to share capital improvement plans, upcoming event schedules and also to discuss issues that affect our neighborhood. This group meets as we all share the geographic area and wish to provide each other an open forum for issues as well as areas where collaboration produces positive results for all. Past Commodore. Lud Kimbrough has been an ongoing positive resource to collaborate efforts from FBYC and our neighbors. Besides coordinating all interested parties, he also offers historical knowledge and sage advice. As you can imagine, the incoming new water line was a big topic as well as the Fishing Bay Road (aka lake) that has been prone to even more frequent flooding. The flooding is a concern for all those that utilize the road to get to their homes. FBYC and even more so from a safety aspect for Fire/Rescue. Consider that in the unfortunate event one needs emergency services the road must be passable and viable. Plans are being discussed with full support of the Wetlands Board to determine a solution for the road

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degradation and flooding. Collaboration of resources is key to good neighbors and FBYC is proud to assist in this area. We were so pleased to share that Brain Ankrom and his team were able to patch the significant sized pothole on FB Road (near the dry sail area) in early March. The weeklong stretch of zero rain allowed the area to dry out enough to allow for patching.

Humor aside - it is hard to patch a hole that you know is there, but you cannot see due to the high water. Great work Brian. Also, you may notice a bright orange 'firehouse' at the other end of Fishing Bay Road and orange cones. This is a newly set up process to assist in draining the water from the road. This is temporary - but will provide swifter drainage than mother nature until road reparations can occur. Our neighbor on FB Road graciously allowed for this hose and pump to be placed to alleviate some of the flooding. Many thanks to the Stove Point Association for spearheading this initiative. I must reiterate - good neighbors are nice to have.

The Sailing Events Schedule is finalized! This is always a very big annual task for the Club leadership. Vice Commodore, Joe Roos, led our Division Commanders to develop the schedule for 2021. Each Division to include Cruising, Juniors, One Design, Offshore and their respective sub-divisions must horse-trade the calendar and Club resources every year to ensure allocation on the schedule. We are so pleased to have much more confidence in this coming season with respect to sailing as our community and the nation heals from Covid. The schedule is available on the Club website. Also, as the year appears to be more stable than 2020; we will be publishing the FBYC Yearbook again. It will include member and historical information as well as a summary of the event schedule. We have chosen to keep the event detail as an active directory on the website only. This allows for fluidity for the Event Chairs to be nimble if plans must change. As we are not out of the woods with the Covid crisis, we want to be able to guickly make adjustments to the details of our schedule to ensure safety for all as well as adhere to state guidelines. Your leadership feels this best accomplished via the website. So please use fbyc.net for event details and your "source of truth". Also, make sure you download the FBYC app on your smartphone. It's very handy too!

FISHING BAY YACHT CLUB - BOARD MEETING March 11, 2021 - Via Zoom

TREASURER – K. Stuart Gregory: Over the past month, various invoices have been approved, several discussions about the middle dock have taken place, and I am bracing for the coming onslaught when many activities at FBYC kick into gear.

HOUSE CHAIR – Kenneth Johnson: Bay Restoration removed all drywall, insulation and ventilation baffles from the south half of the clubhouse ceiling to remediate the existing mold. No mold was found anywhere else and air sampling revealed no mold spores after the remediation was completed. We have hired an installer to replace the baffles, insulation and drywall. He will prepare the ceiling for paint and should begin soon with Eric and Ben helping. Brian is searching for a painter. We hope that work will be completed by opening day.

Drywall repairs and perhaps mold remediation is needed in the women's bathhouse. Further investigation is ongoing to discover the source of the moisture. The issue was recently discovered by Brian during preparation for painting.

DOCKS CHAIR – **David Hinckle**: The slips are full. Not a lot of movement on the waiting list. As docks are vacated, I will be filling spots ASAP.

SOCIAL CHAIR – Gary and Karen Akens: Opening Day Plans: At the request of the Flag, we will plan on a small in-person event for Opening Day. Blessing of the Fleet is being arranged by the Commodore. As a social committee, we will plan to provide canned/bottled beverages and individually wrapped treats that can be picked up and enjoyed by individuals and small groups in socially distant ways that can be in compliance with state mandates in effect.

GROUNDS CHAIR – Steve H. Montgomery: Announcement: The Spring Clean Up will be Saturday, April 3rd 9-1. Projects will be developed to focus on preparing for opening weekend. Please sign up on the FBYC Events page so we can get you a box lunch. Rain date is April 10th.

Other Items of Interest:

- There are some electrical issues in the water treatment room: Ken Johnson and I installed a safe hook up for the generator eliminating one of the worst risks. We will be installing new RV hook ups, per Flag's direction, and eliminating the old ones that were shock hazards before opening. Many thanks to Ken for his expertise!
- Brian's team located the water lines where they cross the road in preparation of the County water line being installed. Best news of all is that we will have two fire hydrants on our property so boats and buildings will be well covered.
- I am working with Brian and Wes Jones on the future of the old water system. The Board, in 2015, approved joining the County's water system and discontinuing the current water treatment program, which comes at a significant cost, except for using the well for the pool. I am reviewing this strategy and will report to the Flag and Board in a future date. More to come.

Off-season projects:

- Staff repaired the fence on the east property line; the neighbor has offered to share the costs.
- Staff also repaired and improved the bottom of the grass ramp so the children will have an easier time pulling their trailers from the beach to the ramp if we can fix the transition. Many thanks to Allen Mason for designing the fix.

MEMBER AT LARGE – William H. Schwarzschild, III: Elizabeth, Mayo, and I are looking at the insurance requirements for the boats docked at the Club. All Lessees are current and a new tracking system put in place, there will be further information to come.

MEMBERSHIP ENGAGEMENT CHAIR – **Katharine Yudkin**: A database has been created using an app building platform called AppSheet. 2020 and 2021 members to date have been entered. The database will also assist the Membership Engagement Chair by ensuring fellow Club chairs and officers fulfill their duties more effectively and efficiently. Recent Milestones Achieved:

- Bay Design has completed engineering drawings and permit submission documents.
- Mayo Tabb has led the review and will have final revision requests back to them with plans to submit the permit application during the week of March 15th.
- Bay Design has also recommended a small dredging effort to provide enough depth (5-6') in the closest slips on the Middle dock.

Next Steps:

- Request for board approval of a motion to approve the project, so that we may pursue the permit and funding for the dock construction.
- Submission of the permit to VMRC

Rear Commodore Mark Wensell introduced a resolution to move forward with the Middle dock project, appoint a construction committee, pursue the permit and funding for the dock construction and commence and complete the construction of the dock project. A motion made to approve this resolution. The motion was seconded and Approved.

NEW BUSINESS: Vice Commodore Joseph Roos advised the Board that Saturday, March 13, the Flag will meet with the Community Advisory Board and give them an update on this coming year. They will discuss big events, the roads, water and any capital improvements we are doing and get feedback from the Board on how we can work better together.

Vice Commodore Joseph Roos is asking all Board members and staff to take the Safe Sport training. There is good information and education on harassment. Helps people understand and identify any type of harassment and minimize the potential of something happening at the Club.

WIFI UPGRADE!

The first stage of FBYC's Wifi network upgrades is now complete! Over the course of February and March, lan McAllister and Paul Wash worked to assess our network infrastructure and wifi coverage. While our old system has served us well over the years, the trends from more mobile devices joining the network and increased bandwidth needs from the use of applications like video conferencing and streaming, had us frequently hitting its maximum capacity. The Club increasingly relies on the network to post results, pictures and videos of events in real-time as well.

Our old system typically delivered a maximum download speed of 10 Mb/s in Fannie's or the Main Clubhouse – now we are able to achieve download speeds of 40-60 Mb/s in those buildings. While the main antennae upgrades have also helped across the campus and docks, we anticipate adding more coverage and better throughput as part of the Middle Dock project late this year.

In the picture you can see the professional work done by lan McAllister, who led the charge in designing, sourcing and implementing the new network. Great work lan! I'm sure everyone will enjoy being able to stay connected in 2021!

WEST DOCK ELECTRICAL REPLACEMENT PROJECT MAYO TABB

Background: The West Dock, built in 1988 to a Civil Engineers design, was originally wired with 120v 15-amp convenience outlets. In the mid 1990s, it was rewired by a local contractor to 120v 30-amp marina outlets but without a design specification. On investigation, many wires were found to be undersized which will cause excessive voltage drop. It appears that no corrosion resistant fasteners were used and almost all conduits have fallen down and are unsupported. In 2011, the Code was changed to require GFI to the power receptacles of all new/reworked marine piers and docks as they provided increased safety from electrical hazards. The code will be further enhanced in 2023 to require GFI on the feeder cables on docks. Wear and tear due to the marine environment have taken its toll on the wiring, conduit and receptacles on the West dock which now requires replacement and gives us the opportunity to upgrade to latest GFI requirements.

Scope: Provide new Square D panel onshore with 2 pole GFI breaker and wire dock with type G 4 wire 120/240v cables feeding 6 MEE Marina Mate power pedestals for the slips except the first two which will be feed by 120v 15-amp receptacles mounted on the landside pilings. The first two Marina Mates will also have a 120v 15 a receptacle so the first 6 slips will have 15a receptacles available. A 7th Marina Mate with 120v 15-amp convenience outlet, 120v 30 amp, and 120/240v 50a (for visiting Powerboats typical of Junior week) receptacles.

WEST DOCK

The project will be done in stages with construction work done by FBYC staff/outside contractor with the electrical work done by more expensive electricians. The wire size to slips 197 and 200 are adequate from an overcurrent standard but undersized when operated at full load from a voltage drop standard. As these are all underground and have operated successfully without a voltage drop issue these would be retained as is but with new GFI feeder breakers.

Stage 1: Ken Johnson and Mayo Tabb reviewed the site to find deficiencies and collected data to develop a specification for the rework. Quotes will be obtained from MEE for the Power pedestals, type G wire and engineering data for cable sizes based upon 3% voltage drop except 5% for 120/240v 50-amp receptacle. Quotes will also be obtained for Square D panel and shore mounted GFI breakers. With that data and what we learned from the East Dock we should be able to come up with a budget cost.

Stage 2: During the summer, FBYC staff will install 2x6 planks with two 5" 3/8" galvanized lag screws attached to the underside of 3" stringers every 5 feet and remove deck board above and after removing nails, re-attach with SS screws. **Due to the condition of the conduits the main power to the dock must be turned off when any work is done under the dock**.

Stage 3: At the conclusion of the season, Dominion will disconnect service at the pole so the entire West Dock is safe for construction which will also take the hoist out of service. FBYC staff will remove decking from the walk path starting at the inshore end of the electrical panel to the bulkhead. They will then remove all electrical outlets, conduits and lights from the bulkhead out to the dock. They will dig up the conduits under the walk path, preserving the 5 conduits that will be re-used and then remove the electrical panel. The screwed down deck boards will be removed.

Stage 4: As we did for the East Dock, FBYC staff/volunteers will mount the 7 Marina Mates and drill holes in decking for water and electricity below Marina Mate base. FBYC/Staff will install a 3/4" white PVC water line to Marina Mates.

Stage 5: An electrical contractor will come in and reinstall the Dominion meter at the correct height on the rear of the panel with a new main disconnect and new

MLO square D panel on the front side. He will provide 1 50 amp and 6 30 amp 2-pole Square D GFI breakers (30 ma trip) to feed Marina Mates plus 3 1-pole 30-amp GFI breakers to feed slip 197 and 200 center and 200 end. Two 1-pole 20-amp beakers will be provided to feed slips 201 and 202. A 40 amp 2-pole and 1-pole 20-amp breakers to feed hoist and its convenience outlet.

The electrical contractor shall supply Schedule 80 PVC conduit from the Square D panel to Bulkhead for the type G cables and Schedule 40 conduits with #10 THHN to slips 201 and 202 and reconnect retained landside conduits. The Type G cables will be supported every 5 feet by the new cross braces and attached with non-metallic clips with stainless steel hardware and connected to the already installed Marina Mates

Stage 6: FBYC staff shall cover with dirt the exposed conduits and re-install all removed decking.

The original conduit support has totally failed, and the conduits have fallen down. I suspect that they were originally supported by non-corrosion resistant metallic supports that have long since corroded out. The eaten out cross braces were standard commercial design to add stiffness to the pier but because our water is so shallow, they serve no purpose as the pier is sufficiently stiff. We should consider cutting them off with a chainsaw when we do the electrical work.

Electrical Datum Plane Calculation: Per Henderson drawing, the top of West Dock planking is 4'6" above MLO. Per BDG drawing for FBYC ramp, MHW is 1'6" higher than MLO. Therefore West Dock planking is 3 feet above MHW which exceeds the Code requirement of 2 feet.
