Our Offshore sailors bring a great variety of boats and personalities to the Club. Offshore sailing is an active division with something for everyone, casual and competitive, as you like. We have buoy races and government mark/distance races to satisfy all sailors, and we have added a Cruising Class to many events in hopes of tempting the cruisers to come out and compete on the race course. Just check out the Rescue Regatta, the fundraiser for Middlesex Volunteer Rescue Squad. There are regular club offshore series races (spring, fall, distance and winter), and some of our boats - I'm thinking of *Dianthus* (David Tabor and Carol Vaughn), *Nanuq* (Glenn and Rebecca Doncaster), and others - set off to do multi day races away from our club too (Down the Bay, Annapolis to Newport, Block Island, Marblehead to Halifax Ocean Race, Newport to Bermuda).

Over the years we have had quite an active and competitive fleet, with some of our boats campaigning all over the place. Much time, money and tears were probably expended to achieve the heights our sailors achieved. Just look up the America's Cup, Carina or the Fastnet race. Rives Potts (former commodore) was on the winning boat in 1979, and was here with his grandkids in OptiKids this summer - you know there are some good sailing genes in that family.

These Offshore sailors are a hardy bunch, focused on performance and camaraderie. They like to get reliable crew and have those same crew members show up to each event; this helps make performance consistent. rather than explaining all the nuances of the boat to new crew before every race. Our Crew Training program that takes place prior to each race season is a well planned strategy for keeping the hopper full of new and well trained crew members. Our Offshore skippers and member volunteers do a great job supporting this event and continue to augment their crews. Offshore skippers and crews are famous for supporting the One Design fleet events - this is the unwritten rule that has enabled Offshore and One Design series races to continue over the years by supporting one another. 

IN MEMORIAM John Henry Guy IV February 27, 1945 - July 3, 2025





John Henry Guy IV, loving husband of 56 years to his wife, Perry Sinnickson Guy, passed away on July 3, 2025. Known as Johnny to his friends and family, he was born in Richmond, Virginia, on February 27, 1945, to John Henry Guy Jr. and Frances Archer Claiborne Guy.

Johnny was a graduate of St. Christopher's School and the University of Virginia. He was a long-time resident of Alexandria, Va., living there for most of his professional career until moving to his river house in Hartfield, Va., in 2021. He worked for over five decades at the National Petroleum Council, a federally chartered and privately funded advisory committee to the U.S. Secretary of Energy, in Washington, D.C., serving as Deputy Executive Director and Director of Committee Operations. In these roles, he oversaw the production of countless influential reports on U.S. and global energy policy, helping shape national conversations around energy conservation, oil and gas resources, environmental responsibility and emergency preparedness.

Johnny's deep passion for history and architecture was clearly reflected in his lifelong dedication to historic preservation. His leadership at Preservation Virginia, our nation's oldest statewide preservation organization, was especially impactful. As a past President and a devoted member of the Board of Trustees until his passing, he played a vital role in advancing the organization's mission and fulfilling responsibilities for Historic Jamestown and statewide operations.

Equally noteworthy was his steadfast commitment to the Menokin Foundation. Serving as Treasurer and Vice President of the Board of Trustees, he provided invaluable guidance in preserving the legacy of Menokin, the historic home of Francis Lightfoot Lee, a signer of the Declaration of Independence.

Johnny was a member of the Society Of The Cincinnati, Preservation Virginia, the Virginia Historical Society, Historic Alexandria Foundation, the Frank Horton Society of the Museum of Early Southern Decorative Arts, the Regent's Circle of Mount Vernon, the Anglers' Club of New York, the Old Dominion Boat Club, Fishing Bay Yacht Club in Deltaville, VA, Belle Haven Country Club, Farmington Country Club, Phi Kappa Sigma fraternity at the University of Virginia, and St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Alexandria, Va.

Johnny is remembered for his deep Virginia roots, his love of history, his collection of fine Parker Bros. double-barrel shotguns, hunting upland game and waterfowl, fly-fishing, offshore sailboat racing, his passion for building homes, traveling, and his unwavering belief in the importance of preserving the past for future generations.

Johnny is also survived by his son William Carrington Guy II and daughter-in-law Catherine Williams Guy of Charlottesville, Va., and their children, August and Frances; and son Claiborne Sinnickson Guy and daughter-in-law Sarah Stockdale Guy of Alexandria, Va., and their children, Rachel and Catherine. He is also survived by two sisters, Elizabeth Guy Richardson and Archer Guy Minardi.

His legacy lives on in the institutions he helped strengthen, his many accomplishments, his kindness and the countless lives he touched through his work and friendship. He will be deeply missed.

There will be a memorial service on Tuesday, August 26th, at Hollywood Cemetery, 412 South Cherry Street, Richmond, Va. 23220, at 11 a.m. In lieu of flowers, memorial contributions may be made to Preservation Virginia or the Menokin Foundation.

Nelson Parker, III and Nelson's wife Pamela.

She is also survived by her grandchildren: Pierce Coughter and Pierce's wife Ashley, Eliza Coughter Lillard and Eliza's husband Chris, Harding Coughter; Cabell Hodges, Will Hodges and Will's wife Cornelia; Mary Alden Parker, Ned Parker and Ned's wife Maggie, James Parker, and Lucy Caroline Parker Trapp and her husband Chris. She is also survived by nine great-grandchildren and numerous nieces, nephews, and cousins.

Liz was raised on Hanover Avenue in Richmond's near West End. She graduated from St. Catherine's School in 1947 and from Randolph-Macon Women's College in 1951. She enjoyed a lengthy career as Director of Admissions at St. Catherine's, for which she is fondly remembered by many alumnae, but

what she really enjoyed was her life on the water in and around Deltaville, Virginia, where she sailed well into her seventies. There, she crewed on numerous racing sailboats and met Bill Perkins whom she married in 1980. She and Billy took up full-time residence in their own Chesapeake Bay Lighthouse in 1986 where they hosted in style friends and extended family at holiday gatherings and soirees of all sorts including pool parties, cut-throat croquet matches, and slightly less competitive Easter egg hunts.

Along the way, Liz managed to see most of the planet. From Belize to Glacier Bay and from the Eiffel Tower to the Taj Majal, the world was Liz's oyster and she savored it. Among her favorite foreign travels were those enjoyed with her children and grandchildren.

Liz was a member of the Deltaville Community Association, the Deltaville Maritime Museum, the National Society of the Colonial Dames of America, the Fishing Bay Yacht Club, and Christ Episcopal Church, Saluda, where she served for many years on the vestry and as a eucharistic minister.

Liz's family would like to thank the staff at Rappahannock Westminster-Canterbury for their kindness and care for these last 6 years.

A celebration of Liz's life will be held at Christ Church, Saluda at 11:00 A.M. on August 25, 2025. In lieu of flowers, contributions may be made in Liz's memory to the Chesapeake Bay Foundation, the Deltaville Maritime Museum, or your local PBS station.

FBYC Flying Scot Fleet 103 turned out nine competitors, joined by four visiting boats from Richmond, Raleigh and Washington, D.C.

They finished 7^{th} , 4^{th} , 2^{nd} , 4^{th} and 1^{st} in five races over the two-day event. That landed them in second place overall for the regatta, behind FBYC's John and Sharon Wake, who swept every race except for the last one.



A terrific party on Saturday night divided the two days of racing. Big thanks to event chair Holly Sears and race chair Jim Raper for their hard work to make this annual club highlight a successful venture.


